- A momentary flash of light.
- The act of moving back and forth.
- An unsteady movement of a flame or light causing rapid variations in brightness.

Flicker as a Verb

Definitions of "Flicker" as a verb

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "flicker" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- (of light or a source of light) shine unsteadily; vary rapidly in brightness.
- Shine unsteadily.
- Make small, quick movements.
- Move back and forth very rapidly.
- (of someone's eyes) move quickly in a particular direction in order to look at something.
- (of a flame) burn fitfully, alternately flaring up and dying down.
- (of an emotion) be felt or shown briefly or faintly.
- Flash intermittently.





Synonyms of "Flicker" as a verb (25 Words)

bat Use a bat.

He **bat**ted the flies away.

blink Force to go away by blinking.

The TV announcer never seems to **blink**.

Move in a pattern usually to musical accompaniment do or perform a

dance dance.

The children **dance**d with joy.

flap

Move with a flapping motion.

The bird s wings were **flap**ping.

Become flared and widen usually at one end.

The bonfire crackled and **flare**d up.



Remove with a flick of the hand.

Flick a piece of paper across the table.

flitter Move back and forth very rapidly.

Her fingers **flitter**ed over the sheets.

(of a bird or other winged creature) fly unsteadily or hover by flapping the

flutter wings quickly and lightly.

A couple of butterflies **flutter**ed around the garden.

Shine brightly, like a star or a light.

A terrible thought **gleam**ed in her mind.

glimmer Shine faintly with a wavering light.

The moonlight **glimmer**ed on the lawn.

Give out or reflect small flashes of light.

His eyes **glint**ed angrily.

wear or cut gutters into.

The raindrops **gutter** down her visage.

open and shut Cause to open or to become open.

Cause (something) to make a slight rapid motion.

Juliet's lower lip quivered.

shine Make a surface shine.

Shine the silver please.

Shake slightly and uncontrollably as a result of being cold, frightened, or

shiver excited.

The children are **shiver**ing turn on the heat.

shudder (especially of a vehicle, machine, or building) shake or vibrate violently.

I **shudder**ed with horror.

Experience sudden involuntary muscular contractions; twitch convulsively.

My body **spasm**ed violently.

tremble (of a person's voice) sound unsteady or hesitant.

The earth **tremble**d beneath their feet.

twitch Use a twitch to subdue a horse.

Her lips **twitch**ed and her eyelids fluttered.

. Move continuously and rapidly to and fro.

wibrate

His voice vibrated with terror.

Sway from side to side.

His love for her had never wavered.

wink Signal by winking.

The diamond on her finger **wink**ed in the moonlight.



wobble

(of the voice) vary slightly in pitch; quaver. He is beginning to **wobble** on the issue.



Usage Examples of "Flicker" as a verb

- Amusement flickered briefly in his eyes.
- The candle flickered.
- Her alert hazel eyes flickered around the room.
- Forster's eyes flickered open.
- The candle flickered.
- The candle flickered again.
- Her eyelids flickered.
- The interior lights flickered, and came on.

The mechanism for bringing about ignition in an internal combustion engine

ignition typically activated by a key or switch.

Three minutes after **ignition** the flames were still growing.

A device for lighting or igniting fuel or charges or fires. light

He stepped into the **light**.

Tremble or shake with a slight rapid motion. **quiver**

The bird runs along in a zigzag path **quiver**ing its wings.

Relight (a fire. rekindle

Rekindle hopes.

Give off a shimmering reflection as of silk. **shimmer**

Beech leaves **shimmer**ed in the moonlight.

Make a surface shine. shine

Tonight he will have a chance to **shine** and win a world boxing title.

Emit or produce sparks.

spark The ignition **spark**s as soon as the gas is turned on.



Be lively or brilliant or exhibit virtuosity.

There was a **sparkle** in his eyes.

A rapid change in brightness; a brief spark or flash.

sparkling Sparkling snow.

Dry, flammable material, such as wood or paper, used for lighting a fire.

They slashed down the undergrowth for **tinder**.

tremble Move or jerk quickly and involuntarily up and down or sideways.

I **tremble** to think that we could ever return to conditions like these.

trigger Release or pull the trigger on.

The **trigger** for the strike was the closure of a mine.

twinkle Smile so that one's eyes sparkle. *The distant twinkle of the lights.*

(of a person's eyes) sparkling, especially with amusement.

twinkling Twinkling harbour lights.

wink
An act of winking.
The diamond on her finger winked in the moonlight.
