- *A short or casual relationship.*
- *Behaviour that demonstrates a playful sexual attraction to someone.*
- *Playful behavior intended to arouse sexual interest.*

<b>affair</b>	An event or sequence of events of a specified kind or that has previously been referred to. <i>Commissions were created to advise on foreign <b>affairs</b>.</i>
<b>affair of the heart</b>	A vaguely specified social event.
<b>amour</b>	A usually secretive or illicit sexual relationship. <i>He is enraged at this revelation of his past <b>amours</b>.</i>
<b>coquetry</b>	Flirtatious behaviour. <i>I like the way you laugh he said without <b>coquetry</b>.</i>
<b>dalliance</b>	The deliberate act of delaying and playing instead of working. <i>Berkeley was my last <b>dalliance</b> with the education system.</i>
<b>entanglement</b>	The action or fact of entangling or being entangled. <i>Romantic <b>entanglements</b>.</i>
<b>fling</b>	The act of flinging. <i>One final <b>fling</b> before a tranquil retirement.</i>
<a href="#"><u>flirt</u></a>	A person who habitually flirts. <i>Jim was an outrageous <b>flirt</b>.</i>
<b>flirting</b>	A seductive woman who uses her sex appeal to exploit men.
<b>intrigue</b>	A secret love affair. <i>The cabinet was a nest of <b>intrigue</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>involvement</u></a>	A sense of concern with and curiosity about someone or something. <i>There was additional <b>involvement</b> of the liver and spleen.</i>
<a href="#"><u>liaison</u></a>	Communication or cooperation which facilitates a close working relationship between people or organizations. <i>The head porter works in close <b>liaison</b> with the reception office.</i>
<b>relationship</b>	A relation between people relationship is often used where relation would serve as in the relationship between inflation and unemployment but the preferred usage of relationship is for human relations or states of relatedness. <i>He didn't want his wife to know of the <b>relationship</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>romance</u></a>	Love, especially when sentimental or idealized. <i>The <b>romance</b> from The Gadfly became a popular favourite.</i>
<b>romantic advances</b>	A soulful or amorous idealist.
<b>romantic entanglement</b>	An artist of the Romantic Movement or someone influenced by Romanticism.

teasing

The act of removing tangles from you hair with a comb.

*The parody was just a form of **teasing**.*

**toying**

Any of several breeds of very small dogs kept purely as pets.

**trifling**

The deliberate act of delaying and playing instead of working.

- *She had had plenty of flirtations—now she had fallen in love.*
- *Fabia was in no mood for his light-hearted flirtation.*
- *His brief flirtation with the avant-garde in the 1920s.*





## Associations of "Flirtation" (30 Words)

<b>affair</b>	An event or sequence of events of a specified kind or that has previously been referred to. <i>His time was spent in winding up his <b>affairs</b>.</i>
<b>avaricious</b>	Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. <i>A corrupt and <b>avaricious</b> government.</i>
<b>coltish</b>	Energetic but awkward in one's movements or behaviour. <i>Their impossibly <b>coltish</b> legs.</i>
<b>coquet</b>	Talk or behave amorously, without serious intentions. <i>For a while he <b>coquetted</b> with engineering.</i>
<b>coquette</b>	A flirtatious woman. <i>Her transformation from an ice maiden warrior into a winsome <b>coquette</b>.</i>

<b>dart</b>	A small pointed missile with a feather or plastic flight used in the game of darts. <i>He <b>darted</b> his fierce iron.</i>
<b>dash</b>	Impetuous or flamboyant vigour and confidence; panache. <i>He <b>dashed</b> the plate against the wall.</i>
<b>dilettante</b>	An amateur who engages in an activity without serious intentions and who pretends to have knowledge. <i>A wealthy literary <b>dilettante</b>.</i>
<b>enjoyable</b>	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>They had an <b>enjoyable</b> afternoon.</i>
<b>frisky</b>	Playful like a lively kitten. <i>He bounds about like a <b>frisky</b> pup.</i>
<b>frolicsome</b>	Given to merry frolicking. <i><b>Frolicsome</b> students celebrated their graduation with parties and practical jokes.</i>
<b>humour</b>	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. <i>His tales are full of <b>humour</b>.</i>
<b>joke</b>	Tell a joke speak humorously. <i>I regarded his campaign for mayor as a <b>joke</b>.</i>
<b>lecherous</b>	Given to excessive indulgence in sexual activity. <i>She ignored his <b>lecherous</b> gaze.</i>
<b>libertine</b>	A person, especially a man, who freely indulges in sensual pleasures without regard to moral principles. <i>His image as an unbridled <b>libertine</b> is a total myth.</i>
<b>ogle</b>	A lecherous look. <i>A vaguely erotic <b>ogle</b>.</i>
<b>philander</b>	(of a man) readily or frequently enter into casual sexual relationships with women. <i>Married men who <b>philander</b>.</i>
<b>philanderer</b>	A man who likes many women and has short sexual relationships with them. <i>He was known as a <b>philanderer</b>.</i>
<b>play</b>	Play on an instrument. <i>She <b>played</b> all her money on the dark horse.</i>
<b>playful</b>	Giving or expressing pleasure and amusement. <i><b>Playful</b> children just let loose from school.</i>
<b>playfully</b>	In a light-hearted manner. <i>Lily laughed and <b>playfully</b> slapped him across the chest.</i>

<b>pleasure</b>	A feeling of happy satisfaction and enjoyment. <i>She smiled with <b>pleasure</b> at being praised.</i>
<b>puckish</b>	Naughtily or annoyingly playful. <i>A <b>puckish</b> sense of humour.</i>
<b>quirky</b>	Informal terms; strikingly unconventional. <i>Her sense of humour was decidedly <b>quirky</b>.</i>
<b>repartee</b>	Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies. <i>He had a quick mind and a splendid gift of <b>repartee</b>.</i>
<b>romance</b>	A genre of fiction dealing with love in a sentimental or idealized way. <i>Wartime passion from the master of <b>romance</b>.</i>
<b>sportive</b>	Given to merry frolicking. <i>A <b>sportive</b> man who drank and loved too much.</i>
<b>tease</b>	Tear into pieces. <i>She couldn't resist a gentle <b>tease</b>.</i>
<b>witticism</b>	A witty remark. <i>Maurice roared with laughter at his own <b>witticisms</b>.</i>
<b>woman</b>	A disrespectful form of address to a woman. <i>A daily <b>woman</b>.</i>
