**dismissed** Having lost your job.

**laid-off** Having lost your job.

**pink-slipped** Having lost your job.

- ablaze** Very brightly coloured or lighted.  
*Forests set **ablaze** or **afire** by lightning.*
- afire** Lighted up by or as by fire or flame.  
*Forests set **ablaze** or **afire** by lightning.*
- aflake** Lighted up by or as by fire or flame.  
*Pour brandy over the steaks and then set **aflake**.*
- alight** Descend from a train, bus, or other form of transport.  
*Candles **alight** on the tables.*
- blaze** Indicate by marking trees with blazes.  
*He **blazed** a drive into the rough.*
- burn** Burn sear or freeze tissue using a hot iron or electric current or a caustic agent.  
*The diesel engine was converted to **burn** natural gas.*

<b>burning</b>	The act of burning something. <i>The <b>burning</b> of leaves was prohibited by a town ordinance.</i>
<b>cinder</b>	Waste matter produced by smelting or refining ore; slag. <i>A cold hearth full of <b>cinders</b>.</i>
<b>combust</b>	Undergo combustion. <i>One day the whole building will <b>combust</b>.</i>
<b>combustible</b>	A combustible substance. <i>A volatile and <b>combustible</b> personality.</i>
<b>combustion</b>	The process of burning something. <i><b>Combustion</b> grew until revolt was unavoidable.</i>
<b>douse</b>	Dip into a liquid. <i>Nothing could <b>douse</b> her sudden euphoria.</i>
<b>erupt</b>	Erupt or intensify suddenly. <i>Smoke bombs <b>erupted</b> everywhere.</i>
<b>extinguish</b>	Extinguish by crushing. <i>Too big to be <b>extinguished</b> at once the forest fires at best could be contained.</i>
<b>fiery</b>	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>A <b>fiery</b> desert wind.</i>
<b>firefighter</b>	A member of a fire department who tries to extinguish fires.
<b>flame</b>	A brilliant orange red colour like that of flames. <i>Send out an unsolicited email and you could possibly receive thousands of <b>flames</b>.</i>
<b>flaming</b>	Very hot. <i>Her <b>flaming</b> hair.</i>
<b>flammable</b>	Easily ignited. <i>The use of highly <b>flammable</b> materials.</i>
<b>flare</b>	Become flared and widen usually at one end. <i>The dress <b>flared</b> out into a huge train.</i>
<b>igneous</b>	Of fire; fiery. <i>An <b>igneous</b> desert atmosphere.</i>
<b>ignite</b>	Arouse or inflame (an emotion or situation). <i>The words <b>ignited</b> new fury in him.</i>
<b>incinerate</b>	Cause to undergo combustion. <i>The paper <b>incinerated</b> quickly.</i>

<b>lava</b>	Rock that in its molten form as magma issues from volcanos lava is what magma is called when it reaches the surface. <i>Tablelands of <b>lava</b>.</i>
<b>pyrotechnic</b>	Suggestive of fireworks. <i>A <b>pyrotechnic</b> wit.</i>
<b>smolder</b>	Have strong suppressed feelings. <i>A <b>smoldering</b> fire.</i>
<b>smoulder</b>	Smoke coming from a smouldering fire. <i>The <b>smoulder</b> suddenly became a blaze.</i>
<b>stoke</b>	Encourage or incite (a strong emotion or tendency). <i>He <b>stoked</b> up the barbecue.</i>
<b>volcanic</b>	(of a feeling or emotion) bursting out or liable to burst out violently. <i>A <b>volcanic</b> temper.</i>
<b>volcano</b>	A mountain formed by volcanic material. <i>Clare had been building up a silent <b>volcano</b> of resentment.</i>
