- (of a person) having a weakness in character.






# Synonyms of "Flawed" as an adjective (11 Words)

blemished	Having a blemish or flaw.
<u>defective</u>	Having a defect. <i>Complaints over <b>defective</b> goods.</i>
<u>distorted</u>	Pulled or twisted out of shape; contorted. <b>Distorted</b> guitars.
<u>erroneous</u>	Containing or characterized by error. Employers sometimes make <b>erroneous</b> assumptions.
fallacious	Based on a mistaken belief. <i>Fallacious</i> reasoning.
<u>faulty</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>Her character was faulty</i> .
imprecise	Not precise. The terms he used were <b>imprecise</b> and emotional.



inaccurate	Not accurate. False or <b>inaccurate</b> descriptions of goods.
<u>incorrect</u>	Not in accordance with particular standards or rules. <i>An incorrect transcription.</i>
<u>unsound</u>	Physically unsound or diseased. This line of argument is <b>unsound</b> .
wrong	Not functioning properly.

### Associations of "Flawed" (30 Words)

blunder

An embarrassing mistake. *We were blundering around in the darkness.* 



defect	An imperfection in an object or machine. <i>Visual <b>defect</b>s.</i>
<u>defective</u>	Markedly subnormal in structure or function or intelligence or behavior. I returned the appliance because it was <b>defective</b> .
demerit	The quality of being inadequate or falling short of perfection. <i>The merits and <b>demerit</b>s of these proposals.</i>
<u>erroneous</u>	Wrong; incorrect. <i>Erroneous</i> conclusions.
<u>error</u>	Part of a statement that is not correct. An <b>error</b> of judgement.
failing	A flaw or weak point. Received <b>failing</b> grades.
fallacious	Containing or based on a fallacy. <i>Fallacious</i> hope.
fallibility	The likelihood of making errors. <i>Technology is not a cure for human <b>fallibility</b>.</i>
fallible	Likely to fail or make errors. I m only a <b>fallible</b> human.
<u>fault</u>	Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults. <i>It was his <b>fault</b> she had died.</i>
<u>faulty</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>Faulty logic.</i>
flaw	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>He had his <b>flaw</b>s but he was still a great teacher.</i>
gaffe	A socially awkward or tactless act. In my first few months at work I made some real <b>gaffe</b> s.
imperfect	The imperfect tense. Drainage here is <b>imperfect</b> .
inaccurate	Not exact. An <b>inaccurate</b> translation.
<u>incorrect</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. Strictly speaking the form of address was <b>incorrect</b> .
inexact	Not quite accurate or correct. An <b>inexact</b> description.



lapse	A decline from previously high standards. A <b>lapse</b> of concentration in the second set cost her the match.
misconceive	Judge or plan badly, typically on the basis of faulty understanding. <i>Criticism of the trade surplus in Washington is misconceived</i> .
mistake	To make a mistake or be incorrect. She made the <b>mistake</b> of thinking they were important.
<u>mistaken</u>	Wrong in e.g. opinion or judgment. An unfortunate case of <b>mistaken</b> identity.
misunderstanding	Putting the wrong interpretation on. A <b>misunderstanding</b> of the government s plans.
oversight	An unintentional omission resulting from failure to notice something. <i>Was the mistake due to oversight.</i>
slip	A reduction in the movement of a pulley or other mechanism due to slipping of the belt rope etc. <i>The effects of slight slip on turns.</i>
solecism	A breach of good manners; an instance of incorrect behaviour.
unforced	Not resulting from undue effort; not forced. An <b>unforced</b> cheerfulness.
unreliable	Liable to be erroneous or misleading. An <b>unreliable</b> trestle.
wrong	Treat unjustly do wrong to. That was <b>wrong</b> of me.
wrongly	In a way that is incorrect or mistaken. My name is spelled <b>wrongly</b> .
