<b>fluctuating</b>	Having unpredictable ups and downs. <i>A <b>fluctuating</b> level of demand.</i>
<b><u>fluent</u></b>	(of a foreign language) spoken accurately and with facility. <i>A <b>fluent</b> speaker and writer on technical subjects.</i>
<b>inconstant</b>	Likely to change frequently often without apparent or cogent reason; variable- Shakespeare. <i>The most <b>inconstant</b> man in the world.</i>
<b>likely to change</b>	Expected to become or be; in prospect.
<b><u>liquid</u></b>	Having the consistency of a liquid. <i>The <b>liquid</b> song of the birds.</i>
<b>mobile</b>	Relating to mobile phones handheld computers and similar technology. <i>Highly <b>mobile</b> international capital.</i>
<b>natural</b>	Existing in or in conformity with nature or the observable world neither supernatural nor magical. <i>A <b>natural</b> scale.</i>
<b>not fixed</b>	Having a fixed and unchanging value.
<b>not settled</b>	Inhabited by colonists.
<b>open</b>	Full of small openings or gaps. <i>She was copying verses from an <b>open</b> Bible.</i>
<b>open to change</b>	Not defended or capable of being defended.
<b>open-ended</b>	Without fixed limits or restrictions.
<b>runny</b>	Characteristic of a fluid; capable of flowing and easily changing shape. <i>The souffl was hard on top and quite <b>runny</b> underneath.</i>
<b>shifting</b>	Changing position or direction. <i>Taffeta with <b>shifting</b> colors.</i>
<b><u>smooth</u></b>	Smooth and unconstrained in movement. <i>A <b>smooth</b> channel crossing.</i>
<b>subject to change</b>	Likely to be affected by something.



<b><u>unbroken</u></b>	(of farmland) not plowed. <b><i>Unbroken</i></b> land.
<b>uninterrupted</b>	(of a view) unobstructed. An <b><i>uninterrupted</i></b> flow of traffic.
<b><u>unstable</u></b>	Likely to change or fail; not firmly established. The tower proved to be <b><i>unstable</i></b> in the high wind.
<b><u>unsteady</u></b>	Not regular in pitch or rhythm. Nathan pushed the mug into her <b><i>unsteady</i></b> hand.
<b>variable</b>	Marked by diversity or difference. Awards can be for <b><i>variable</i></b> amounts.
<b><u>versatile</u></b>	Changeable; inconstant. His vast and <b><i>versatile</i></b> erudition.

<b>hydrodynamics</b>	Study of fluids in motion.
<b><u>interplay</u></b>	Reciprocal action and reaction. <i>The <b>interplay</b> between inheritance and learning.</i>
<b>kinematics</b>	The branch of mechanics concerned with the motion of objects without reference to the forces which cause the motion.
<b><u>kinetic</u></b>	Supplying motive force. <i>The complex civilization of which Rome was the <b>kinetic</b> center.</i>
<b>lachrymal</b>	Concerned with the secretion of tears. <i>That hysterical then <b>lachrymal</b> then guilt ridden hour.</i>
<b>liquefy</b>	Become liquid. <i>The minimum pressure required to <b>liquefy</b> a gas.</i>
<b>liter</b>	A metric unit of capacity, formerly defined as the volume of one kilogram of pure water under standard conditions; now equal to 1,000 cubic centimeters (or approximately 1.75 pints).
<b>lubricant</b>	Lubricating. <i>The pipe ends had been smeared with <b>lubricant</b>.</i>
<b>lubricate</b>	Make (a process) run smoothly. <i><b>Lubricate</b> the key.</i>

<b><u>melt</u></b>	A quantity of metal melted in one operation. <i>Place under a hot grill until the cheese has <b>melted</b>.</i>
<b>oil</b>	A dark oil consisting mainly of hydrocarbons. <i>A dark discoloured <b>oil</b> of an elderly cleric.</i>
<b>runny</b>	(of a person's nose) producing or discharging mucus. <i>The souffl was hard on top and quite <b>runny</b> underneath.</i>
<b><u>slick</u></b>	A trowel used to make a surface slick. <i>Rangers have been entertaining crowds with a <b>slick</b> passing game.</i>
<b>slippery</b>	Not to be trusted. <i><b>Slippery</b> sidewalks.</i>
<b><u>solvent</u></b>	Capable of meeting financial obligations. <i>An unrivalled <b>solvent</b> of social prejudices.</i>
<b><u>sticky</u></b>	Having the sticky properties of an adhesive. <i>Make your site as <b>sticky</b> as possible to keep visitors there longer.</i>
<b><u>tenacity</u></b>	The quality or fact of continuing to exist; persistence. <i>The <b>tenacity</b> of certain myths within the historical record.</i>
<b><u>viscosity</u></b>	Resistance of a liquid to shear forces (and hence to flow). <i>Cooling the fluid raises its <b>viscosity</b>.</i>
<b>wick</b>	Any piece of cord that conveys liquid by capillary action. <i>The physician put a <b>wick</b> in the wound to drain it.</i>
