affirm	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>It is a rich and challenging motion picture that both affirms life and emphasizes its fragility.</i>
assert	Postulate positively and assertively. <i>Women should assert themselves more.</i>
assurance	Insurance, specifically life insurance. <i>His assurance in his superiority did not make him popular.</i>
aver	State or assert to be the case. <i>I don t have to do anything it s his problem he averred.</i>
avow	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>He avowed that he had voted Labour in every election.</i>
certain	Certain to occur destined or inevitable. <i>What is certain is that every effect must have a cause.</i>
clarify	Make clear and (more) comprehensible. <i>The report managed to clarify the government s position.</i>
confident	A confidant. <i>This time they re confident of a happy ending.</i>
confidently	In a way that expresses little or no doubt about something. <i>He confidently predicts a change of fortune.</i>
convince	Cause (someone) to believe firmly in the truth of something. <i>She convinced my father to branch out on his own.</i>
declare	Declare to be. <i>The prime minister declared that the programme of austerity had paid off.</i>
encourage	Contribute to the progress or growth of. <i>Pupils are encouraged to be creative.</i>

ensure	Make certain of obtaining or providing (something). <i>Only by researching stocks thoroughly can a client ensure against being misled.</i>
exaction	Act of demanding or levying by force or authority. <i>Exaction of tribute.</i>
foolproof	Not liable to failure. <i>Foolproof this appliance.</i>
grandiloquence	High-flown style; excessive use of verbal ornamentation.
guarantee	Provide a guarantee for. <i>We offer a 10 year guarantee against rusting.</i>
induce	Cause to occur rapidly. <i>From the experimental evidence one infers or induces the hypothesis.</i>
magniloquent	Using high-flown or bombastic language.
oath	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He was muttering foul oaths.</i>
persuadable	Easily persuaded; amenable. <i>They need to identify the most persuadable voters.</i>
persuade	Win approval or support for. <i>You can't persuade me to buy this ugly vase.</i>
pledge	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>I have no intention of giving you anything that could be held against me as a pledge.</i>
promise	Make a promise or commitment. <i>We're promised more winter weather tonight.</i>
purport	The intended meaning of a communication. <i>The purport of existence.</i>
reassure	Give or restore confidence in; cause to feel sure or certain. <i>Joachim reassured him that he was needed.</i>
rhetoric	Using language effectively to please or persuade. <i>All we have from the Opposition is empty rhetoric.</i>
shout	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. <i>He leant out of his window and shouted abuse at them.</i>
sure	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>Her neck was red a sure sign of agitation.</i>
vouch	Summon a vouchee into court to warrant or defend a title. <i>He vouched his words by his deeds.</i>
