| deficiency      | A failing or shortcoming.<br>A budget <b>deficiency</b> of 96 billion.   |
| demerit         | A fault or disadvantage.<br>Ten <b>demerit</b> s and he loses his privileges.  |
| disadvantage    | Put at a disadvantage hinder harm.<br>Situations of serious social and economic <b>disadvantage</b> .  |
| disfigure       | Spoil the appearance of.<br>Litter <b>disfigure</b> s the countryside.   |
| <u>drawback</u> | An amount of excise or import duty remitted on goods exported.<br><i>He pointed out all the <b>drawback</b>s to my plan.</i>                   |



| <u>error</u>       | A misconception resulting from incorrect information.<br>Goods dispatched to your branch in <b>error</b> .  |

| failing            | Failure to reach a minimum required performance.<br><i>He was quick to point out his wife s failings.</i>   |
| <u>fault</u>       | Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults.<br><i>He studied the <b>fault</b>ing of the earth s crust.</i>  |
| flaw               | Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective.<br>A <b>flaw</b> caused the crystal to shatter.   |
| <b>flawed</b>      | Having a blemish or flaw.<br>A <b>flawed</b> diamond.   |
| <u>harm</u>        | Cause or do harm to.<br>Smoking when pregnant can <b>harm</b> your baby.  |
| inadequacy         | Lack of an adequate quantity or number.<br><i>Her feelings of personal <b>inadequacy</b>.</i>   |
| injury             | An act that causes someone or something to receive physical damage. <i>An ankle injury</i> .  |
| insufficiency      | The inability of an organ to perform its normal function. <i>Insufficiency</i> of adequate housing.   |
| misconceive        | Interpret in the wrong way.<br>Some academic latinists did <b>misconceive</b> Pound s poem in that way.   |
| misunderstanding   | A disagreement or quarrel.<br>There must have been some kind of <b>misunderstanding</b> .   |
| neurotoxin         | A poison which acts on the nervous system.  |
| nitpick            | Engage in fussy or pedantic fault-finding.<br>The state is <b>nitpick</b> ing about minor administrative matters.   |
| problem            | A state of difficulty that needs to be resolved.<br>What s the <b>problem</b> .   |
| <u>shortcoming</u> | A fault or failure to meet a certain standard, typically in a person's character, a plan, or a system.<br>He is so forthright about his <b>shortcoming</b> s it s hard to chastise him. |
| sideways           | So as to occupy a job or position at the same level as one previously<br>held rather than be promoted or demoted.<br><i>The lorry slid <b>sideways</b> across the road.</i>             |
| unforced           | Not compelled or constrained.<br>A voice with a pleasingly <b>unforced</b> quality.   |
| upside             | The highest or uppermost side of anything.<br>Being self employed has its <b>upside</b> .   |
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
