- A brilliant orange-red colour like that of flames.

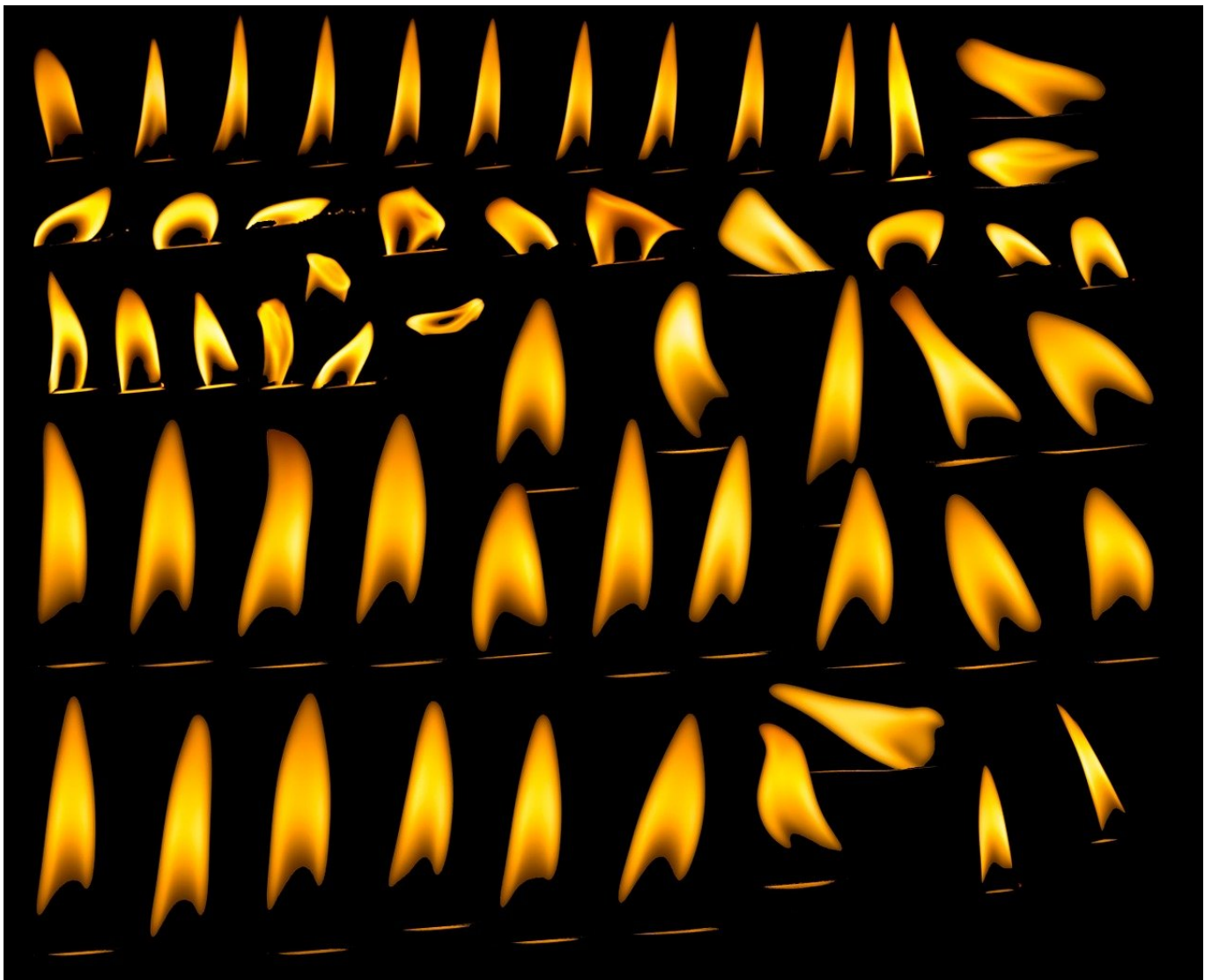


Synonyms of "Flame" as a noun (30 Words)

ardour	Great enthusiasm or passion. <i>He kissed her with an ardour that left her breathless.</i>
blaze	A light-colored marking. <i>The horse had a blaze between its eyes.</i>
blood red	Temperament or disposition.
<u>cardinal</u>	A deep scarlet colour like that of a cardinal's cassock. <i>His appointment as cardinal.</i>
carmine	A variable color averaging a vivid red. <i>Carmine roses.</i>
cerise	A light clear red colour. <i>A bright cerise suit.</i>

cherry	The tree that bears the cherry. <i>She pulled up the collar of her cherry wool coat.</i>
cherry red	Wood of any of various cherry trees especially the black cherry.
claret	Blood. <i>The prices of 1990 clarets.</i>
claret red	Emotionally charged terms used to refer to extreme radicals or revolutionaries.
<u>conflagration</u>	An extensive fire which destroys a great deal of land or property. <i>Tinder dry conditions sparked fears of a conflagration in many drought devastated communities.</i>
fergency	Feelings of great warmth and intensity.
feravour	Intense heat. <i>He talked with all the feravour of a new convert.</i>
fire	A fireplace in which a relatively small fire is burning. <i>The whisky lit a fire in the back of his throat.</i>
firestorm	An outburst of controversy. <i>Firestorms after a nuclear exchange.</i>
flaming	The process of combustion of inflammable materials producing heat and light and (often) smoke.
holocaust	An act of mass destruction and loss of life (especially in war or by fire). <i>A nuclear holocaust.</i>
<u>inferno</u>	Hell (with reference to Dante's Divine Comedy). <i>The inferno had swept through the city.</i>
<u>intensity</u>	The quality of being intense. <i>He adjusted the intensity of the sound.</i>
keenness	A quick and penetrating intelligence. <i>I admired the keenness of his mind.</i>
passion	A state or outburst of strong emotion. <i>Modern furniture is a particular passion of Bill s.</i>
passionateness	A strong feeling or emotion.
ruby	A transparent piece of ruby that has been cut and polished and is valued as a precious gem. <i>The rich ruby liquid.</i>
ruby red	Red color or pigment; the chromatic color resembling the hue of blood.
<u>scarlet</u>	Scarlet clothes or material. <i>Papers lettered in scarlet and black.</i>

vermilion	A brilliant red pigment made from mercury sulphide (cinnabar). <i>A lateral stripe of vermilion.</i>
warmth	The sensation caused by heat energy. <i>An agreeable warmth in the house.</i>
wine	A red as dark as red wine. <i>A wine coloured suit.</i>
wine red	Fermented juice (of grapes especially).
wine-coloured	A red as dark as red wine.

<u>beam</u>	Express with a beaming face or smile. <i>The fire beamed on their faces.</i>
become red	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
blaze	Indicate by marking trees with blazes. <i>Elijah felt the anger blaze up again.</i>
<u>blush</u>	Turn red, as if in embarrassment or shame. <i>The girl blushed when a young man whistled as she walked by.</i>

<u>flush</u>	Remove or dispose of an object or substance by flushing. <i>0.3 ml of saline is gently flushed through the tube.</i>
<u>glare</u>	Look at with a fixed gaze. <i>The moon glared back at itself from the lake's surface.</i>
glow	Shine intensely, as if with heat. <i>Her face glowed when she came out of the sauna.</i>
go red	Be awarded; be allotted.
grow crimson	Grow emotionally or mature.
grow pink	Become larger, greater, or bigger; expand or gain.
grow scarlet	Develop and reach maturity; undergo maturation.
<u>ignite</u>	Start or maintain a fire in. <i>The words ignited new fury in him.</i>
inflamm	Become inflamed get sore. <i>His throat inflamed.</i>
<u>kindle</u>	Arouse or inspire (an emotion or feeling). <i>The setting sun kindled the sky with oranges and reds.</i>

light	Make lighter or brighter. <i>Misfortune lighted upon him.</i>
redde	Make red. <i>The setting sun reddened the sky.</i>
set alight	Estimate.
set fire to	Become gelatinous.
set light to	Locate.
set on fire	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
shine	Make a surface shine. <i>His shoes were shined to perfection.</i>
sparkle	Shine brightly with flashes of light. <i>The musical performance sparkled.</i>
touch off	To extend as far as.

afire	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>The whole mill was afire.</i>
aflame	In flames; burning. <i>Even the car s tires were aflame.</i>
alight	Descend from a train, bus, or other form of transport. <i>Candles alight on the tables.</i>
blacken	Make or become black or dark, especially as a result of burning, decay, or bruising. <i>The cook blackened the chicken breast.</i>
blaze	Indicate by marking trees with blazes. <i>He blazed a drive into the rough.</i>
burn	Cause to burn or combust. <i>Burn garbage.</i>
burning	The act of burning something. <i>The burning question of independence.</i>
char	Material that has been charred. <i>She trimmed the char from the wicks of the oil lamps.</i>
combustion	The process of burning something. <i>A large combustion plant.</i>
douse	Pour a liquid over; drench. <i>He doused the car with petrol and set it on fire.</i>
extinguish	Extinguish by crushing. <i>Socialism extinguished these archaic customs.</i>
fiery	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>Fiery oratory.</i>
fire	Drive out or away by or as if by fire. <i>They sat by the fire and talked.</i>
firefighter	A member of a fire department who tries to extinguish fires.
firework	An outburst of anger, or a display of great skill or energy. <i>A firework display.</i>
flaming	Passionate or violent. <i>A flaming row.</i>
flare	Become flared and widen usually at one end. <i>Tempers flared at the meeting.</i>
furor	A sudden outburst (as of protest).
glisten	Be shiny, as if wet. <i>There was a glisten of perspiration across her top lip.</i>

glow	The phenomenon of light emission by a body as its temperature is raised. <i>The setting sun cast a deep red glow over the city.</i>
ignite	Start or maintain a fire in. <i>He lit a cigarette which ignited the petrol fumes.</i>
pyrotechnic	(usually plural) a device with an explosive that burns at a low rate and with colored flames; can be used to illuminate areas or send signals etc. <i>A pyrotechnic display.</i>
rekindle	Kindle anew, as of a fire. <i>Rekindle her love.</i>
scorch	A plant disease that produces a browning or scorched appearance of plant tissues. <i>The exposed tree scorched in the hot sun.</i>
sear	Make very hot and dry. <i>Sear the chicken livers in a pan for a few minutes on each side.</i>
singe	Burn (something) superficially or lightly. <i>The fire had singed his eyebrows.</i>
smoulder	Smoke coming from a smouldering fire. <i>The last acrid smoulder of his cigarette.</i>
spark	Emit or produce sparks. <i>A log fire was sending sparks on to the rug.</i>
tinder	Dry, flammable material, such as wood or paper, used for lighting a fire. <i>They slashed down the undergrowth for tinder.</i>
