Synonyms of "Fondly" as an adverb (1 Word)

lovingly With love or great care.
*They smile **lovingly** at each other.*

- *She spoke to her children fondly.*
- *They fondly believed the cheers were for them.*
- *He talks fondly of his grandfather.*

adore	Worship; venerate. <i>He just adored his wife.</i>
affection	A gentle feeling of fondness or liking. <i>He won a place in her affections.</i>
amity	A state of friendship and cordiality. <i>The presence of French troops in Scotland had produced hostility rather than amity.</i>
attached	Appointed to (an organization) for special or temporary duties. <i>A block of attached houses.</i>
attachment	Legal seizure of property. <i>The processor comes complete with a blender attachment.</i>
caress	Touch or stroke lightly in a loving or endearing manner. <i>He showered her with caresses.</i>
cherish	Keep (a hope or ambition) in one's mind. <i>He had long cherished a secret fantasy about his future.</i>
conjugal	Of or relating to marriage or to the relationship between a wife and husband. <i>Conjugal visits.</i>
connubial	In a conjugal manner. <i>Connubial bliss.</i>
cordiality	A cordial disposition.
couple	Engage in sexual intercourse. <i>A cable is coupled up to one of the wheels.</i>
darling	A person who is particularly popular with a certain group. <i>A darling little pillbox hat.</i>
dear	Dearly loved. <i>A dear little puppy.</i>
dote	Be extremely and uncritically fond of. <i>Having an older brother who dots you a lot is the best thing ever.</i>
doting	Extravagantly or foolishly loving and indulgent. <i>Deceiving her preoccupied and doting husband with a young captain.</i>
embrace	The state of taking in or encircling. <i>His career embraces a number of activities composing playing and acting.</i>
eros	God of love; son of Aphrodite; identified with Roman Cupid.
fond	(of a hope or belief) foolishly optimistic; naive. <i>I m very fond of Mel.</i>

friendship	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>Old ties of love and friendship.</i>
infatuation	Temporary love of an adolescent. <i>He had developed an infatuation with the girl.</i>
kiss	A slight touch of a ball against another ball. <i>The newly married couple kissed.</i>
kissing	Affectionate play (or foreplay without contact with the genital organs).
love	A person or thing that one loves. <i>Their love left them indifferent to their surroundings.</i>
lovingly	With love or great care. <i>A lovingly restored building.</i>
married	A person who is married. <i>A married couple.</i>
paramour	A woman who cohabits with an important man.
platonic	Free from physical desire. <i>Platonic love.</i>
treasure	Be fond of; be attached to. <i>My mother gave me the ring and I ll treasure it always.</i>
unrequited	Not returned in kind. <i>Unrequited unanswered love.</i>
