constitute	Set up or lay the groundwork for. <i>There were enough members present to constitute a quorum.</i>
contain	Include or contain have as a component. <i>This can contains water.</i>
element	Each of more than one hundred substances that cannot be chemically interconverted or broken down into simpler substances and are primary constituents of matter Each element is distinguished by its atomic number i e the number of protons in the nuclei of its atoms. <i>The grammatical elements of a sentence.</i>
encompass	Surround and have or hold within. <i>This area of London encompasses Piccadilly to the north and St James s Park to the south.</i>
entail	A property bequeathed under an entail. <i>Landed property was governed by primogeniture and entail.</i>
entangle	Involve (someone) in difficulties or complicated circumstances from which it is difficult to escape. <i>They were suspicious of becoming entangled in a civil war.</i>

factor	Resolve into factors. <i>His skill was a factor in ensuring that so much was achieved.</i>
have	Have sex with. <i>I don t have any money left.</i>
implicate	Convey (a meaning) indirectly through what one says, rather than stating it explicitly. <i>By saying that coffee would keep her awake Mary implicated that she didn t want any.</i>
implicit	With no qualification or question; absolute. <i>An implicit agreement not to raise the subject.</i>
include	Comprise or contain as part of a whole. <i>Other changes included the abolition of the death penalty.</i>
incorporate	Include or contain; have as a component. <i>Through an incorporate resilience slighted confidence restores itself.</i>
largely	On a large scale. <i>He was soon arrested largely through the efforts of Tom Poole.</i>
mainly	For the most part. <i>The west will be mainly dry.</i>
makeup	An event that is substituted for a previously cancelled event. <i>He missed the test and had to take a makeup.</i>
mostly	Usually; generally. <i>I made some good friends but mostly met closed minded people.</i>
normally	Under normal or usual conditions; as a rule. <i>Normally it takes three or four years to complete the training.</i>
ordinarily	Under normal conditions. <i>A person who is ordinarily resident in the United Kingdom.</i>
organize	Make arrangements or preparations for (an event or activity). <i>Organize lessons in a planned way.</i>
overwhelmingly	To a very great degree or with a great majority. <i>The candy looked overwhelmingly desirable to the dieting man.</i>
primarily	Of primary import. <i>This is primarily a question of economics.</i>
principally	For the most part; chiefly. <i>He was principally a landscape painter.</i>
redefine	Define again or differently. <i>She redefined his duties.</i>
