- *Add more details to something which only exists in a draft or outline form.*

- *Accustom to bloodshed or warfare.*

ham	(Old Testament) son of Noah. <i>Thin slices of ham.</i>
hamburger	A sandwich consisting of a fried cake of minced beef served on a bun, often with other ingredients.
juicy	Lucrative. <i>A juicy apple.</i>
lamb	Of a ewe give birth to lambs. <i>The poor lamb is very upset.</i>
loaf	An item of food formed into an oblong shape and sliced into portions. <i>Meat loaf.</i>
