## Associations of "Fine tune" (30 Words)

<b>arpeggio</b>	The notes of a chord played in rapid succession, either ascending or descending.
<b>atonal</b>	Characterized by avoidance of traditional western tonality. <i><b>Atonal</b> music may be written by obscuring tonal structures or by ignoring conventional harmonies altogether.</i>
<b>ballad</b>	A poem or song narrating a story in short stanzas Traditional ballads are typically of unknown authorship having been passed on orally from one generation to the next.
<b>chord</b>	Play sing or arrange notes in chords. <i>The entire swing session is masterfully <b>chorded</b> by the Duke on piano.</i>
<b>choreograph</b>	Compose a sequence of dance steps, often to music. <i>Balanchine <b>choreographed</b> many pieces to Stravinsky s music.</i>
<b>chromatic</b>	Of an instrument able to play all the notes of the chromatic scale. <i>A <b>chromatic</b> scale.</i>
<b>clef</b>	A musical notation written on a staff indicating the pitch of the notes following it.
<b>dancing</b>	The activity of dancing for pleasure or in order to entertain others. <i>A <b>dancing</b> class.</i>
<b>decibel</b>	A unit used to measure the intensity of a sound or the power level of an electrical signal by comparing it with a given level on a logarithmic scale. <i>His voice went up several <b>decibels</b>.</i>
<b>descant</b>	Sing in descant. <i>I hear the wood thrush piping one mellow <b>descant</b> more.</i>
<b>diatonic</b>	Of a melody or harmony constructed from a diatonic scale.
<b>euphony</b>	The tendency to make phonetic change for ease of pronunciation. <i>The poet put <b>euphony</b> before mere factuality.</i>

<b>guitar</b>	A stringed instrument usually having six strings; played by strumming or plucking.
<b>harmony</b>	The quality of forming a pleasing and consistent whole. <i>The piece owes its air of tranquillity largely to the <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>mazurka</b>	Music composed for dancing the mazurka.
<b>melody</b>	The principal part in harmonized music. <i>He picked out an intricate <b>melody</b> on his guitar.</i>
<b>music</b>	The art or science of composing or performing music. <i>Couples were dancing to the <b>music</b>.</i>
<b>octave</b>	Each of the two notes at the extremes of an octave.
<b>pop</b>	Like a pop or with a pop. <i>Another thought <b>popped</b> into my mind.</i>
<b>rhythm</b>	The basic rhythmic unit in a piece of music. <i>Ruth listened to the <b>rhythm</b> of his breathing.</i>
<b>rust</b>	Any of various fungi causing rust disease in plants. <i>The steady dripping of water <b>rusted</b> the metal stopper in the sink.</i>
<b>sing</b>	Sing in accompaniment to a song or piece of music. <i>A stinging slap that made my ear <b>sing</b>.</i>
<b>soprano</b>	A part written for a soprano voice. <i>A good <b>soprano</b> voice.</i>
<b>tenor</b>	A singer with a tenor voice. <i>The Serenade for <b>tenor</b> horn and strings.</i>
<b>timbre</b>	The distinctive property of a complex sound (a voice or noise or musical sound). <i>You must demonstrate your moral <b>timbre</b> as a human being.</i>
<b>tonal</b>	Having tonality i e tones and chords organized in relation to one tone such as a keynote or tonic. <i>His ear for <b>tonal</b> colour.</i>
<b>tonality</b>	The harmonic effect of being in a particular key. <i>The sonata is noteworthy for its extensive variations of mood and <b>tonality</b>.</i>
<b>tone</b>	A steady sound without overtones. <i>The Beijing dialect uses four <b>tones</b>.</i>
<b>treble</b>	Sing treble. <i>The fish were caught with large <b>treble</b> hooks.</i>
<b>tremolo</b>	A mechanism in an organ producing a tremolo effect.
