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| alert | A warning serves to make you more alert to danger. <i>Bombers were put on alert during the crisis.</i> |
| <u>beware</u> | Be cautious and alert to risks or dangers. <i>We should beware the incompetence of legislators.</i> |
| canny | Showing self-interest and shrewdness in dealing with others. <i>Canny investors will switch banks if they think they are getting a raw deal.</i> |
| <u>careful</u> | Anxious to protect (something) from harm or loss; solicitous. <i>They were careful when crossing the busy street.</i> |
| carefully | In a way that deliberately avoids harm or errors; cautiously. <i>They must be carefully handled and stored.</i> |
| carefulness | The trait of being cautious; being attentive to possible danger. <i>I admired the carefulness of his work.</i> |
| caution | Warning. <i>The Chancellor cautioned that economic uncertainties remained.</i> |
| <u>cautious</u> | People who are fearful and cautious. <i>A cautious driver.</i> |
| <u>cautiously</u> | In a way that deliberately avoids potential problems or dangers. <i>She ventured cautiously downstairs.</i> |
| <u>chary</u> | Characterized by great caution and wariness. <i>A chary investor.</i> |
| circumspect | Heedful of potential consequences. <i>Circumspect actions.</i> |
| concerned | Feeling or showing worry or solicitude. <i>Factors concerned in the rise and fall of epidemics.</i> |
| <u>discreet</u> | Unobtrusively perceptive and sympathetic. <i>A discreet investor.</i> |

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| <u>discreetly</u> | With discretion; prudently and with wise self-restraint. <i>She coughed discreetly.</i> |
| <u>discretion</u> | Freedom to act or judge on one's own. <i>Local authorities should use their discretion in setting the charges.</i> |
| forethought | Planning or plotting in advance of acting. <i>Jim had the forethought to book in advance.</i> |
| heed | Pay close attention to give heed to. <i>If he heard he paid no heed.</i> |
| <u>mindful</u> | Inclined or willing to do something. <i>Mindful of his responsibilities.</i> |
| modesty | The quality of being relatively moderate, limited, or small in amount, rate, or level. <i>Modesty forbade her to undress in front of so many people.</i> |
| observant | Adhering strictly to the rules of a particular religion, especially Judaism. <i>Her observant eye took in every detail.</i> |
| <u>perfunctory</u> | As a formality only. <i>He gave a perfunctory nod.</i> |
| precaution | A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>We never took precautions.</i> |
| <u>prudent</u> | Careful and sensible; marked by sound judgment. <i>No prudent money manager would authorize a loan without first knowing its purpose.</i> |
| solicitous | Showing hovering attentiveness. <i>He was solicitous to cultivate her mamma s good opinion.</i> |
| thoughtful | Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>Brows drawn together in thoughtful consideration.</i> |
| vigilant | Keeping careful watch for possible danger or difficulties. <i>The vigilant eye of the town watch.</i> |
| wary | Feeling or showing caution about possible dangers or problems. <i>Dogs which have been mistreated often remain very wary of strangers.</i> |
| <u>watch</u> | A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>Everyone stopped to watch what was going on.</i> |
| <u>watchdog</u> | A guardian or defender against theft or illegal practices or waste. <i>She is the global watchdog for human rights abuses.</i> |
| watchful | Engaged in or accustomed to close observation. <i>Twenty watchful weary tedious nights.</i> |
