Definitions of "Fluke" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “fluke” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A stroke of luck.*
- *An unlikely chance occurrence, especially a surprising piece of luck.*
- *A barb on a harpoon or arrow.*
- *Parasitic flatworms having external suckers for attaching to a host.*
- *Either of the two lobes of the tail of a cetacean.*
- *Flat bladelike projection on the arm of an anchor.*

a twist of fate	A miniature whirlpool or whirlwind resulting when the current of a fluid doubles back on itself.
<u>accident</u>	The working of fortune; chance. <i>The pregnancy was an accident.</i>
chance	The possibility of future success. <i>He played down his chances of becoming chairman.</i>
<u>coincidence</u>	An event that might have been arranged although it was really accidental. <i>The interval determining the coincidence gate is adjustable.</i>
flue	A duct for smoke and waste gases produced by a fire, a gas heater, a power station, or other fuel-burning installation. <i>Flue gases.</i>
good fortune	Articles of commerce.
good luck	Articles of commerce.

trematode A parasitic flatworm of the class Trematoda.

trematode worm A software program capable of reproducing itself that can spread from one computer to the next over a network.

betray	Be gravely disloyal to. <i>Her smile betrayed her true feelings.</i>
bilk	Evade payment to. <i>Some businesses bilk thousands of dollars from unsuspecting elderly consumers.</i>
chance	Be the case by chance. <i>He chanced upon an interesting advertisement.</i>
charge	File a formal charge against. <i>The teacher led her charges across the street.</i>
chimney	A chimney stack. <i>A factory chimney.</i>

cigarette	An object similar to a cigarette containing a narcotic or herbal substance.
damper	A pad silencing a piano string except when removed by means of a pedal or by the note being struck. <i>This will be a damper on the liberal agenda for the next couple of years.</i>
fireplace	A structure surrounding a fireplace. <i>The fireplace was so large you could walk inside it.</i>
flue	Flat bladelike projection on the arm of an anchor. <i>No air rises up the chimney usually because the flue is blocked.</i>
gas	Gas generated in the alimentary canal flatulence. <i>After gassing up the car he went into the restaurant.</i>
hint	Drop a hint intimate by a hint. <i>Handy hints on saving energy in your home.</i>
indication	A datum about some physical state that is presented to a user by a meter or similar instrument. <i>The presence of bacterial infection was an indication for the use of antibiotics.</i>
joke	Tell a joke speak humorously. <i>I regarded his campaign for mayor as a joke.</i>
mantel	A mantelpiece or mantelshelf.
measurement	The action of measuring something. <i>A telescope with which precise measurements can be made.</i>
million	Denoting a quantity consisting of 1,000,000 items or units. <i>There were millions of flies.</i>
mulct	Impose a fine on. <i>No government dared propose to mulct the taxpayer for such a purpose.</i>
number	Add up in number or quantity. <i>Every number has a unique position in the sequence.</i>
pay	Do or give something to somebody in return. <i>You ll pay for this.</i>
pipe	A set of musical pipes joined together as in pan pipes. <i>The hands were piped to breakfast.</i>
scam	A dishonest scheme; a fraud. <i>A guy that scams old pensioners out of their savings.</i>
smoke	Treat fumigate or cleanse by exposure to smoke. <i>His dreams all turned to smoke.</i>
snitch	Someone acting as an informer or decoy for the police. <i>She was snitching a look out of the window.</i>

stub

The part of a check that is retained as a record.
*She **stubbed** out her cigarette in the overflowing ashtray.*

ticket

Provide with a ticket for passage or admission.
*Companies that appeared to have a one way **ticket** to profitability.*

tip

Remove the tip from.
*Sometimes they **tip** the arrows with poison.*

trick

An attempt to get you to do something foolish or imprudent.
*He s a double dealer capable of any mean **trick**.*

vent

The release or expression of a strong emotion, energy, etc.
*We **vent** our spleen on drug barons.*

victim

An unfortunate person who suffers from some adverse circumstance.
***Victims** of domestic violence.*
