Definitions of "Finally" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “finally” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *The item at the end.*
- *In such a way as to put an end to doubt and dispute.*
- *As the end result of a succession or process.*
- *As the last in a series of related events or items.*
- *Used to introduce a final point or reason.*
- *After an unspecified period of time or an especially long delay.*
- *After a long time, typically when there has been difficulty or delay.*

absolutely	(of a verb) without a stated object. <i>You're absolutely right.</i>
after a long time	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time.
after some time	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time.
by and by	So as to pass a given point.
conclusively	In a conclusive way. <i>We settled the problem conclusively.</i>
decisively	In an indisputable degree. <i>We must respond decisively to protect our national interests.</i>
definitely	In a definite manner; clearly. <i>We couldn't plan to go elsewhere until we had heard from you more definitely.</i>
definitively	Decisively and with authority; conclusively. <i>Only a large clinical trial can definitively answer the question.</i>
eventually	After an unspecified period of time or an especially long delay. <i>Eventually after midnight I arrived at the hotel.</i>

for all time	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).
for ever	At all times; all the time and on every occasion.
for good	Completely and absolutely (‘good’ is sometimes used informally for ‘thoroughly’).
in closing	To or toward the inside of.
in conclusion	To or toward the inside of.
in the end	To or toward the inside of.
<u>irrevocably</u>	In an irrevocable manner. <i>My life changed irrevocably in an instant.</i>
last	Especially in enumerating points lastly. <i>The last named film.</i>
last but not least	Most recently.
<u>lastly</u>	The item at the end. <i>Lastly I would like to thank my parents.</i>
once and for all	As soon as.
permanently	In a way that lasts or remains unchanged indefinitely; for all time. <i>His lungs are permanently damaged.</i>
ultimately	As the end result of a succession or process. <i>Ultimately he has only himself to blame.</i>

- *He finally arrived to join us.*
- *The need to dispel finally the belief that auditors were clients of the company.*
- *Finally, it is common knowledge that travel broadens the horizons.*
- *A referendum followed by local, legislative and, finally, presidential elections.*

decisively	With finality; conclusively. <i>The government will act decisively against all extremist activities.</i>
<u>destination</u>	The place designated as the end (as of a race or journey). <i>Delft is an ideal destination for a relaxing weekend.</i>
encounter	Come together. <i>She felt totally unnerved by the encounter.</i>
end	Have an end in a temporal spatial or quantitative sense either spatial or metaphorical. <i>The phone rang at the other end.</i>
ending	The act of ending something. <i>A nerve ending.</i>
epilogue	A short speech (often in verse) addressed directly to the audience by an actor at the end of a play. <i>A disastrous epilogue to the rest of his career.</i>
eventually	In the end, especially after a long delay, dispute, or series of problems. <i>Eventually after midnight I arrived at the hotel.</i>
expiry	The end of a fixed period of time. <i>An expiry date.</i>
extremity	The degree to which something is extreme. <i>The peninsula s western extremity.</i>
<u>final</u>	The final match between the winners of all previous matches in an elimination tournament. <i>The final chapter.</i>
finale	The temporal end; the concluding time. <i>The festival ends with a grand finale.</i>
finish	Provide with a finish. <i>Falkirk finished fifth in the Scottish Premier League.</i>
finishing	The act of finishing. <i>The speaker s finishing was greeted with applause.</i>

last	The last mention or sight of someone or something. <i>A last resort.</i>
lastly	The item at the end. <i>Lastly I would like to thank my parents.</i>
peroration	The concluding part of a speech, typically intended to inspire enthusiasm in the audience. <i>He again invoked the theme in an emotional peroration.</i>
person-to-person	A grammatical category used in the classification of pronouns, possessive determiners, and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker, the addressee, or a third party.
reach	Reach a goal. <i>The programme's daily reach is 400 000.</i>
secondly	In the second place. <i>He was presented first of all as a hopelessly unqualified candidate and secondly as an extremist.</i>
termination	An assassination. <i>A good result and a happy termination.</i>
ultimately	At the most basic level. <i>Ultimately he has only himself to blame.</i>
