absolve	(in church use) give absolution for (a sin. <i>The pardon absolved them of any crimes.</i>
autonomous	Existing as an independent entity. <i>School governors are legally autonomous.</i>
complimentary	Expressing a compliment; praising or approving. <i>Jennie was very complimentary about Kath s riding.</i>
discretion	The trait of judging wisely and objectively. <i>Local authorities should use their discretion in setting the charges.</i>
disengage	Release from something that holds fast, connects, or entangles. <i>The clutch will not disengage.</i>
dislodge	Remove or force out from a position. <i>The new employee dislodged her by moving into her office space.</i>
emancipate	Set free, especially from legal, social, or political restrictions. <i>The citizen must be emancipated from the obsessive secrecy of government.</i>
emancipation	Freeing someone from the control of another; especially a parent's relinquishing authority and control over a minor child. <i>The early struggle for emancipation from slavery.</i>
freelance	Earn one s living as a freelance. <i>A freelance journalist.</i>
gratis	Given or done for nothing; free. <i>A monthly programme was issued gratis.</i>
illimitable	Without limits in extent or size or quantity. <i>The illimitable human capacity for evil.</i>
inexpensive	Not costing a great deal; cheap. <i>Inexpensive family restaurants.</i>

informal	Having or fostering a warm or friendly and informal atmosphere. <i>An informal atmosphere.</i>
leeway	A permissible difference; allowing some freedom to move within limits. <i>The government had greater leeway to introduce reforms.</i>
liberally	In a generous manner. <i>He gave liberally to several charities.</i>
<u>liberate</u>	Release (gas or energy) as a result of a chemical reaction or physical decomposition. <i>Ways of working politically that liberate women.</i>
<u>liberation</u>	The attempt to achieve equal rights or status. <i>She worked for women's liberation.</i>
<u>liberty</u>	The personification of liberty as a female figure. <i>How did he know what she was thinking it was a liberty.</i>
<u>loose</u>	Loose play. <i>A box of loose nails.</i>
<u>loosely</u>	In a way that is not close, compact, or solid in structure or formation. <i>Buildings are grouped loosely around a village green.</i>
looseness	A lack of strict accuracy; laxity of practice. <i>Misunderstandings can often be traced to a looseness of expression.</i>
manumit	Release from slavery; set free. <i>Old Angus had never manumitted a single slave.</i>
renewable	Capable of being renewed; replaceable. <i>We are on renewable annual contracts.</i>
separatist	Relating to separatists or separatism. <i>Religious separatists.</i>
unencumbered	Not having any burden or impediment. <i>He needed to travel light and unencumbered.</i>
unfettered	Not bound by shackles and chains. <i>Unfettered artistic genius.</i>
<u>unofficial</u>	Denoting strike action not called or endorsed by the union to which the strikers belong. <i>The early election returns are unofficial.</i>
unrestricted	Accessible to all. <i>Unrestricted access to both military bases.</i>
untie	Undo or unfasten (something that is tied or tied up). <i>Morton untied the parcel.</i>
