Associations of "Flattered" (30 Words)

acclaim	Praise enthusiastically and publicly. <i>She has won acclaim for her commitment to democracy.</i>
acclamation	Loud and enthusiastic approval. <i>The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in acclamation.</i>
admire	Regard with respect or warm approval. <i>I admire your courage.</i>
adulation	Excessive admiration or praise. <i>He found it difficult to cope with the adulation of the fans.</i>
applaud	Show strong approval of (a person or action); praise. <i>His speech was loudly applauded.</i>
applause	A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together. <i>They gave him a round of applause.</i>
bravo	A cry of bravo. <i>Bravos rang out.</i>
clap	Clap one's hands or shout after performances to indicate approval. <i>Agnes clapped her hands in glee.</i>
clapping	A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together.
commend	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <i>Commend me to my son and bid him rule better than I.</i>
commendable	In an admirable manner. <i>He showed commendable restraint.</i>
compliment	Present someone with (something) as a mark of courtesy. <i>He complimented her on her last physics paper.</i>
congratulate	Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement. <i>Simone wrote to her shortly after her engagement had been announced to congratulate her.</i>

eclat	Brilliant or conspicuous success or effect. <i>Entered with much eclat in a coach drawn by eight white horses.</i>
encomium	A formal expression of praise.
enthusiastically	With enthusiasm; in an enthusiastic manner. <i>The audience applauded enthusiastically.</i>
eulogize	Praise highly in speech or writing. <i>The dead woman was eulogized at the funeral.</i>
eulogy	A formal expression of praise for someone who has died recently. <i>A eulogy to the Queen Mother.</i>
extol	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>He extolled the virtues of the Russian peoples.</i>
kudos	An expression of approval and commendation. <i>She was looking for kudos rather than profit.</i>
laud	Praise (a person or their achievements) highly. <i>All glory laud and honour to Thee Redeemer King.</i>
laudable	(of an action, idea, or aim) deserving praise and commendation. <i>Laudable motives of improving housing conditions.</i>
laudatory	Full of or giving praise. <i>A laudatory remark.</i>
ovation	A processional entrance into Rome by a victorious commander, of lesser honour than a triumph. <i>The performance received a thundering ovation.</i>
panegyric	Formally expressing praise. <i>A panegyric on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i>
plaudit	An expression of praise or approval. <i>He acknowledged the plaudits of the crowd.</i>
praise	Express approval of. <i>The parents praised their children for their academic performance.</i>
praiseworthy	Worthy of high praise. <i>A significant and praiseworthy increase in computer intelligence.</i>
praising	Full of or giving praise.
servant	A person working in the service of another (especially in the household). <i>He was a great servant of the Labour Party.</i>
