Definitions of "Flawed" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “flawed” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Having a blemish or flaw.*
- *Having or characterized by a fundamental weakness or imperfection.*
- *(of a person) having a weakness in character.*



Synonyms of "Flawed" as an adjective (11 Words)

- blemished** Having a blemish or flaw.
- defective** Having a defect.
*Complaints over **defective** goods.*
- distorted** Pulled or twisted out of shape; contorted.
***Distorted** guitars.*
- erroneous** Containing or characterized by error.
*Employers sometimes make **erroneous** assumptions.*
- fallacious** Based on a mistaken belief.
***Fallacious** reasoning.*
- faulty** Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules.
*Her character was **faulty**.*
- imprecise** Not precise.
*The terms he used were **imprecise** and emotional.*

inaccurate Not accurate.
*False or **inaccurate** descriptions of goods.*

incorrect Not in accordance with particular standards or rules.
*An **incorrect** transcription.*

unsound Physically unsound or diseased.
*This line of argument is **unsound**.*

wrong Not functioning properly.
*Something was **wrong** with the pump.*



Usage Examples of "Flawed" as an adjective

Associations of "Flawed" (30 Words)

blunder An embarrassing mistake.
*We were **blundering** around in the darkness.*

defect	An imperfection in an object or machine. <i>Visual defects.</i>
<u>defective</u>	Markedly subnormal in structure or function or intelligence or behavior. <i>I returned the appliance because it was defective.</i>
demerit	The quality of being inadequate or falling short of perfection. <i>The merits and demerits of these proposals.</i>
<u>erroneous</u>	Wrong; incorrect. <i>Erroneous conclusions.</i>
<u>error</u>	Part of a statement that is not correct. <i>An error of judgement.</i>
failing	A flaw or weak point. <i>Received failing grades.</i>
fallacious	Containing or based on a fallacy. <i>Fallacious hope.</i>
fallibility	The likelihood of making errors. <i>Technology is not a cure for human fallibility.</i>
fallible	Likely to fail or make errors. <i>I m only a fallible human.</i>
<u>fault</u>	Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults. <i>It was his fault she had died.</i>
<u>faulty</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>Faulty logic.</i>
flaw	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>He had his flaws but he was still a great teacher.</i>
gaffe	A socially awkward or tactless act. <i>In my first few months at work I made some real gaffes.</i>
<u>imperfect</u>	The imperfect tense. <i>Drainage here is imperfect.</i>
inaccurate	Not exact. <i>An inaccurate translation.</i>
<u>incorrect</u>	Characterized by errors; not agreeing with a model or not following established rules. <i>Strictly speaking the form of address was incorrect.</i>
inexact	Not quite accurate or correct. <i>An inexact description.</i>

lapse	A decline from previously high standards. <i>A lapse of concentration in the second set cost her the match.</i>
misconceive	Judge or plan badly, typically on the basis of faulty understanding. <i>Criticism of the trade surplus in Washington is misconceived.</i>
mistake	To make a mistake or be incorrect. <i>She made the mistake of thinking they were important.</i>
<u>mistaken</u>	Wrong in e.g. opinion or judgment. <i>An unfortunate case of mistaken identity.</i>
<u>misunderstanding</u>	Putting the wrong interpretation on. <i>A misunderstanding of the government's plans.</i>
oversight	An unintentional omission resulting from failure to notice something. <i>Was the mistake due to oversight.</i>
slip	A reduction in the movement of a pulley or other mechanism due to slipping of the belt rope etc. <i>The effects of slight slip on turns.</i>
solecism	A breach of good manners; an instance of incorrect behaviour.
unforced	Not resulting from undue effort; not forced. <i>An unforced cheerfulness.</i>
unreliable	Liable to be erroneous or misleading. <i>An unreliable trestle.</i>
wrong	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>That was wrong of me.</i>
<u>wrongly</u>	In a way that is incorrect or mistaken. <i>My name is spelled wrongly.</i>
