- assiduous** Showing great care and perseverance.
Assiduous research.
- attentive** Taking heed; giving close and thoughtful attention.
Attentive to details.
- awkward** Not elegant or graceful in expression.
An *awkward* gesture.
- conscientious** Wishing to do one's work or duty well and thoroughly.
The individual is denied even the opportunity to break the law on conscientious grounds.
- deliberate** Fully considered; not impulsive.
A *deliberate* attempt to provoke a response.

demanding	(of a person) making others work hard or meet high standards; not easily satisfied. <i>Found the job very demanding.</i>
difficult	(of a person) not easy to please or satisfy; awkward. <i>She had a difficult decision to make.</i>
diligent	Having or showing care and conscientiousness in one's work or duties. <i>A diligent detective investigates all clues.</i>
exacting	Severe and unremitting in making demands. <i>An exacting job.</i>
fastidious	Very attentive to and concerned about accuracy and detail. <i>A fastidious and incisive intellect.</i>
finical	Exacting especially about details.
fussy	Exacting especially about details. <i>He is very fussy about what he eats.</i>
hard to please	Dispassionate.
judicious	Marked by the exercise of good judgment or common sense in practical matters. <i>The judicious use of public investment.</i>
methodical	Done according to a systematic or established procedure. <i>A methodical approach to the evaluation of computer systems.</i>
meticulous	Marked by extreme care in treatment of details. <i>He had always been so meticulous about his appearance.</i>
orderly	Devoid of violence or disruption. <i>An orderly arrangement of objects.</i>
overcritical	Inclined to judge too severely. <i>She d been overcritical of Margaret.</i>
painstaking	Characterized by extreme care and great effort. <i>Painstaking research.</i>
particular	Providing specific details or circumstances. <i>Interested in one particular artist.</i>
perfectionist	Refusing to accept any standard short of perfection.
picky	Fussy and hard to please. <i>They are becoming increasingly picky about where they stay.</i>
punctilious	Marked by precise accordance with details. <i>He was punctilious in providing every amenity for his guests.</i>
scrupulous	Having scruples; arising from a sense of right and wrong; principled. <i>She s too scrupulous to have an affair with a married man.</i>

sedulous Marked by care and persistent effort.
***Sedulous** pursuit of legal and moral principles.*

demanding	(of a task) requiring much skill or effort. <i>Found the job very demanding.</i>
detailed	Having many details or facts; showing attention to detail. <i>An exquisitely detailed carving.</i>
dispensation	Exemption from a rule or usual requirement. <i>The Mosaic dispensation.</i>
exacting	Requiring precise accuracy. <i>An exacting instructor.</i>
fastidious	Very concerned about matters of cleanliness. <i>She dressed with fastidious care.</i>
fuss	A protest or dispute of a specified degree or kind. <i>I don't know what all the fuss is about.</i>
fussy	Fastidious about one's needs or requirements; hard to please. <i>I hate fussy clothes.</i>
grumpy	Bad-tempered and irritable. <i>His performance as the grumpy gateman.</i>
haste	Overly eager speed (and possible carelessness). <i>In his haste to leave he forgot his book.</i>
meticulous	Marked by extreme care in treatment of details. <i>He had always been so meticulous about his appearance.</i>
pedantic	Marked by a narrow focus on or display of learning especially its trivial aspects. <i>His analyses are careful and even painstaking but never pedantic.</i>

<u>picky</u>	Exacting especially about details. <i>They are becoming increasingly picky about where they stay.</i>
priggish	Self-righteously moralistic and superior. <i>She was priggish about sex.</i>
prim	Assume a prim appearance. <i>Laurie primmed up his mouth.</i>
prissy	Excessively fastidious and easily disgusted. <i>A middle class family with two prissy children.</i>
prudery	Excessive or affected modesty.
prudish	Having or revealing a tendency to be easily shocked by matters relating to sex or nudity; excessively concerned with sexual propriety. <i>The prudish moral climate of the late 19th century.</i>
puritanical	Having or displaying a very strict or censorious moral attitude towards self-indulgence or sex. <i>His puritanical parents saw any kind of pleasure as the road to damnation.</i>
shy	(of a wild mammal or bird) reluctant to remain in sight of humans. <i>He left school just shy of his fourteenth birthday.</i>
squeamish	Easily made to feel sick or disgusted. <i>So squeamish he would only touch the toilet handle with his elbow.</i>
stern	Of a stern or strict bearing or demeanor forbidding in aspect. <i>A smile transformed his stern face.</i>
stickle	A section of river where the bed slopes and the water is shallow and runs swiftly; a rapid.
stickler	A person who insists on a certain quality or type of behaviour. <i>I m a stickler when it comes to timekeeping.</i>
<u>stoicism</u>	The endurance of pain or hardship without the display of feelings and without complaint.
strict	Characterized by strictness severity or restraint. <i>Civil servants are bound by strict rules on secrecy.</i>
<u>stringent</u>	Demanding strict attention to rules and procedures. <i>Stringent guidelines on air pollution.</i>
<u>temperance</u>	Abstinence from alcoholic drink. <i>The temperance movement.</i>
<u>timid</u>	Lacking self-confidence. <i>I was too timid to ask for what I wanted.</i>
