### Definitions of "Foggy" as an adjective

- *Unable to think clearly; confused.*
- *Filled or abounding with fog or mist.*
- *Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion).*
- *Indistinctly expressed or remembered; obscure.*
- *Indistinct or hazy in outline.*
- *Full of or characterized by fog.*
- *Obscured by fog.*



## Synonyms of "Foggy" as an adjective (31 Words)

- befuddled** Stupefied by alcoholic drink.  
*He has an air of **befuddled** unworldliness.*
- benumbed** Having lost or been caused to lose interest because of overexposure.  
*A hoarse shout cut through his **benumbed** senses.*
- bewildered** Perplexed and confused; very puzzled.  
*He saw the **bewildered** look on my face.*
- bleary** Tired to the point of exhaustion.  
***Bleary** eyed business travellers.*
- blurred** Unable to see or be seen clearly.  
*The **blurred** aims of the group.*
- blurry** Perceived or remembered indistinctly.  
*My memories of him are **blurry** at best.*
- brumous** Foggy and wintry.  
*A **brumous** October morning.*

<b>confused</b>	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>The flood of questions left her bewildered and <b>confused</b>.</i>
<b>dark</b>	Of a person having dark skin hair or eyes. <i>Both my father and I are very <b>dark</b>.</i>
<b>dazed</b>	In a state of mental numbness especially as resulting from shock. <i>I was left <b>dazed</b> and confused.</i>
<b>dim</b>	Made dim or less bright. <i><b>Dimmed</b> headlights.</i>
<b>dingy</b>	Discolored by impurities; not bright and clear is often used in combination. <i>A dirty or <b>dingy</b> white.</i>
<b>dull</b>	Very low in saturation; highly diluted. <i>A large <b>dull</b> impassive man.</i>
<b>fogged</b>	Obscured by fog. <i>He could barely see through the <b>fogged</b> window.</i>
<b>fuddled</b>	Confused or stupefied, especially as a result of drinking alcohol. <i><b>Fuddled</b> drinkers spilt their brandy and slid beneath the table.</i>
<b>fuzzy</b>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i><b>Fuzzy</b> fake fur throw pillows.</i>
<b>gloomy</b>	Filled with melancholy and despondency. <i>A <b>gloomy</b> corridor badly lit by oil lamps.</i>
<b>grey</b>	Of a person having grey hair. <i>A man with <b>greyish</b> hair.</i>
<b>groggy</b>	Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion). <i>The sleeping pills had left her feeling <b>groggy</b>.</i>
<b>hazy</b>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>It was a beautiful day but quite <b>hazy</b>.</i>
<b>logy</b>	Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion). <i>The beer made them <b>logy</b> and disinclined to move.</i>
<b>misty</b>	Filled or abounding with fog or mist. <i>The <b>misty</b> evening.</i>
<b>muddled</b>	Not arranged in order; untidy. <i>The <b>muddled</b> display of pictures has been taken down.</i>
<b>murky</b>	(of liquid) dark and dirty; not clear. <i>The sky was <b>murky</b> and a thin drizzle was falling.</i>

- muzzy** Indistinct or hazy in outline.  
*A slightly **muzzy** picture.*
- numb** (of a part of the body) deprived of the power of physical sensation.  
*Too **numb** with fear to move.*
- numbed** So frightened as to be unable to move; stunned or paralyzed with terror; petrified.
- overcast** (of the sky or weather) marked by a covering of grey cloud; dull.  
*A chilly **overcast** day.*
- smoggy** Clouded with a mixture of smoke and fog.  
*The **smoggy** atmosphere of Los Angeles.*
- stupefied** As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise.  
*Lay semiconscious stunned or **stupefied** by the blow.*
- stuporous** Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion).



## Usage Examples of "Foggy" as an adjective

- *A dark and foggy night.*
- *She was foggy with sleep.*



## Associations of "Foggy" (30 Words)

**blur**

Make unclear indistinct or blurred.  
*The day before was a **blur**.*

**blurred**

Indistinct or hazy in outline.  
***Blurred** vision.*

**blurry**

Unable to perceive clear or sharp images.  
*Their eyes were **blurry** with tears.*

<b>cloud</b>	Billow up in the form of a cloud. <i>Once you are logged in to your <b>cloud</b> storage space you can upload files to it and share them with others.</i>
<b>cloudy</b>	Lacking definite form or limits. <i>A <b>cloudy</b> liquid.</i>
<b>condensation</b>	(psychoanalysis) an unconscious process whereby two ideas or images combine into a single symbol; especially in dreams. <i>The cloud is caused by <b>condensation</b> in the air.</i>
<b>dew</b>	A beaded or glistening liquid resembling dew. <i>In the morning the grass was wet with <b>dew</b>.</i>
<b>dim</b>	Become dim or lusterless. <i>Their prospects for the future looked fairly <b>dim</b>.</i>
<b>faint</b>	Lose consciousness for a short time because of a temporarily insufficient supply of oxygen to the brain. <i>The fires were <b>fainting</b> there.</i>
<b>fog</b>	Droplets of water vapor suspended in the air near the ground. <i>The coffee helped clear the <b>fog</b> in my brain.</i>
<b>haze</b>	Obscure with a haze. <i>There was a thick <b>haze</b> on this October morning.</i>
<b>hazy</b>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>School leavers were often <b>hazy</b> about employment.</i>
<b>humid</b>	Containing or characterized by a great deal of water vapor. <i><b>Humid</b> air.</i>
<b>indistinct</b>	Not clearly defined or easy to perceive or understand. <i><b>Indistinct</b> shapes in the gloom.</i>
<b>mist</b>	Become covered with mist. <i>The peaks were shrouded in <b>mist</b>.</i>
<b>misty</b>	(of a colour) not bright; soft. <i>A few <b>misty</b> memories.</i>
<b>moisture</b>	Wetness caused by water. <i>In freshly felled wood the <b>moisture</b> content varies.</i>
<b>murky</b>	Clouded as with sediment. <i>The <b>murky</b> silt of a muddy pond.</i>
<b>nebulous</b>	Lacking definition or definite content- Jane Austen. <i><b>Nebulous</b> distinction between pride and conceit.</i>
<b>opaque</b>	An opaque thing. <i><b>Opaque</b> windows of the jail.</i>

<b>rain</b>	Of the sky the clouds etc send down rain. <i>She <b>rained</b> blows on to him.</i>
<b>rainy</b>	(of weather, a period, or an area) having or characterized by considerable rainfall. <i>A <b>rainy</b> afternoon.</i>
<b>smog</b>	Fog or haze intensified by smoke or other atmospheric pollutants. <i>Exhaust emissions are mainly responsible for the <b>smog</b>.</i>
<b>smoke</b>	Emit smoke or visible vapour. <i>Their salmon and trout are <b>smoked</b> over peat and hand sliced.</i>
<b>snow</b>	Fall as snow. <i>The first <b>snows</b> of winter.</i>
<b>turbid</b>	(of liquids) clouded as with sediment. <i>The <b>turbid</b> estuary.</i>
<b><u>unclear</u></b>	Poorly stated or described. <i>Users are still <b>unclear</b> about what middleware does.</i>
<b><u>vague</u></b>	Lacking clarity or distinctness. <i>Saw a <b>vague</b> outline of a building through the fog.</i>
<b>vapor</b>	The process of becoming a vapor.
<b><u>wet</u></b>	Wetness caused by water. <i>The baby was <b>wet</b> and needed changing.</i>
