<b>deal</b>	The set of hands dealt to the players. <i>The captain was entrusted with the <b>deal</b> of provisions.</i>
<b>drove</b>	A moving crowd.
<b>flight</b>	A formation of aircraft in flight. <i>The enemy were now in <b>flight</b>.</i>
<b>flood</b>	The act of flooding filling to overflowing. <i>A <b>flood</b> of requests.</i>
<b>fold</b>	The act of folding. <i>The house lay in a <b>fold</b> of the hills.</i>
<b>gathering</b>	The act of gathering something. <i>A family <b>gathering</b>.</i>
<b>good deal</b>	Articles of commerce.
<b>great deal</b>	A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field.
<b>group</b>	A division of an air force, usually consisting of two or more stations. <i>The largest newspaper <b>group</b> in the UK.</i>
<b>hatful</b>	A large number or amount or extent.
<b>heap</b>	An amount of a particular loose substance. <i>A <b>heap</b> of gravel.</i>
<b>herd</b>	A group of cattle or sheep or other domestic mammals all of the same kind that are herded by humans. <i>He is not of the common <b>herd</b>.</i>

<b>horde</b>	A small loosely knit social group typically consisting of about five families. <i>A <b>horde</b> of beery rugby fans.</i>
<b>host</b>	A person who acts as host at formal occasions makes an introductory speech and introduces other speakers. <i>Your <b>host</b> is Stuart Macmillan.</i>
<b>large number</b>	A garment size for a large person.
<b>lot</b>	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>He will need a second <b>lot</b> of tills to handle the second currency.</i>
<b>mass</b>	A large amount of material. <i>Stellar objects of intermediate <b>mass</b>.</i>
<b>mess</b>	A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>The house was a <b>mess</b>.</i>
<b>mickle</b>	A large amount.
<b>mint</b>	A peppermint sweet. <i>Dickie pulled out a packet of <b>mints</b> from his pocket.</i>
<b>mob</b>	A flock or herd of animals. <i>A <b>mob</b> of cattle.</i>
<b>mountain</b>	A large natural elevation of the earth's surface rising abruptly from the surrounding level; a large steep hill. <i>A <b>mountain</b> peak.</i>
<b>muckle</b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent.
<b>multitude</b>	The state of being numerous. <i>Father Peter addressed the <b>multitude</b>.</i>
<b>pack</b>	A convenient package or parcel as of cigarettes or film. <i>The reports were a <b>pack</b> of lies.</i>
<b>passel</b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>See the rest of the winners in our huge <b>passel</b> of photos.</i>
<b>peck</b>	A United States dry measure equal to 8 quarts or 537.605 cubic inches. <i>The bird managed to give its attacker a sharp <b>peck</b>.</i>
<b>pile</b>	A heap of things laid or lying one on top of another. <i>He s making <b>piles</b> of money.</i>
<b>plenty</b>	A situation in which food and other necessities are available in sufficiently large quantities. <i>Such natural phenomena as famine and <b>plenty</b>.</i>
<b>press</b>	Any machine that exerts pressure to form or shape or cut materials or extract liquids or compress solids. <i>The <b>press</b> of business matters.</i>

<b>rabble</b>	A large group of butterflies. <i>He was met by a <b>rabble</b> of noisy angry youths.</i>
<b>raft</b>	A flat float (usually made of logs or planks) that can be used for transport or as a platform for swimmers. <i>Great <b>rafts</b> of cormorants often 5 000 strong.</i>
<u><b>sea</b></u>	Used to refer to waves as opposed to calm sea. <i>A ban on dumping radioactive wastes in the <b>sea</b>.</i>
<b>sight</b>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>They went to Paris to see the <b>sights</b>.</i>
<u><b>slew</b></u>	A violent or uncontrollable sliding movement. <i>I was assaulted by the thump and <b>slew</b> of the van.</i>
<b>spate</b>	A large number of similar things coming in quick succession. <i>A <b>spate</b> of attacks on holidaymakers.</i>
<u><b>stack</b></u>	A pile of objects, typically one that is neatly arranged. <i>The demand for items from the <b>stacks</b>.</i>
<u><b>stream</b></u>	The act of flowing or streaming continuous progression. <i>He felt a <b>stream</b> of air.</i>
<u><b>swarm</b></u>	A large or dense group of flying insects. <i>A <b>swarm</b> of journalists.</i>
<b>throng</b>	A large, densely packed crowd of people or animals. <i>He pushed his way through the <b>throng</b>.</i>
<b>tidy sum</b>	Receptacle that holds odds and ends (as sewing materials).
<b>troop</b>	A group of people or animals of a particular kind. <i>A <b>troop</b> of musicians.</i>

## Synonyms of "Flock" as a verb (31 Words)

<b>amass</b>	Gather together or accumulate (a large amount or number of material or things) over a period of time. <i>The soldiers were <b>amassing</b> from all parts of Spain.</i>
<b><u>assemble</u></b>	Get people together. <i>The males <b>assemble</b> and hang by their front legs within a yard or two of the female.</i>
<b><u>bunch</u></b>	Form into a bunch. <i>The bedclothes had <b>bunched</b> up around his waist.</i>
<b>clump</b>	Form a clump or clumps. <i>The particles tend to <b>clump</b> together.</i>
<b><u>cluster</u></b>	Gather or cause to gather into a cluster. <i>There were dozens of people <b>clustered</b> around me.</i>
<b>collect</b>	Gather or collect. <i>He <b>collected</b> their rent each week.</i>



<b>come together</b>	Develop into.
<b>congregate</b>	Come together, usually for a purpose. <i>The crowds <b>congregated</b> in front of the Vatican on Christmas Eve.</i>
<b>constellate</b>	Form a constellation or cluster. <i>Their stories were never <b>constellated</b>.</i>
<b>convene</b>	Call together. <i>The committee had <b>convened</b> for its final plenary session.</i>
<b>converge</b>	(of a number of things) gradually change so as to become similar or develop something in common. <i>The crowd <b>converged</b> on the movie star.</i>
<b>crowd</b>	Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>Rampant plants will <b>crowd</b> out the less vigorous.</i>
<b>gather</b>	Collect or gather. <i>The front is <b>gathered</b> at the waist.</i>
<b>get together</b>	Attract and fix.
<b>go in large numbers</b>	Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life.
<b>group</b>	Put in a group or groups. <i>Growers began to <b>group</b> together to form cooperatives.</i>
<b>herd</b>	Move together like a herd. <i>They live by <b>herding</b> reindeer.</i>
<b>huddle</b>	Crouch or curl up. <i>A man with his clothes all <b>huddled</b> on anyhow.</i>
<b>mass</b>	Join together into a mass or collect or form a mass. <i>Crowds were <b>massing</b> outside the palace.</i>
<b>meet</b>	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>The committee <b>meets</b> once a fortnight.</i>
<b>mill</b>	Grind with a mill. <i><b>Mill</b> a coin.</i>
<b>muster</b>	(of troops) gather for inspection or in preparation for battle. <i>Reporters <b>mustered</b> outside her house.</i>
<b>rally</b>	Drive in a rally. <i>The king escaped to Perth to <b>rally</b> his own forces.</i>
<b>rendezvous</b>	Meet at a rendezvous. <i>I <b>rendezvoused</b> with Bea as planned.</i>
<b>seethe</b>	(of a crowd of people) move in a rapid or hectic way. <i>The grey ocean <b>seethed</b>.</i>

**spill**

Let (wind) out of a sail, typically by slackening the sheets.  
*Students began to **spill** out of the building.*

**stream**

Put (schoolchildren) in groups of the same age and ability to be taught together.  
*His nose **streamed** blood.*

**surge**

Rise or move forward.  
*The army **surged** forward.*

**swarm**

Of flying insects move in or form a swarm.  
*A plague of locusts **swarmed** across the countryside.*

**throng**

Flock or be present in great numbers.  
*The pavements are **thronged** with people.*

**troop**

Move or march as if in a crowd.  
*They children **trooped** into the room.*

<b>crowd</b>	Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>Men in straw boaters and waxed mustaches <b>crowded</b> the verandah.</i>
<b>gathered</b>	Brought together in one place. <i>The <b>gathered</b> folds of the skirt.</i>
<b>gathering</b>	The act of gathering something. <i>A family <b>gathering</b>.</i>
<b>heap</b>	Form a heap. <i><b>Heaped</b> up in one corner was a pile of junk.</i>
<b>herd</b>	Move together like a herd. <i>I dodged <b>herds</b> of joggers.</i>
<b>hive</b>	A beehive. <i>He <b>hived</b> lots of information.</i>
<b>horde</b>	A small loosely knit social group typically consisting of about five families. <i>A <b>horde</b> of beery rugby fans.</i>
<b>jam</b>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>Four of us were <b>jammed</b> in one compartment.</i>
<b>lot</b>	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>I feel a whole <b>lot</b> better.</i>
<b>mob</b>	An association of criminals. <i>He stood out from the rest of the <b>mob</b> with his silver hair and stacked shoes.</i>
<b>multitude</b>	The state of being numerous. <i>A <b>multitude</b> of medical conditions are due to being overweight.</i>
<b>pile</b>	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>She <b>piled</b> all the groceries on the counter.</i>
<b>plenitude</b>	A full supply. <i>An ancient Celtic god thought to bring a <b>plenitude</b> of wealth or food.</i>
<b>plurality</b>	The number by which plurality exceeds the number of votes cast for the candidate placed second. <i>A <b>plurality</b> of religions.</i>
<b>shepherd</b>	Tend sheep as a shepherd. <i>It was she who <b>shepherded</b> the library through the current transition.</i>
<b>stack</b>	Arrange in stacks. <i>He spent most of the time <b>stacking</b> shelves.</i>

**stacked** (of a number of things) put or arranged in a stack or stacks.  
*A **stacked** deck of a political system.*

**swarm** Of flying insects move in or form a swarm.  
*A **swarm** of insects obscured the light.*

**teem** Be teeming be abuzz.  
*Every garden is **teeming** with wildlife.*

**throng** A large, densely packed crowd of people or animals.  
*A crowd **thronged** the station.*

**ton** A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft.  
*All of a sudden I had **tons** of friends.*
