<b>ability</b>	Talent, skill, or proficiency in a particular area. <i>The manager had lost his <b>ability</b> to motivate the players.</i>
<b>aptitude</b>	A natural ability to do something. <i>Children with an <b>aptitude</b> for painting and drawing.</i>
<b>bent</b>	Grass for pastures and lawns especially bowling and putting greens. <i>He had a <b>bent</b> for it.</i>
<b>brio</b>	Quality of being active or spirited or alive and vigorous. <i>She told her story with some <b>brio</b>.</i>
<b>capability</b>	The power or ability to do something. <i>The company's <b>capability</b> to increase productivity.</i>
<b>capacity</b>	An electrical phenomenon whereby an electric charge is stored. <i>Writing in his <b>capacity</b> as legal correspondent.</i>
<b>dash</b>	A quick run. <i>Whisky with a <b>dash</b> of soda.</i>
<b>elan</b>	Distinctive and stylish elegance. <i>They performed with uncommon <b>elan</b> onstage.</i>
<b>elegance</b>	The quality of being pleasingly ingenious and simple; neatness. <i>A slender woman with grace and <b>elegance</b>.</i>
<b>facility</b>	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty. <i>The pianist played with great <b>facility</b>.</i>
<b>faculty</b>	The teaching or research staff of a group of university departments viewed as a body. <i>The <b>faculty</b> of sight.</i>
<b>feel</b>	Feelings of heightened emotion. <i>The <b>feel</b> of the city excited him.</i>
<b>finesse</b>	Great subtlety and tact in handling or manipulating people or difficult situations. <i>Clients want advice and action that calls for considerable <b>finesse</b>.</i>
<b>flare</b>	A fly ball hit a short distance into the outfield. <i>A colitis <b>flare</b>.</i>
<b>genius</b>	A person regarded as exerting a powerful influence over another for good or evil. <i>Boucher's paintings did not suit the austere <b>genius</b> of neoclassicism.</i>
<b>gift</b>	A thing given willingly to someone without payment; a present. <i>He has a <b>gift</b> for comedy.</i>

<b><u>instinct</u></b>	An innate, typically fixed pattern of behaviour in animals in response to certain stimuli. <i>They retain their old authoritarian <b>instincts</b>.</i>
<b>knack</b>	A special way of doing something. <i>He had a special <b>knack</b> for getting into trouble.</i>
<b>natural ability</b>	A first roll of 7 or 11 that immediately wins the stake.
<b>panache</b>	Flamboyant confidence of style or manner. <i>He entertained London society with great <b>panache</b>.</i>
<b>poise</b>	A cgs unit of dynamic viscosity equal to one dyne-second per square centimeter; the viscosity of a fluid in which a force of one dyne per square centimeter maintains a velocity of 1 centimeter per second. <i>The balance has passed the point where the spring is in <b>poise</b>.</i>
<b>skill</b>	Ability to produce solutions in some problem domain. <i>The <b>skill</b> of a well trained boxer.</i>
<b><u>sparkle</u></b>	A glittering flash of light. <i>There was a <b>sparkle</b> in his eyes.</i>
<b>style</b>	In an invertebrate a small slender pointed appendage a stylet. <i>Students should pay attention to <b>style</b> and idiom.</i>
<b>stylishness</b>	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.
<b><u>talent</u></b>	A person who possesses unusual innate ability in some field or activity. <i>Simon is a <b>talent</b> to watch.</i>
<b><u>verve</u></b>	Vigour and spirit or enthusiasm. <i>Kollo sings with supreme <b>verve</b> and flexibility.</i>

- ability** Possession of the qualities (especially mental qualities) required to do something or get something done.  
*A man of exceptional **ability**.*
- aptitude** A natural tendency.  
***Aptitude** of expression.*
- aptness** A disposition to behave in a certain way.  
*The **aptness** of the punishment.*
- brawn** Physical strength in contrast to intelligence.  
*Commando work required as much brain as **brawn**.*
- canny** Pleasant; nice.  
***Canny** investors will switch banks if they think they are getting a raw deal.*

<b>capability</b>	A facility on a computer for performing a specified task. <i>The company s <b>capability</b> to increase productivity.</i>
<b>capacity</b>	Capability to perform or produce. <i>The stadium s seating <b>capacity</b>.</i>
<b>competence</b>	Effective performance of the normal function. <i>The court s <b>competence</b> has been accepted to cover these matters.</i>
<b>craft</b>	An aircraft or spaceship. <i>Art and <b>craft</b>.</i>
<b>deftness</b>	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
<b>dexterity</b>	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>Her <b>dexterity</b> with chopsticks.</i>
<b>dextrous</b>	Skillful in physical movements; especially of the hands.
<b>draftsmanship</b>	The creation of artistic pictures or diagrams.
<b>faculty</b>	One of the inherent cognitive or perceptual powers of the mind. <i>His <b>faculty</b> for taking the initiative.</i>
<b>finesse</b>	(in bridge and whist) play (a card) in the hope of winning a trick with it because any card that could beat it is in the hand of the opponent who has already played. <i>Clients want advice and action that calls for considerable <b>finesse</b>.</i>
<b>gifted</b>	Endowed with talent or talents. <i>A <b>gifted</b> amateur musician.</i>
<b>gumption</b>	Sound practical judgment. <i>The president would hire almost any young man who had the <b>gumption</b> to ask for a job.</i>
<b>ingenuity</b>	The property of being ingenious. <i>The <b>ingenuity</b> of Haydn s scoring.</i>
<b>knack</b>	A tendency to do something. <i>He had a special <b>knack</b> for getting into trouble.</i>
<b>potentiality</b>	Latent qualities or abilities that may be developed and lead to future success or usefulness. <i>The technology is still relatively not well known in spite of its great <b>potentiality</b>.</i>
<b>potentially</b>	With the capacity to develop or happen in the future. <i>A <b>potentially</b> dangerous situation.</i>
<b>skill</b>	Train (a worker) to do a particular task. <i>Difficult work taking great <b>skill</b>.</i>

<b>sleight</b>	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>Except by <b>sleight</b> of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i>
<b>stenography</b>	A method of writing rapidly using an abbreviated symbolic system.
<b>suitability</b>	The quality of being right or appropriate for a particular person, purpose, or situation. <i>Her superiors had doubts about her <b>suitability</b> for the job.</i>
<b>tact</b>	Skill and sensitivity in dealing with others or with difficult issues. <i>The inspector broke the news to me with <b>tact</b> and consideration.</i>
<b>talent</b>	People regarded as sexually attractive or as prospective sexual partners. <i>She displayed a <b>talent</b> for garden design.</i>
<b>talented</b>	Having a natural aptitude or skill for something. <i>A <b>talented</b> young musician.</i>
<b>technique</b>	A practical method or art applied to some particular task. <i>The <b>techniques</b> used by Turner Rembrandt and Degas.</i>
<b>workmanship</b>	The degree of skill with which a product is made or a job done. <i>Cracks on the motorway were caused by poor <b>workmanship</b>.</i>
