## Associations of "Flew" (30 Words)

<b>aeronaut</b>	A traveller in a hot-air balloon, airship, or other flying craft.
<b>airman</b>	A member of the RAF below commissioned rank.
<b>aviator</b>	A pair of aviator sunglasses. <i>He has a short grey beard and wears a flannel shirt jeans and <b>aviator</b> glasses.</i>
<b>bee</b>	An insect of a large group to which the honeybee belongs including many solitary as well as social kinds. <i>A sewing <b>bee</b>.</i>
<b>bug</b>	An enthusiastic interest in something. <i>She fears that her conversations were <b>bugged</b>.</i>
<b>butterfly</b>	Having a two lobed shape resembling the spread wings of a butterfly. <i>A <b>butterfly</b> clip.</i>
<b><u>buzz</u></b>	Call with a buzzer. <i>Twenty four hours later Mark was still <b>buzzing</b>.</i>
<b>chirp</b>	Make high-pitched sounds. <i>The <b>chirps</b> and whirrs of insects.</i>
<b>cockroach</b>	A scavenging insect that resembles a beetle, having long antennae and legs and typically a broad, flattened body. Several tropical kinds have become established worldwide as household pests.
<b>croon</b>	A soft, low voice or tone. <i>The female vocalist <b>crooned</b> smoky blues into the microphone.</i>
<b>dragonfly</b>	Slender-bodied non-stinging insect having iridescent wings that are outspread at rest; adults and nymphs feed on mosquitoes etc.
<b><u>flap</u></b>	An act of flapping something typically a wing or arm up and down or from side to side. <i>He wrote on the <b>flap</b> of the envelope.</i>

<b>flea</b>	A small wingless jumping insect which feeds on the blood of mammals and birds. It sometimes transmits diseases through its bite, including plague and myxomatosis.
<b>fledged</b>	Equipped with feathers. <i>A recently <b>fledged</b> bird.</i>
<b>grasshopper</b>	Terrestrial plant-eating insect with hind legs adapted for leaping.
<b>housefly</b>	A common small fly occurring worldwide in and around human habitation. Its eggs are laid in decaying material, and the fly can be a health hazard due to its contamination of food.
<b>hum</b>	A humming noise. <i>The refrigerator is <b>humming</b>.</i>
<b>hustle</b>	Pressure someone into doing something. <i>He <b>hustled</b> his company's oil around the country.</i>
<b>levitate</b>	Be suspended in the air, as if in defiance of gravity. <i>The magician <b>levitated</b> the woman.</i>
<b>mosquito</b>	A slender long-legged fly with aquatic larvae. The bite of the bloodsucking female can transmit a number of serious diseases including malaria and elephantiasis.
<b>moth</b>	A clothes moth. <i>I store my sweaters in plastic bags to protect them from <b>moths</b>.</i>
<b>pilot</b>	Be the pilot of an aircraft or ship. <i>A strike by local airline <b>pilots</b>.</i>
<b>pterodactyl</b>	(in general use) any pterosaur.
<b>pterosaur</b>	An extinct reptile of the Jurassic and Cretaceous having a bird-like beak and membranous wings supported by the very long fourth digit of each forelimb.
<b>twitter</b>	A series of chirps. <i>What a great crowd Perry <b>twittered</b>.</i>
<b>volant</b>	Relating to or characterized by flight. <i>Her sails caught a <b>volant</b> wind.</i>
<b>warble</b>	A lumpy abscess under the hide of domestic mammals caused by larvae of a botfly or warble fly. <i>He <b>warbled</b> in an implausible soprano.</i>
<b>wasp</b>	A solitary winged insect with a narrow waist mostly distantly related to the social wasps and including many parasitic kinds.
<b>wing</b>	Travel on wings or by aircraft fly. <i>Some sportsmen make no scruple about firing into the thick of a <b>wing</b> of plover.</i>
