common people A piece of open land for recreational use in an urban area.

folk Folk music.
*His **folks** still live here.*



Usage Examples of "Folks" as a noun

- *Folks around here drink moonshine.*
- *He wrote to his folks every day.*



Associations of "Folks" (30 Words)

ancestral	Of or belonging to or inherited from an ancestor. <i>Ancestral home.</i>
<u>befriend</u>	Become friends with. <i>He makes a point of befriending newcomers to Parliament.</i>
<u>brother</u>	A male person who is a fellow member (of a fraternity or religion or other group). <i>A Benedictine brother.</i>
<u>caregiver</u>	A person who helps in identifying or preventing or treating illness or disability.
chieftain	The head of a tribe or clan. <i>Powerful feudal chieftains.</i>
<u>clan</u>	A close-knit group of interrelated families, especially in the Scottish Highlands. <i>New York's garrulous clan of artists.</i>
<u>comrade</u>	(among men) a colleague or a fellow member of an organization. <i>An old college comrade.</i>
dad	One's father. <i>His dad was with him.</i>
daddy	The best or most successful person. <i>The daddy of all potholes.</i>
family	People descended from a common ancestor. <i>The family lived in a large house with a lot of land.</i>
father	Treat with the protective care associated with a father. <i>A culture which has fathered half the popular music in the world.</i>
folk	Folk music. <i>An old folks home.</i>
grandchild	A child of your son or daughter.
grandparent	A parent of one's father or mother; a grandmother or grandfather. <i>It must be a great blessing to have Chloe's grandparents living nearby.</i>
hometown	The town (or city) where you grew up or where you have your principal residence. <i>He never went back to his hometown again.</i>
<u>household</u>	The establishment and affairs of a royal household. <i>It was a good Christian household.</i>

kin	Animals or plants that are related to a particular species or kind. <i>The Acari include ticks mites and their kin.</i>
kindred	Similar in kind; related. <i>Books on kindred subjects.</i>
kinsfolk	People descended from a common ancestor.
mom	One's mother. <i>My mom gave us each a slice of pizza.</i>
mommy	Informal terms for a mother.
<u>parent</u>	Be or act as a parent to a child. <i>Some of the whetstones have been transported up to 400 km from the parent rock.</i>
paternal	Relating to or characteristic of or befitting a parent. <i>He reasserted his paternal authority.</i>
paternity	The act of initiating a new idea or theory or writing. <i>He refused to admit paternity of the child.</i>
patriarchy	A system of society or government in which the father or eldest male is head of the family and descent is reckoned through the male line. <i>We live in a patriarchy.</i>
primogenitor	An ancestor in the direct line.
<u>progenitor</u>	An ancestor in the direct line. <i>The progenitor of modern jazz.</i>
<u>sister</u>	A fellow woman seen in relation to feminist issues. <i>Securicor and its sister company Securicor Services.</i>
sisterhood	An association or society of women who are linked together by a common religion or trade or interest. <i>Canadian feminists acknowledge their sisterhood with women around the globe.</i>
<u>tribe</u>	A social division of (usually preliterate) people. <i>Brands are adopted by a tribe of users.</i>
