- *Indistinctly expressed or remembered; obscure.*
- *Indistinct or hazy in outline.*
- *Full of or characterized by fog.*
- *Obscured by fog.*



Synonyms of "Foggy" as an adjective (31 Words)

befuddled	Stupefied by alcoholic drink. <i>He has an air of befuddled unworldliness.</i>
benumbed	Having lost or been caused to lose interest because of overexposure. <i>A hoarse shout cut through his benumbed senses.</i>
bewildered	Perplexed and confused; very puzzled. <i>He saw the bewildered look on my face.</i>
bleary	Tired to the point of exhaustion. <i>Bleary eyed business travellers.</i>
blurred	Unable to see or be seen clearly. <i>The blurred aims of the group.</i>
<u>blurry</u>	Perceived or remembered indistinctly. <i>My memories of him are blurry at best.</i>
brumous	Foggy and wintry. <i>A brumous October morning.</i>

confused	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>The flood of questions left her bewildered and confused.</i>
dark	Of a person having dark skin hair or eyes. <i>Both my father and I are very dark.</i>
dazed	In a state of mental numbness especially as resulting from shock. <i>I was left dazed and confused.</i>
<u>dim</u>	Made dim or less bright. <i>Dimmed headlights.</i>
<u>dingy</u>	Discolored by impurities; not bright and clear is often used in combination. <i>A dirty or dingy white.</i>
dull	Very low in saturation; highly diluted. <i>A large dull impassive man.</i>
fogged	Obscured by fog. <i>He could barely see through the fogged window.</i>
fuddled	Confused or stupefied, especially as a result of drinking alcohol. <i>Fuddled drinkers spilt their brandy and slid beneath the table.</i>
<u>fuzzy</u>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>Fuzzy fake fur throw pillows.</i>
<u>gloomy</u>	Filled with melancholy and despondency. <i>A gloomy corridor badly lit by oil lamps.</i>
grey	Of a person having grey hair. <i>A man with greyish hair.</i>
<u>groggy</u>	Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion). <i>The sleeping pills had left her feeling groggy.</i>
<u>hazy</u>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>It was a beautiful day but quite hazy.</i>
logy	Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion). <i>The beer made them logy and disinclined to move.</i>
misty	Filled or abounding with fog or mist. <i>The misty evening.</i>
muddled	Not arranged in order; untidy. <i>The muddled display of pictures has been taken down.</i>
<u>murky</u>	(of liquid) dark and dirty; not clear. <i>The sky was murky and a thin drizzle was falling.</i>

muzzy	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>A slightly muzzy picture.</i>
<u>numb</u>	(of a part of the body) deprived of the power of physical sensation. <i>Too numb with fear to move.</i>
numbed	So frightened as to be unable to move; stunned or paralyzed with terror; petrified.
overcast	(of the sky or weather) marked by a covering of grey cloud; dull. <i>A chilly overcast day.</i>
smoggy	Clouded with a mixture of smoke and fog. <i>The smoggy atmosphere of Los Angeles.</i>
stupefied	As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise. <i>Lay semiconscious stunned or stupefied by the blow.</i>
stuporous	Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion).



Usage Examples of "Foggy" as an adjective

- *A dark and foggy night.*
- *She was foggy with sleep.*

blur

Make unclear indistinct or blurred.
*The day before was a **blur**.*

blurred

Indistinct or hazy in outline.
Blurred vision.

blurry

Unable to perceive clear or sharp images.
*Their eyes were **blurry** with tears.*

cloud	Billow up in the form of a cloud. <i>Once you are logged in to your cloud storage space you can upload files to it and share them with others.</i>
cloudy	Lacking definite form or limits. <i>A cloudy liquid.</i>
condensation	(psychoanalysis) an unconscious process whereby two ideas or images combine into a single symbol; especially in dreams. <i>The cloud is caused by condensation in the air.</i>
dew	A beaded or glistening liquid resembling dew. <i>In the morning the grass was wet with dew.</i>
dim	Become dim or lusterless. <i>Their prospects for the future looked fairly dim.</i>
faint	Lose consciousness for a short time because of a temporarily insufficient supply of oxygen to the brain. <i>The fires were fainting there.</i>
fog	Droplets of water vapor suspended in the air near the ground. <i>The coffee helped clear the fog in my brain.</i>
haze	Obscure with a haze. <i>There was a thick haze on this October morning.</i>
hazy	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>School leavers were often hazy about employment.</i>
humid	Containing or characterized by a great deal of water vapor. <i>Humid air.</i>
indistinct	Not clearly defined or easy to perceive or understand. <i>Indistinct shapes in the gloom.</i>
mist	Become covered with mist. <i>The peaks were shrouded in mist.</i>
misty	(of a colour) not bright; soft. <i>A few misty memories.</i>
moisture	Wetness caused by water. <i>In freshly felled wood the moisture content varies.</i>
murky	Clouded as with sediment. <i>The murky silt of a muddy pond.</i>
nebulous	Lacking definition or definite content- Jane Austen. <i>Nebulous distinction between pride and conceit.</i>
opaque	An opaque thing. <i>Opaque windows of the jail.</i>

rain	Of the sky the clouds etc send down rain. <i>She rained blows on to him.</i>
rainy	(of weather, a period, or an area) having or characterized by considerable rainfall. <i>A rainy afternoon.</i>
smog	Fog or haze intensified by smoke or other atmospheric pollutants. <i>Exhaust emissions are mainly responsible for the smog.</i>
smoke	Emit smoke or visible vapour. <i>Their salmon and trout are smoked over peat and hand sliced.</i>
snow	Fall as snow. <i>The first snows of winter.</i>
turbid	(of liquids) clouded as with sediment. <i>The turbid estuary.</i>
<u>unclear</u>	Poorly stated or described. <i>Users are still unclear about what middleware does.</i>
<u>vague</u>	Lacking clarity or distinctness. <i>Saw a vague outline of a building through the fog.</i>
vapor	The process of becoming a vapor.
<u>wet</u>	Wetness caused by water. <i>The baby was wet and needed changing.</i>
