- *Run away from a place or situation of danger.*
- *Run away from (someone or something).*
- *Run away quickly.*



Synonyms of "Flee" as a verb (29 Words)

abscond	Run away; usually includes taking something or somebody along. <i>The barman absconded with a week's takings.</i>
absent oneself	Go away or leave.
be gone	Form or compose.
beat a hasty retreat	Indicate by beating, as with the fingers or drumsticks.
beat a retreat	Glare or strike with great intensity.
bolt	Secure or lock with a bolt. <i>New benefits have been bolted on to the social security system.</i>
decamp	Run away; usually includes taking something or somebody along. <i>The armies of both chiefs had decamped.</i>
do a disappearing act	Create or design, often in a certain way.
escape	Escape potentially unpleasant consequences get away with a forbidden action. <i>The name escaped him.</i>
escape from	Be incomprehensible to; escape understanding by.

fly

Cause to fly or float.

*All nations **fly** their flags in front of the U N.*

head for the hills

Travel in front of; go in advance of others.

leave

Leave behind unintentionally.

***Leave** the flowers that you see in the park behind.*

leave abruptly

Go and leave behind, either intentionally or by neglect or forgetfulness.

leave hastily

Remove oneself from an association with or participation in.

make a break for it

Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.

make a quick exit

Gather and light the materials for.

make a run for it

Make, formulate, or derive in the mind.

make off

Form by assembling individuals or constituents.

make one's getaway

Make, formulate, or derive in the mind.

make oneself scarce

Institute, enact, or establish.

run

Move about freely and without restraint or act as if running around in an uncontrolled way.

*Does this old car still **run** well.*

run away

Move along, of liquids.

run away from

Direct or control; projects, businesses, etc.

run for it

Change or be different within limits.

run off

Be affected by; be subjected to.

take flight

Take something or somebody with oneself somewhere.

take off

Be a student of a certain subject.

take to one's heels

Interpret something in a certain way; convey a particular meaning or impression.



Usage Examples of "Flee" as a verb

- *He was forced to flee the country.*
- *To escape the fighting, his family fled from their village.*



Associations of "Flee" (30 Words)

apophasis	Mentioning something by saying it will not be mentioned.
<u>asylum</u>	A shelter from danger or hardship. <i>We provide asylum for those too ill to care for themselves.</i>
avoid	Refrain from certain foods or beverages. <i>Gerard avoided meeting his eye.</i>
<u>bypass</u>	An alternative channel created during a bypass operation. <i>I had a bypass last year so have been building up my strength.</i>
circumvent	Avoid or try to avoid fulfilling, answering, or performing (duties, questions, or issues). <i>He s circumvented her with some of his stories.</i>
<u>deflect</u>	Draw someone's attention away from something. <i>She refused to be deflected from anything she had set her mind on.</i>

deviant	A deviant person or thing. <i>Deviant behaviour.</i>
<u>dodge</u>	Move quickly to one side or out of the way. <i>Adam dodged between the cars.</i>
elude	Escape from or avoid (a danger, enemy, or pursuer), typically in a skilful or cunning way. <i>The logic of this eluded most people.</i>
emigration	Migration from a place (especially migration from your native country in order to settle in another). <i>Mass emigration from Ireland to the United States.</i>
escape	Be incomprehensible to escape understanding by. <i>He could think of no way of escape short of rudeness.</i>
escaped	Having escaped especially from confinement. <i>Escaped convicts.</i>
eschew	Deliberately avoid using; abstain from. <i>He appealed to the crowd to eschew violence.</i>
<u>evade</u>	Escape, either physically or mentally. <i>This difficult idea seems to evade her.</i>
<u>exodus</u>	A mass departure of people. <i>The annual exodus of sun seeking Canadians to Florida.</i>
<u>haven</u>	An inlet providing shelter for ships or boats; a harbour or small port. <i>A haven for wildlife.</i>
horrified	Stricken with horror. <i>The horrified spectators.</i>
<u>influx</u>	An arrival or entry of large numbers of people or things. <i>A massive influx of tourists.</i>
migrant	Habitually moving from place to place especially in search of seasonal work. <i>Migrant birds.</i>
<u>ostracize</u>	Expel from a community or group. <i>Ever since I spoke up my colleagues ostracize me.</i>
parry	An act of parrying something. <i>The swords clashed in a parry.</i>
persecution	The act of persecuting (especially on the basis of race or religion). <i>Her family fled religious persecution.</i>
refugee	An exile who flees for safety. <i>A refugee camp.</i>

run	The act of running traveling on foot at a fast pace. <i>The coach put great emphasis on running.</i>
<u>sanctuary</u>	Area around the altar of a church for the clergy and choir; often enclosed by a lattice or railing. <i>A donkey sanctuary.</i>
shambles	A state of total disorder. <i>My career was in a shambles.</i>
<u>shun</u>	Avoid and stay away from deliberately; stay clear of. <i>He shunned fashionable society.</i>
sidestep	A step to one side (as in boxing or dancing). <i>He neatly sidestepped the questions about riots.</i>
undiagnosed	Not diagnosed or having been subject to diagnosis. <i>Some patients have diseases that go undiagnosed and therefore untreated.</i>
<u>veer</u>	An offensive play using a modified T-formation with a split backfield, which allows the quarterback the option of passing to the fullback, pitching to a running back, or running with the ball. <i>The wind veered.</i>
