Float as a Noun

Definitions of "Float" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "float" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A light object held for support by a person learning to swim.
- A small vehicle or cart, especially one powered by electricity.
- A cork or buoy supporting the edge of a fishing net.
- A sum of money used for change at the beginning of a period of trading in a shop or stall etc., or for minor expenditures.
- Something that floats on the surface of water.
- The time interval between the deposit of a check in a bank and its payment.



- (in critical path analysis) the period of time by which the duration of an activity may be extended without affecting the overall time for the process.
- An elaborate display mounted on a platform carried by a truck (or pulled by a truck) in a procession or parade.
- The number of shares outstanding and available for trading by the public.
- A hand tool with a flat face used for smoothing and finishing the surface of plaster or cement or stucco.
- An air-filled sac near the spinal column in many fishes that helps maintain buoyancy.
- A hollow or inflated organ enabling an organism (such as the Portuguese man-of-war) to float in the water.
- A small object attached to a fishing line to indicate by moving when a fish bites.
- A soft drink with a scoop of ice cream floating in it.
- A floating device on the surface of a liquid which forms part of a valve apparatus controlling flow in and out of the enclosing container, e.g. in a water cistern or a carburettor.
- A drink with ice cream floating in it.
- A hollow structure fixed underneath an aircraft enabling it to take off and land on water.
- A platform mounted on a truck and carrying a display in a procession.
- A thing that is buoyant in water.
- A hand tool with a rectangular blade used for smoothing plaster.

- Put into the water.
- (of a currency) fluctuate freely in value in accordance with supply and demand in the financial markets.
- Convert from a fixed point notation to a floating point notation.
- Allow (a currency) to float.
- (in sport) make (the ball) travel lightly and effortlessly through the air.
- Rest or move on or near the surface of a liquid without sinking.
- Circulate or discuss tentatively; test the waters with.



- Set afloat.
- Put forward (an idea) as a suggestion or test of reactions.
- Move in a casual or leisurely way.
- Be in motion due to some air or water current.
- Be afloat either on or below a liquid surface and not sink to the bottom.
- Move or hover slowly and lightly in a liquid or the air; drift.
- Move lightly, as if suspended.
- Make the surface of level or smooth.
- Offer the shares of (a company) for sale on the stock market for the first time.

launch	Launch for the first time launch on a maiden voyage. The ship was launch ed in 1843 by Prince Albert.
levitate	Be suspended in the air, as if in defiance of gravity. <i>The guru claimed that he could levitate</i> .




moot	Raise (a question or topic) for discussion; suggest (an idea or possibility. The scheme was first moot ed last October.
move	Move so as to change position perform a nontranslational motion. I beg to move that this House deplores the government s economic policies.
offer	Offer verbally. The hotel offer s private meeting rooms.
<u>posit</u>	Put in position place. These plots are posit ed on a false premise about women s nature as inferior.
present	Bring forward and present to the mind. The commencement speaker present ed a forceful speech that impressed the students.
proffer	Hold out or put forward (something) to someone for acceptance. She proffer ed a glass of wine.
promote	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. They were promote d from the Third Division last season.
<u>propose</u>	Propose or intend. She propose d a new theory of relativity.
put forward	Make an investment.
raise	Multiply a number by itself a specified number of times 8 is 2 raised to the power 3. The piece raise s the ghosts of a number of twentieth century ideas.
sail	Travel in a ship or boat using sails or engine power. We sail ed the Atlantic.
sell	Sell all of one s stock of something. It was clear that the performances would not sell out.
set up	Arrange attractively.
<u>slide</u>	Move obliquely or sideways, usually in an uncontrolled manner. I quickly slid into a seat at the back of the hall.
slip	Go or move quietly or quickly, without attracting notice. <i>Slip</i> into something comfortable.
stay afloat	Fasten with stays.
stay on the surface	Stop or halt.
<u>stream</u>	To extend, wave or float outward, as if in the wind. She sat with tears stream ing down her face.



<u>submit</u>	Accept or yield to a superior force or to the authority or will of another person. Samples submit ted to low pressure while being airfreighted.
<u>suggest</u>	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. I suggest that we wait a day or two.
<u>swim</u>	Cross a particular stretch of water by swimming. He swim s thirty lengths twice a week.
table	Present formally for discussion or consideration at a meeting. I d like the issue to be table d for the next few months.
test the popularity of	Examine someone's knowledge of something.
travel	Travel upon or across. Travel the oceans.
waft	(with reference to a scent, sound, etc.) pass or cause to pass gently through the air. The smell of stale fat waft ed out from the cafe.

<u>hover</u>	Hang over, as of something threatening, dark, or menacing. You can hover your cursor over any button to see an explanation.
lifeboat	A small boat kept on a ship for use in emergency, typically one of a number on deck or suspended from davits.
loch	Scottish word for a lake. <i>Loch</i> Lomond.
offshore	Relating to the business of extracting oil or gas from the seabed. The trainees will eventually work offshore .
<u>pool</u>	Something resembling a pool of liquid. Everyone contributed to the pool .
raft	Transport on or as if on a raft. The stores were raft ed ashore.
resurface	Reappear on the surface. He resurface d under a false identity in Australia.
<u>river</u>	A large natural stream of water flowing in a channel to the sea a lake or another river. Great river s of molten lava.
<u>sea</u>	A roughly definable area of the sea. There was still some sea running.



surf	Ride a wave towards the shore on a surfboard. He fell to his death while surf ing on a 70 mph train.
surfing	The activity of moving from page to page or site to site on the World Wide Web. <i>Why share your internet connection with people</i> surfing <i>and chatting.</i>
