Definitions of "Firebrand" as a noun

- *Someone who deliberately foments trouble.*
- *A piece of wood that has been burned or is burning.*
- *A person who is very passionate about a particular cause.*
- *A piece of burning wood.*

inciter	Someone who deliberately foments trouble.
instigant	Someone who deliberately foments trouble.
instigator	A person who brings about or initiates something. <i>She was the instigator of their quarrel.</i>
provoker	Someone who deliberately foments trouble.

radical A person who has radical ideas or opinions.
*In the body free **radicals** are high energy particles that ricochet wildly and damage cells.*

revolutionary A person who advocates or engages in political revolution.

insurgent	In opposition to a civil authority or government. <i>A series of insurgent attacks.</i>
insurrection	A violent uprising against an authority or government. <i>The insurrection was savagely put down.</i>
junta	A deliberative or administrative council in Spain or Portugal. <i>The country's ruling military junta.</i>

<u>mutiny</u>	Engage in a mutiny against an authority. <i>The crew were on the verge of mutiny.</i>
<u>overthrow</u>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>One who is already prostrate cannot be overthrown.</i>
prosecutor	A government official who conducts criminal prosecutions on behalf of the state. <i>The prosecutor rose to give the opening address.</i>
<u>protest</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>Doctors and patients protested against plans to cut services at the hospital.</i>
<u>rebel</u>	Take part in a rebellion renounce a former allegiance. <i>Tory rebels.</i>
<u>rebellion</u>	Refusal to accept some authority or code or convention. <i>An act of teenage rebellion.</i>
<u>revolt</u>	Cause aversion in; offend the moral sense of. <i>A revolt over tax increases.</i>
revolution	A single orbit of one object around another or about an axis or centre. <i>When I grew up it was the Marxism that was very strong it was like the revolution was coming next week.</i>
<u>revolutionary</u>	Of or relating to or characteristic or causing an axial or orbital turn. <i>The revolutionary army.</i>
<u>riot</u>	Take part in a riot disturb the public peace by engaging in a riot. <i>The film s sex scenes caused a riot in Cannes.</i>
rising	A movement upward. <i>The rising temperature.</i>
sedition	Inciting or causing people to rebel against the authority of a state or monarch. <i>The letter was declared sedition.</i>
socialist	Advocating or following the socialist principles. <i>She was a lifelong socialist.</i>
<u>subversive</u>	A subversive person. <i>The government claimed we were subversives or terrorists.</i>
<u>treason</u>	Disloyalty by virtue of subversive behavior. <i>They were convicted of treason.</i>
uphill	Against difficulties. <i>Follow the track uphill.</i>
