Synonyms of "Flooded" as an adjective (4 Words)

- afloat** Out of debt or difficulty.
*The canoes were still **afloat**.*
- awash** Level with the surface of water so that it just washes over.
*The city was **awash** with journalists.*
- inundated** Covered with water.
***Inundated** farmlands.*
- overflowing** Flooding or flowing over a surface or area.
*An **overflowing** river swamped dozens of villages.*

Associations of "Flooded" (30 Words)

absorb	Take in and understand fully (information, ideas, or experience). <i>Absorb the costs for something.</i>
adrift	So as to be no longer fixed in position. <i>The team are three points adrift of the leaders.</i>
<u>afloat</u>	Floating in water; not sinking. <i>There are various rumours afloat connected with his disappearance.</i>
<u>aimless</u>	Aimlessly drifting. <i>An aimless existence.</i>
awash	Level with the surface of water so that it just washes over. <i>The city was awash with journalists.</i>
<u>damp</u>	Damp air or atmosphere. <i>She tried to damp down her feelings of despair.</i>

dampness	A slight wetness. <i>The dampness in the air.</i>
deluge	Overwhelm with a flood. <i>A deluge of rain hit the plains.</i>
<u>drenched</u>	Abundantly covered or supplied with; often used in combination. <i>Moon drenched meadows.</i>
floating	Borne up by or suspended in a liquid. <i>A floating platform.</i>
<u>foggy</u>	Full of or characterized by fog. <i>A dark and foggy night.</i>
<u>humid</u>	Marked by a relatively high level of water vapour in the atmosphere. <i>Humid air.</i>
humidity	Atmospheric moisture. <i>The temperature is seventy seven the humidity in the low thirties.</i>
impassable	Incapable of being passed. <i>The narrow channels are impassable to ocean going ships.</i>
lowland	Low level country. <i>Lowland farming.</i>
marshland	Land consisting of marshes. <i>Thousands of acres of marshland.</i>
marshy	Soft and watery. <i>The marshy ground towards the sea.</i>
<u>moist</u>	(of a climate) rainy. <i>Her brother s eyes became moist.</i>
moisture	Water or other liquid diffused in a small quantity as vapour, within a solid, or condensed on a surface. <i>In freshly felled wood the moisture content varies.</i>
rain	Of the sky the clouds etc send down rain. <i>She rained blows on to him.</i>
<u>saturated</u>	Denoting fats containing a high proportion of fatty acid molecules without double bonds considered to be less healthy in the diet than unsaturated fats. <i>A saturated solution.</i>
sink	Cause to sink. <i>You can relax on the veranda as the sun sinks low.</i>
<u>soaked</u>	Extremely wet; saturated. <i>Rain soaked streets.</i>
splashing	The act of splashing a liquid substance on a surface.

sponge	Soak up with a sponge. <i>He edged closer clearly intending to sponge money from her.</i>
<u>submerge</u>	Completely cover or obscure. <i>The U boat had had time to submerge.</i>
tropics	The part of the Earth's surface between the Tropic of Cancer and the Tropic of Capricorn; characterized by a hot climate.
vapor	The process of becoming a vapor.
water	The surface of an area of water. <i>A water sign.</i>
<u>wet</u>	Wetness caused by water. <i>She said she d wet the tea immediately because they must be parched.</i>
