### Definitions of "Flatter" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “flatter” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Praise somewhat dishonestly.*
- *Choose to believe something favourable about oneself, typically when this belief is unfounded.*
- *Cause (someone) to feel honoured and pleased.*
- *Give an unrealistically favourable impression of.*
- *Lavish praise and compliments on (someone), often insincerely and with the aim of furthering one's own interests.*
- *(of a colour or a style of clothing) cause (someone) to appear to the best advantage.*
- *Please (the ear or eye).*

<b>admire</b>	Feel admiration for. <i>I <b>admire</b> your courage.</i>
<b>be appropriate to</b>	Form or compose.
<b>become</b>	(of clothing) look good on or suit (someone). <i>What <b>becomes</b> has duration.</i>
<b>benefit</b>	Accord or comport with. <i>As <b>benefits</b> a Quaker he was a humane man.</i>
<b>blandish</b>	Coax (someone) with kind words or flattery. <i>I was <b>blandishing</b> her with imprudences to get her off the subject.</i>
<b>commend</b>	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <i><b>Commend</b> me to my son and bid him rule better than I.</i>

<b><u>compliment</u></b>	Say something to someone that expresses praise. <i>Prince George expected to be <b>complimented</b> with a seat in the royal coach.</i>
<b>delight</b>	Take delight in. <i>They <b>delight</b> in playing tricks.</i>
<b><u>embellish</u></b>	Be beautiful to look at. <i>Followers often <b>embellish</b> stories about their heroes.</i>
<b>enhance</b>	Make better or more attractive. <i>His refusal does nothing to <b>enhance</b> his reputation.</i>
<b>express admiration for</b>	Give expression to.
<b>give pleasure to</b>	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause.
<b>gladden</b>	Make glad or happy. <i>The high childish laugh was a sound that <b>gladdened</b> her heart.</i>
<b>go well with</b>	Have a particular form.
<b><u>grace</u></b>	Be beautiful to look at. <i>He is one of the best players ever to have <b>graced</b> the game.</i>
<b>gratify</b>	Indulge or satisfy (a desire). <i>She was gratified to see the shock in Jim's eyes.</i>
<b>honour</b>	Show respect towards. <i>They <b>honoured</b> their parents in all they did.</i>
<b>look good on</b>	Give a certain impression or have a certain outward aspect.
<b>look right on</b>	Have a certain outward or facial expression.
<b>make someone glad</b>	Assure the success of.
<b>make someone pleased</b>	Reach a goal, e.g.
<b>ornament</b>	Make more attractive by adding ornament colour etc. <i>A jewel to <b>ornament</b> your wife's lovely throat.</i>
<b>pay tribute to</b>	Discharge or settle.
<b><u>please</u></b>	Give pleasure to or be pleasing to. <i>He could do many things if he <b>pleased</b>.</i>
<b>praise</b>	Express one's respect and gratitude towards (a deity), especially in song. <i>We <b>praise</b> God for past blessings.</i>
<b>say nice things about</b>	Express in words.
<b>set off</b>	Insert (a nail or screw below the surface, as into a countersink).
<b>show to advantage</b>	Show in, or as in, a picture.

- *The beauty of the stone flattered the clergyman's eyes.*
- *She was flattering him in order to avoid doing what he wanted.*
- *The fuchsia shade flattered her pale skin.*
- *The final scoreline flattered England.*

## Associations of "Flatter" (30 Words)

<b>acclaim</b>	Clap one's hands or shout after performances to indicate approval. <i>The conference was <b>acclaimed</b> as a considerable success.</i>
<b>acclamation</b>	Enthusiastic approval. <i>The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in <b>acclamation</b>.</i>
<b>admire</b>	Look at (something impressive or attractive) with pleasure. <i>I <b>admire</b> your courage.</i>
<b>adulation</b>	Servile flattery; exaggerated and hypocritical praise. <i>He found it difficult to cope with the <b>adulation</b> of the fans.</i>
<b>applaud</b>	Show approval or praise by clapping. <i>The crowd whistled and <b>applauded</b>.</i>
<b>applause</b>	A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together. <i>They gave him a round of <b>applause</b>.</i>
<b>bravo</b>	A cry of bravo. <i><b>Bravos</b> rang out.</i>
<b>clap</b>	Clap one's hands or shout after performances to indicate approval. <i>As they parted he <b>clapped</b> Owen on the back.</i>
<b>clapping</b>	A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together.
<b>commend</b>	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <i>He was <b>commended</b> by the judge for his courageous actions.</i>
<b>commendable</b>	In an admirable manner. <i>A <b>commendable</b> sense of purpose.</i>
<b>compliment</b>	Congratulations or praise expressed to someone. <i>The manager was heard to <b>compliment</b> the other team's good play.</i>
<b>congratulate</b>	Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement. <i>He had taken the chance to <b>congratulate</b> him on his marriage.</i>

<b>eclat</b>	Enthusiastic approval. <i>The <b>eclat</b> of a great achievement.</i>
<b>encomium</b>	A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly.
<b>enthusiastically</b>	In a lavish or enthusiastic manner. <i>The audience applauded <b>enthusiastically</b>.</i>
<b>eulogize</b>	Praise highly in speech or writing. <i>He was <b>eulogized</b> as a rock star.</i>
<b><u>eulogy</u></b>	A formal expression of praise for someone who has died recently. <i>A <b>eulogy</b> to the Queen Mother.</i>
<b><u>extol</u></b>	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>He <b>extolled</b> the virtues of the Russian peoples.</i>
<b>kudos</b>	An expression of approval and commendation. <i>She was looking for <b>kudos</b> rather than profit.</i>
<b>laud</b>	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>All glory <b>laud</b> and honour to Thee Redeemer King.</i>
<b>laudable</b>	Worthy of high praise. <i><b>Applaudable</b> efforts to save the environment.</i>
<b>laudatory</b>	(of speech or writing) expressing praise and commendation. <i>Enthusiastic and <b>laudatory</b> articles.</i>
<b>ovation</b>	A sustained and enthusiastic show of appreciation from an audience, especially by means of applause. <i>The performance received a thundering <b>ovation</b>.</i>
<b>panegyric</b>	Formally expressing praise. <i>A <b>panegyric</b> on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i>
<b>plaudit</b>	An expression of praise or approval. <i>He acknowledged the <b>plaudits</b> of the crowd.</i>
<b>praise</b>	An expression of approval and commendation. <i>The parents <b>praised</b> their children for their academic performance.</i>
<b>praiseworthy</b>	Deserving approval and admiration. <i>A significant and <b>praiseworthy</b> increase in computer intelligence.</i>
<b>praising</b>	Full of or giving praise.
<b><u>servant</u></b>	A person working in the service of another (especially in the household). <i>The state cannot be a <b>servant</b> of the church.</i>
