- *People in general (often used in the plural).*



## Synonyms of "Folks" as a noun (2 Words)

**common people** A piece of open land for recreational use in an urban area.

**folk** Folk music.  
*His **folks** still live here.*

- *He wrote to his folks every day.*

| <b>kinsfolk</b>          | People descended from a common ancestor.  |
