- Obscured by fog.

confused Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity.

The flood of questions left her bewildered and **confused**.

dark

Of a person having dark skin hair or eyes.

Both my father and I are very **dark**.

dazed In a state of mental numbness especially as resulting from shock.

I was left **dazed** and confused.

dim Made dim or less bright.

Dimmed headlights.

Discolored by impurities; not bright and clear is often used in combination.

A dirty or **dingy** white.

dull Very low in saturation; highly diluted.

A large **dull** impassive man.

fogged Obscured by fog.

He could barely see through the **fogged** window.

fuddled Confused or stupefied, especially as a result of drinking alcohol.

Fuddled drinkers spilt their brandy and slid beneath the table.

fuzzy Indistinct or hazy in outline.

Fuzzy fake fur throw pillows.

Filled with melancholy and despondency.

gloomyA **gloomy** corridor badly lit by oil lamps.

Of a person having grey hair.

grey

A man with greyish hair.

Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or

groggy exhaustion.

The sleeping pills had left her feeling **groggy**.

hazy Indistinct or hazy in outline.

It was a beautiful day but quite **hazy**.

Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or

logy exhaustion.

The beer made them **logy** and disinclined to move.

Filled or abounding with fog or mist.

misty The misty evening.

muddled Not arranged in order; untidy.

The **muddled** display of pictures has been taken down.

(of liquid) dark and dirty; not clear.

murky
The sky was murky and a thin drizzle was falling.



muzzy Indistinct or hazy in outline.

A slightly **muzzy** picture.

numb (of a part of the body) deprived of the power of physical sensation.

Too **numb** with fear to move.

numbed So frightened as to be unable to move; stunned or paralyzed with terror;

petrified.

overcast (of the sky or weather) marked by a covering of grey cloud; dull.

A chilly **overcast** day.

smoggy Clouded with a mixture of smoke and fog.

The **smoggy** atmosphere of Los Angeles.

stupefied As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise.

Lay semiconscious stunned or **stupefied** by the blow.

stuporous Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or

exhaustion.

blurred Indistinct or hazy in outline.

Blurred vision.

Unable to perceive clear or sharp images.

Their eyes were **blurry** with tears.



Billow up in the form of a cloud.

<u>cloud</u> Once you are logged in to your **cloud** storage space you can upload files to

it and share them with others.

Lacking definite form or limits.

A **cloudy** liquid.

(psychoanalysis) an unconscious process whereby two ideas or images

condensation combine into a single symbol; especially in dreams.

The cloud is caused by **condensation** in the air.

dew A beaded or glistening liquid resembling dew.

In the morning the grass was wet with dew.

dim Become dim or lusterless.

Their prospects for the future looked fairly **dim**.

Lose consciousness for a short time because of a temporarily insufficient

faint supply of oxygen to the brain.

The fires were **faint**ing there.

Droplets of water vapor suspended in the air near the ground.

The coffee helped clear the **fog** in my brain.

haze Obscure with a haze.

There was a thick **haze** on this October morning.

Indistinct or hazy in outline.

School leavers were often **hazy** about employment.

humid Containing or characterized by a great deal of water vapor.

Humid air.

indistinct Not clearly defined or easy to perceive or understand.

Indistinct shapes in the gloom.

mist Become covered with mist.

The peaks were shrouded in **mist**.

misty (of a colour) not bright; soft.

A few **misty** memories.

moisture Wetness caused by water.

In freshly felled wood the **moisture** content varies.

Clouded as with sediment.

murky

The murky silt of a muddy pond.

nebulous Lacking definition or definite content- Jane Austen.

Nebulous distinction between pride and conceit.

An opaque thing.

Opaque windows of the jail.



rain Of the sky the clouds etc send down rain.

She **rain**ed blows on to him.

(of weather, a period, or an area) having or characterized by considerable

rainy rainfall.

A rainy afternoon.

smog Fog or haze intensified by smoke or other atmospheric pollutants.

Exhaust emissions are mainly responsible for the **smog**.

smoke Emit smoke or visible vapour.

Their salmon and trout are **smoke**d over peat and hand sliced.

Fall as snow.

The first **snow**s of winter.

turbid (of liquids) clouded as with sediment.

The **turbid** estuary.

unclear Poorly stated or described.

Users are still **unclear** about what middleware does.

Lacking clarity or distinctness.

Saw a **vague** outline of a building through the fog.

vapor The process of becoming a vapor.

Wetness caused by water.

The baby was **wet** and needed changing.
