<u>acclaim</u>	Praise enthusiastically and publicly. She has won <b>acclaim</b> for her commitment to democracy.
acclamation	Loud and enthusiastic approval. <i>The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in <b>acclamation</b>.</i>
admire	Regard with respect or warm approval. I <b>admire</b> your courage.
adulation	Excessive admiration or praise. <i>He found it difficult to cope with the <b>adulation</b> of the fans.</i>
<u>applaud</u>	Show strong approval of (a person or action); praise. <i>His speech was loudly <b>applaud</b>ed.</i>
applause	A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together. They gave him a round of <b>applause</b> .
bravo	A cry of bravo. <b>Bravo</b> s rang out.
clap	Clap one s hands or shout after performances to indicate approval. Agnes <b>clap</b> ped her hands in glee.
clapping	A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together.
commend	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <b>Commend</b> me to my son and bid him rule better than I.
<u>commendable</u>	In an admirable manner. <i>He showed <b>commendable</b> restraint.</i>
<u>compliment</u>	Present someone with (something) as a mark of courtesy. He <b>compliment</b> ed her on her last physics paper.
congratulate	Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement. Simone wrote to her shortly after her engagement had been announced to <b>congratulate</b> her.



eclat	Brilliant or conspicuous success or effect. Entered with much <b>eclat</b> in a coach drawn by eight white horses.
encomium	A formal expression of praise.
enthusiastically	With enthusiasm; in an enthusiastic manner. The audience applauded <b>enthusiastically</b> .
eulogize	Praise highly in speech or writing. The dead woman was <b>eulogize</b> d at the funeral.
<u>eulogy</u>	A formal expression of praise for someone who has died recently. A <b>eulogy</b> to the Queen Mother.
<u>extol</u>	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>He <b>extol</b>led the virtues of the Russian peoples.</i>
kudos	An expression of approval and commendation. She was looking for <b>kudos</b> rather than profit.
laud	Praise (a person or their achievements) highly. All glory <b>laud</b> and honour to Thee Redeemer King.
laudable	(of an action, idea, or aim) deserving praise and commendation. <i>Laudable</i> motives of improving housing conditions.
laudatory	Full of or giving praise. A <b>laudatory</b> remark.
ovation	A processional entrance into Rome by a victorious commander, of lesser honour than a triumph. <i>The performance received a thundering ovation</i> .
panegyric	Formally expressing praise. A <b>panegyric</b> on the pleasures of malt whisky.
plaudit	An expression of praise or approval. <i>He acknowledged the <b>plaudit</b>s of the crowd</i> .
praise	Express approval of. The parents <b>praise</b> d their children for their academic performance.
praiseworthy	Worthy of high praise. A significant and <b>praiseworthy</b> increase in computer intelligence.
praising	Full of or giving praise.
<u>servant</u>	A person working in the service of another (especially in the household. <i>He was a great servant of the Labour Party.</i>
