- *A substance added to molten metals to bond with impurities that can then be readily removed.*
- *Excessive discharge of liquid from a cavity or organ (as in watery diarrhea).*
- *The action or process of flowing or flowing out.*
- *A substance mixed with a solid to lower its melting point, used especially in soldering*

*and brazing metals or to promote vitrification in glass or ceramics.*

- *The rate of flow of a fluid, radiant energy, or particles across a given area.*
- *A state of uncertainty about what should be done (usually following some important event) preceding the establishment of a new direction of action.*

<b>emission</b>	The release of electrons from parent atoms. <i>Nocturnal <b>emissions</b>.</i>
<b>fickleness</b>	Unfaithfulness by virtue of being unreliable or treacherous. <i>The <b>fickleness</b> of youth.</i>
<b>fitfulness</b>	The quality of being spasmodic and irregular.
<b>flood</b>	The act of flooding filling to overflowing. <i>She burst into <b>floods</b> of tears.</i>
<b>flow</b>	The amount of fluid that flows in a given time. <i>The <b>flow</b> of water into the pond.</i>
<a href="#">fluidity</a>	Smooth elegance or grace. <i>Tactical considerations can change rapidly given the <b>fluidity</b> of the situation.</i>
<b>flux density</b>	In constant change.
<b>fluxion</b>	A function corresponding to the rate of change of a variable quantity; a derivative.
<a href="#">gush</a>	A sudden rapid flow (as of water). <i>A <b>gush</b> of blood.</i>

<b>inconstancy</b>	Unfaithfulness by virtue of being unreliable or treacherous.
<b><u>instability</u></b>	Unreliability attributable to being unstable. <i>She showed increasing signs of mental <b>instability</b>.</i>
<b>irregularity</b>	Behavior that breaches the rule or etiquette or custom or morality. <i>There is evidence that fraud and <b>irregularity</b> continue on a large scale.</i>
<b>issue</b>	Supplies as food or clothing or ammunition issued by the government. <i>He died without <b>issue</b>.</i>
<b>jet</b>	An airplane powered by one or more jet engines. <i>A private <b>jet</b>.</i>
<b>motion</b>	An optical illusion of motion produced by viewing a rapid succession of still pictures of a moving object. <i>The earliest engines had the Gresley conjugated <b>motion</b> for the middle cylinder.</i>
<b>movement</b>	A campaign undertaken by a political social or artistic movement. <i>The succession of flashing lights gave an illusion of <b>movement</b>.</i>
<b>outburst</b>	A volcanic eruption. <i>An <b>outburst</b> of heavy rain.</i>
<b>outflow</b>	A large amount of money, liquid, or people that moves or is transferred out of a place. <i>Capital <b>outflow</b> took place on a very large scale.</i>
<b>outflowing</b>	Something that flows out.
<b>outpouring</b>	An outburst of strong emotion. <i>A massive <b>outpouring</b> of high energy gamma rays.</i>
<b>outrush</b>	A rushing out of something; a violent outflow. <i>He saw an <b>outrush</b> of water as the tide went out.</i>
<b><u>passage</u></b>	A narrow way allowing access between buildings or to different rooms within a building a passageway. <i>An orchestral <b>passage</b>.</i>
<b>roll</b>	Anything rolled up in cylindrical form. <i>His name was struck off the <b>rolls</b>.</i>
<b>rush</b>	A sudden strong demand for a commodity. <i>There was a <b>rush</b> for the door.</i>
<b>spate</b>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>A <b>spate</b> of attacks on holidaymakers.</i>
<b>spurt</b>	A sudden marked burst or increase of activity or speed. <i>Late in the race he put on a <b>spurt</b> and reached second place.</i>

<b>state of flux</b>	The territory occupied by one of the constituent administrative districts of a nation.
<b><u>stream</u></b>	Something that resembles a flowing stream in moving continuously. <i>A woman screamed a <b>stream</b> of abuse.</i>
<b><u>surge</u></b>	A sudden marked increase in voltage or current in an electric circuit. <i>Stimulated a <b>surge</b> of speculation.</i>
<b>sweep</b>	A sweepstake. <i>One fork of the drive continued on to the gravel <b>sweep</b>.</i>
<b><u>swirl</u></b>	The shape of something rotating rapidly. <i><b>Swirls</b> of colour.</i>
<b>tide</b>	Something that may increase or decrease like the tides of the sea. <i>The changing patterns of the <b>tides</b>.</i>
<b><u>torrent</u></b>	An overwhelming outpouring of (something, typically words). <i>A <b>torrent</b> of abuse.</i>
<b>transfer</b>	Transferring ownership. <i>The best student was a <b>transfer</b> from LSU.</i>

<b>unpredictability</b>	Lacking predictability. <i>The constant element of <b>unpredictability</b> keeps the show fresh.</i>
<b>unreliability</b>	Inability to be relied upon or trusted. <i>She causes havoc in the office because of her <b>unreliability</b>.</i>
<b>unsteadiness</b>	The quality of not being steady or securely fixed in place.
<b><u>variability</u></b>	Lack of consistency or fixed pattern; liability to vary or change. <i>Seasonal <b>variability</b> in water levels.</i>
<b>welling</b>	An enclosed compartment in a ship or plane for holding something as e.g. fish or a plane's landing gear or for protecting something as e.g. a ship's pumps.

<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i><b>Combine</b> the flour with the margarine and salt.</i>
<b>commingle</b>	Mix; blend. <i>His humanitarian stance was <b>commingled</b> with a desire for survival.</i>
<b>conflate</b>	Combine (two or more sets of information, texts, ideas, etc.) into one. <i>The urban crisis <b>conflates</b> a number of different economic political and social issues.</i>
<b>flow</b>	Flow or flow in a certain way. <i>The crowd <b>flowed</b> out of the stadium.</i>
<b>fuse</b>	Equip with a fuse provide with a fuse. <i>The two nuclei move together and <b>fuse</b> into one nucleus.</i>
<b>immix</b>	Mix together different elements.
<b>liquefy</b>	Make (a solid substance) liquid, as by heating. <i>The minimum pressure required to <b>liquefy</b> a gas.</i>
<b>liquify</b>	Become liquid or fluid when heated.
<b>meld</b>	Lose its distinct outline or shape; blend gradually. <i>Australia's winemakers have <b>melded</b> modern science with traditional art.</i>
<b>merge</b>	Mix together different elements. <i>The cells <b>merge</b>.</i>
<b>mix</b>	Mix so as to make a random order or arrangement. <i>Music was blaring and there was a DJ in the corner <b>mixing</b> and scratching.</i>

<b>combined</b>	Made or joined or united into one.
<b>commingle</b>	Mix together different elements. <i>His book <b>commingles</b> sarcasm and sadness.</i>
<b><u>conflate</u></b>	Mix together different elements. <i>The urban crisis <b>conflates</b> a number of different economic political and social issues.</i>
<b>consolidation</b>	The action or process of making something stronger or more solid. <i>He dropped the <b>consolidation</b> into the acid bath.</i>
<b>difference</b>	A point or way in which people or things are dissimilar. <i>There were irreconcilable <b>differences</b>.</i>
<b><u>fluctuate</u></b>	Cause to fluctuate or move in a wavelike pattern. <i>The stock market <b>fluctuates</b>.</i>
<b><u>fuse</u></b>	Cause an electrical appliance to stop working when a fuse melts. <i>The crew were left in darkness after the lights <b>fused</b>.</i>
<b>incorporate</b>	Combine (ingredients) into one substance. <i>Some schemes <b>incorporated</b> all these variations.</i>
<b>incorporation</b>	The process of constituting a company, city, or other organization as a legal corporation. <i>The software facilitates the <b>incorporation</b> of active learning in the course.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>A fully equipped laboratory is being <b>integrated</b> into the development.</i>
<b>integration</b>	The intermixing of people who were previously segregated. <i>Economic and political <b>integration</b>.</i>
<b>join</b>	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>They <b>joined</b> up with local environmentalists.</i>

*Australia s winemakers have **melded** modern science with traditional art.*
- merge** Mix together different elements.  
*He crouched low and endeavoured to **merge** into the darkness of the forest.*
- mix** A commercially prepared mixture of ingredients for making a particular type of food or a product such as concrete.  
*Oil and water don t **mix**.*
- solder** Join or fuse with solder.  
*The **soldered** terminal joints.*
- unify** To bring or combine together or with something else.  
*Opposition groups struggling to **unify** around the goal of replacing the regime.*
- unite** Be or become joined or united or linked.  
*The two Germanys officially **united**.*
- united** Used in names of soccer and other sports teams formed by amalgamation.  
*Presented a **united** front.*
- weld** Forge an article by welding.  
*The truck had spikes **welded** to the back.*
