- *A thing compared to a flame's ability to burn fiercely or be extinguished.*
- *The process of combustion of inflammable materials producing heat and light and (often) smoke.*

- A brilliant orange-red colour like that of flames.

<b>blaze</b>	A light-colored marking. <i>The horse had a <b>blaze</b> between its eyes.</i>
<b>blood red</b>	Temperament or disposition.
<b><u>cardinal</u></b>	A deep scarlet colour like that of a cardinal's cassock. <i>His appointment as <b>cardinal</b>.</i>
<b>carmine</b>	A variable color averaging a vivid red. <i><b>Carmine</b> roses.</i>
<b>cerise</b>	A light clear red colour. <i>A bright <b>cerise</b> suit.</i>

<b>cherry</b>	The tree that bears the cherry. <i>She pulled up the collar of her <b>cherry</b> wool coat.</i>
<b>cherry red</b>	Wood of any of various cherry trees especially the black cherry.
<b>claret</b>	Blood. <i>The prices of 1990 <b>clarets</b>.</i>
<b>claret red</b>	Emotionally charged terms used to refer to extreme radicals or revolutionaries.
<b><u>conflagration</u></b>	An extensive fire which destroys a great deal of land or property. <i>Tinder dry conditions sparked fears of a <b>conflagration</b> in many drought devastated communities.</i>
<b>fergency</b>	Feelings of great warmth and intensity.
<b>feravour</b>	Intense heat. <i>He talked with all the <b>feravour</b> of a new convert.</i>
<b>fire</b>	A fireplace in which a relatively small fire is burning. <i>The whisky lit a <b>fire</b> in the back of his throat.</i>
<b>firestorm</b>	An outburst of controversy. <i><b>Firestorms</b> after a nuclear exchange.</i>
<b>flaming</b>	The process of combustion of inflammable materials producing heat and light and (often) smoke.
<b>holocaust</b>	An act of mass destruction and loss of life (especially in war or by fire). <i>A nuclear <b>holocaust</b>.</i>
<b><u>inferno</u></b>	Hell (with reference to Dante's Divine Comedy). <i>The <b>inferno</b> had swept through the city.</i>
<b><u>intensity</u></b>	The quality of being intense. <i>He adjusted the <b>intensity</b> of the sound.</i>
<b>keenness</b>	A quick and penetrating intelligence. <i>I admired the <b>keenness</b> of his mind.</i>
<b>passion</b>	A state or outburst of strong emotion. <i>Modern furniture is a particular <b>passion</b> of Bill s.</i>
<b>passionateness</b>	A strong feeling or emotion.
<b>ruby</b>	A transparent piece of ruby that has been cut and polished and is valued as a precious gem. <i>The rich <b>ruby</b> liquid.</i>
<b>ruby red</b>	Red color or pigment; the chromatic color resembling the hue of blood.
<b><u>scarlet</u></b>	Scarlet clothes or material. <i>Papers lettered in <b>scarlet</b> and black.</i>

<b>vermilion</b>	A brilliant red pigment made from mercury sulphide (cinnabar). <i>A lateral stripe of <b>vermilion</b>.</i>
<b>warmth</b>	The sensation caused by heat energy. <i>An agreeable <b>warmth</b> in the house.</i>
<b>wine</b>	A red as dark as red wine. <i>A <b>wine</b> coloured suit.</i>
<b>wine red</b>	Fermented juice (of grapes especially).
<b>wine-coloured</b>	A red as dark as red wine.

<b>be suffused with colour</b>	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
<b><u>beam</u></b>	Express with a beaming face or smile. <i>The fire <b>beamed</b> on their faces.</i>
<b>become red</b>	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
<b>blaze</b>	Indicate by marking trees with blazes. <i>Elijah felt the anger <b>blaze</b> up again.</i>
<b><u>blush</u></b>	Turn red, as if in embarrassment or shame. <i>The girl <b>blushed</b> when a young man whistled as she walked by.</i>
<b>burn</b>	Get a sunburn by overexposure to the sun. <i>They <b>burned</b> the house and his diaries.</i>
<b>colour</b>	Cause a person's skin to change in colour. <i>The foliage will not <b>colour</b> well if the soil is too rich.</i>
<b><u>flare</u></b>	Become flared and widen usually at one end. <i>The controversy <b>flared</b> up again in 2003.</i>
<b>flash</b>	(of a person's eyes) indicate sudden emotion, especially anger. <i>She glared at him her eyes <b>flashing</b>.</i>
<b><u>flush</u></b>	Remove or dispose of an object or substance by flushing. <i>0.3 ml of saline is gently <b>flushed</b> through the tube.</i>
<b><u>glare</u></b>	Look at with a fixed gaze. <i>The moon <b>glared</b> back at itself from the lake's surface.</i>
<b>glow</b>	Shine intensely, as if with heat. <i>Her face <b>glowed</b> when she came out of the sauna.</i>
<b>go red</b>	Be awarded; be allotted.
<b>grow crimson</b>	Grow emotionally or mature.
<b>grow pink</b>	Become larger, greater, or bigger; expand or gain.
<b>grow scarlet</b>	Develop and reach maturity; undergo maturation.
<b><u>ignite</u></b>	Start or maintain a fire in. <i>The words <b>ignited</b> new fury in him.</i>
<b>inflamm</b>	Become inflamed get sore. <i>His throat <b>inflamed</b>.</i>
<b><u>kindle</u></b>	Arouse or inspire (an emotion or feeling). <i>The setting sun <b>kindled</b> the sky with oranges and reds.</i>



<b>light</b>	Make lighter or brighter. <i>Misfortune <b>lighted</b> upon him.</i>
<b>redde</b>	Make red. <i>The setting sun <b>reddened</b> the sky.</i>
<b>set alight</b>	Estimate.
<b>set fire to</b>	Become gelatinous.
<b>set light to</b>	Locate.
<b>set on fire</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
<b>shine</b>	Make a surface shine. <i>His shoes were <b>shined</b> to perfection.</i>
<b><u>sparkle</u></b>	Shine brightly with flashes of light. <i>The musical performance <b>sparkled</b>.</i>
<b>touch off</b>	To extend as far as.

<b>afire</b>	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>The whole mill was <b>afire</b>.</i>
<b>aflame</b>	In flames; burning. <i>Even the car s tires were <b>aflame</b>.</i>
<b>alight</b>	Descend from a train, bus, or other form of transport. <i>Candles <b>alight</b> on the tables.</i>
<b>blacken</b>	Make or become black or dark, especially as a result of burning, decay, or bruising. <i>The cook <b>blackened</b> the chicken breast.</i>
<b>blaze</b>	Indicate by marking trees with blazes. <i>He <b>blazed</b> a drive into the rough.</i>
<b>burn</b>	Cause to burn or combust. <i><b>Burn</b> garbage.</i>
<b>burning</b>	The act of burning something. <i>The <b>burning</b> question of independence.</i>
<b>char</b>	Material that has been charred. <i>She trimmed the <b>char</b> from the wicks of the oil lamps.</i>
<b>combustion</b>	The process of burning something. <i>A large <b>combustion</b> plant.</i>
<b>douse</b>	Pour a liquid over; drench. <i>He <b>doused</b> the car with petrol and set it on fire.</i>
<b>extinguish</b>	Extinguish by crushing. <i>Socialism <b>extinguished</b> these archaic customs.</i>
<b>fiery</b>	Characterized by intense emotion. <i><b>Fiery</b> oratory.</i>
<b>fire</b>	Drive out or away by or as if by fire. <i>They sat by the <b>fire</b> and talked.</i>
<b>firefighter</b>	A member of a fire department who tries to extinguish fires.
<b>firework</b>	An outburst of anger, or a display of great skill or energy. <i>A <b>firework</b> display.</i>
<b>flaming</b>	Passionate or violent. <i>A <b>flaming</b> row.</i>
<b>flare</b>	Become flared and widen usually at one end. <i>Tempers <b>flared</b> at the meeting.</i>
<b>furor</b>	A sudden outburst (as of protest).
<b>glisten</b>	Be shiny, as if wet. <i>There was a <b>glisten</b> of perspiration across her top lip.</i>

<b>glow</b>	The phenomenon of light emission by a body as its temperature is raised. <i>The setting sun cast a deep red <b>glow</b> over the city.</i>
<b>ignite</b>	Start or maintain a fire in. <i>He lit a cigarette which <b>ignited</b> the petrol fumes.</i>
<b>pyrotechnic</b>	(usually plural) a device with an explosive that burns at a low rate and with colored flames; can be used to illuminate areas or send signals etc. <i>A <b>pyrotechnic</b> display.</i>
<b>rekindle</b>	Kindle anew, as of a fire. <i><b>Rekindle</b> her love.</i>
<b>scorch</b>	A plant disease that produces a browning or scorched appearance of plant tissues. <i>The exposed tree <b>scorched</b> in the hot sun.</i>
<b>sear</b>	Make very hot and dry. <i><b>Sear</b> the chicken livers in a pan for a few minutes on each side.</i>
<b>singe</b>	Burn (something) superficially or lightly. <i>The fire had <b>singed</b> his eyebrows.</i>
<b>smoulder</b>	Smoke coming from a smouldering fire. <i>The last acrid <b>smoulder</b> of his cigarette.</i>
<b>spark</b>	Emit or produce sparks. <i>A log fire was sending <b>sparks</b> on to the rug.</i>
<b>tinder</b>	Dry, flammable material, such as wood or paper, used for lighting a fire. <i>They slashed down the undergrowth for <b>tinder</b>.</i>
