### Definitions of "Fluent" as an adjective

- *Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively.*
- *(of a foreign language) spoken accurately and with facility.*
- *Smoothly graceful and effortless.*
- *Able to speak or write a particular foreign language easily and accurately.*
- *Able to express oneself easily and articulately.*

<b>articulate</b>	Consisting of segments held together by joints. <i>Delicate <b>articulate</b> plants with a slender central stem.</i>
<b>cogent</b>	(of an argument or case) clear, logical, and convincing. <i>The newspaper s lawyers must prepare a <b>cogent</b> appeal.</i>
<b><u>coherent</u></b>	Forming a unified whole. <i>Two <b>coherent</b> sheets.</i>
<b><u>communicative</u></b>	Able or tending to communicate- W.M.Thackeray. <i>The <b>communicative</b> process in literary texts.</i>
<b>continuous</b>	Forming an unbroken whole; without interruption. <i>A <b>continuous</b> row of warehouses.</i>
<b>easy</b>	Affording comfort. <i>An <b>easy</b> victim.</i>

<b>effortless</b>	Requiring or apparently requiring no effort. <i>Each skill is practised to the point that it becomes <b>effortless</b>.</i>
<b>eloquent</b>	Fluent or persuasive in speaking or writing. <i>An <b>eloquent</b> speech.</i>
<u><b>expressive</b></u>	Characterized by expression. <i>She has big <b>expressive</b> eyes.</i>
<u><b>facile</b></u>	Ignoring the true complexities of an issue; superficial. <i><b>Facile</b> generalizations.</i>
<u><b>fluid</b></u>	Characteristic of a fluid capable of flowing and easily changing shape. <i>A <b>fluid</b> situation fraught with uncertainty.</i>
<b>illuminating</b>	Tending to increase knowledge or dissipate ignorance. <i>The author offers <b>illuminating</b> insights into the ways in which literature has been shaped by the environment it portrays.</i>
<u><b>liquid</b></u>	Having ready cash or liquid assets. <i>The <b>liquid</b> song of a robin.</i>
<b>natural</b>	Existing in or in conformity with nature or the observable world neither supernatural nor magical. <i>A <b>natural</b> pearl.</i>
<u><b>silver</b></u>	Made from or largely consisting of silver. <i>Repeated scrubblings have given the wood a <b>silvery</b> sheen.</i>
<b>silver-tongued</b>	Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively.
<u><b>smooth</b></u>	Without breaks between notes smooth and connected. <i>Cook gently until the sauce is <b>smooth</b>.</i>
<b>smooth-spoken</b>	Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively.
<u><b>unbroken</b></u>	Marked by continuous or uninterrupted extension in space or time or sequence. <i>A night of sleep <b>unbroken</b> by nightmares.</i>
<b>uninterrupted</b>	Having undisturbed continuity. <i>An <b>uninterrupted</b> flow of traffic.</i>

<b>eloquence</b>	Fluent or persuasive speaking or writing. <i>A preacher of great power and <b>eloquence</b>.</i>
<b>eloquent</b>	Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively. <i>An <b>eloquent</b> speech.</i>
<b>eloquently</b>	In an articulate manner. <i>He expressed his ideas <b>eloquently</b>.</i>
<b>enunciate</b>	Speak, pronounce, or utter in a certain way. <i>She <b>enunciated</b> each word slowly.</i>
<b>eulogy</b>	A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly, especially a tribute to someone who has just died. <i>A <b>eulogy</b> to the Queen Mother.</i>
<b>facile</b>	Superficially impressive, but lacking depth and attention to the true complexities of a subject. <i>A <b>facile</b> seven lengths victory.</i>
<b>flowing</b>	(especially of long hair or clothing) hanging or draping loosely and gracefully. <i>The <b>flowing</b> curves of the lawn.</i>
<b>formulate</b>	Put into words or an expression. <i>He <b>formulated</b> his concerns to the board of trustees.</i>
<b>glib</b>	(of words or a speaker) fluent but insincere and shallow. <i>The <b>glib</b> phrases soon roll off the tongue.</i>
<b>interlocutor</b>	A person who takes part in a dialogue or conversation.
<b>narrator</b>	A person who narrates something, especially a character who recounts the events of a novel or narrative poem. <i>A first person <b>narrator</b>.</i>
<b>oration</b>	The style or manner in which an oration is given. <i>Pericles famous funeral <b>oration</b>.</i>
<b>orator</b>	An official speaking for a university on ceremonial occasions. <i>A theatrically effective <b>orator</b>.</i>
<b>oratory</b>	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a society of priests without vows, especially the Oratory of St Philip Neri founded in 1564. <i>He loved the sound of his own <b>oratory</b>.</i>
<b>persuasive</b>	Intended or having the power to induce action or belief. <i>An informative and <b>persuasive</b> speech.</i>
<b>recitation</b>	A regularly scheduled session as part of a course of study. <i>The program included songs and <b>recitations</b> of well loved poems.</i>

<b>remark</b>	Notice or comment. <i>I decided to ignore his rude <b>remarks</b>.</i>
<b>rhetorician</b>	An expert in formal rhetoric. <i>They re ready to listen to any smooth tongued <b>rhetorician</b>.</i>
<u><b>smooth</b></u>	Make smooth or smoother as if by rubbing. <i>Graphics are excellent with fast <b>smooth</b> scrolling.</i>
<u><b>speaker</b></u>	The presiding officer in a legislative assembly, especially the House of Commons. <i>Our guest <b>speaker</b> will give an audiovisual presentation.</i>
<b>speech</b>	A person's style of speaking. <i>He gave a <b>speech</b> about the company.</i>
<b>talker</b>	Someone who expresses in language; someone who talks (especially someone who delivers a public speech or someone especially garrulous). <i>I was the <b>talker</b> of the group.</i>
<u><b>utter</b></u>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i><b>Utter</b> nonsense.</i>
<u><b>verbalize</b></u>	Articulate; either verbally or with a cry, shout, or noise. <i>This lawyer <b>verbalizes</b> and is rather tedious.</i>
<b>vocalize</b>	Express or state clearly. <i>Gillie could scarcely <b>vocalize</b> her responses.</i>
