backwards	In reverse of the usual direction or order. A step <b>backwards</b> for the economy.
<u>blemish</u>	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. The offences were an uncharacteristic <b>blemish</b> on an otherwise clean record.
<u>con</u>	Deprive of by deceit. The Charter is a glossy public relations <b>con</b> .
damage	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. Bombing caused extensive <b>damage</b> to the town.
damaging	(sometimes followed by `to') causing harm or injury. <b>Damaging</b> allegations of corruption.
<u>deface</u>	Spoil the surface or appearance of (something), for example by drawing or writing on it. <i>He <b>deface</b>d library books.</i>
defect	An imperfection in a bodily system. <i>That interpretation is an unfortunate</i> <b>defect</b> <i>of our lack of information.</i>
deficiency	A failing or shortcoming. A budget <b>deficiency</b> of 96 billion.
demerit	A fault or disadvantage. Ten <b>demerit</b> s and he loses his privileges.
disadvantage	Put at a disadvantage hinder harm. Situations of serious social and economic <b>disadvantage</b> .
disfigure	Spoil the appearance of. Litter <b>disfigure</b> s the countryside.
<u>drawback</u>	An amount of excise or import duty remitted on goods exported. <i>He pointed out all the <b>drawback</b>s to my plan.</i>



<u>error</u>	A misconception resulting from incorrect information. Goods dispatched to your branch in <b>error</b> .
failing	Failure to reach a minimum required performance. <i>He was quick to point out his wife s failings.</i>
<u>fault</u>	Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults. <i>He studied the <b>fault</b>ing of the earth s crust.</i>
flaw	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. A <b>flaw</b> caused the crystal to shatter.
<b>flawed</b>	Having a blemish or flaw. A <b>flawed</b> diamond.
<u>harm</u>	Cause or do harm to. Smoking when pregnant can <b>harm</b> your baby.
inadequacy	Lack of an adequate quantity or number. <i>Her feelings of personal <b>inadequacy</b>.</i>
injury	An act that causes someone or something to receive physical damage. <i>An ankle injury</i> .
insufficiency	The inability of an organ to perform its normal function. <i>Insufficiency</i> of adequate housing.
misconceive	Interpret in the wrong way. Some academic latinists did <b>misconceive</b> Pound s poem in that way.
misunderstanding	A disagreement or quarrel. There must have been some kind of <b>misunderstanding</b> .
neurotoxin	A poison which acts on the nervous system.
nitpick	Engage in fussy or pedantic fault-finding. The state is <b>nitpick</b> ing about minor administrative matters.
problem	A state of difficulty that needs to be resolved. What s the <b>problem</b> .
<u>shortcoming</u>	A fault or failure to meet a certain standard, typically in a person's character, a plan, or a system. He is so forthright about his <b>shortcoming</b> s it s hard to chastise him.
sideways	So as to occupy a job or position at the same level as one previously held rather than be promoted or demoted. <i>The lorry slid <b>sideways</b> across the road.</i>
unforced	Not compelled or constrained. A voice with a pleasingly <b>unforced</b> quality.
upside	The highest or uppermost side of anything. Being self employed has its <b>upside</b> .
