<b>acquire</b>	Win something through one's efforts. <i>I <b>acquired</b> a strong aversion to television.</i>
<b>acquisition</b>	The action of acquiring something. <i>The <b>acquisition</b> of self control.</i>
<b>approbation</b>	Approval or praise. <i>A term of <b>approbation</b>.</i>
<b>attainable</b>	Capable of being attained or accomplished. <i>Yields in excess of 6 are easily <b>attainable</b>.</i>
<b>belong</b>	(of a contest or period of time) be dominated by. <i>These pages don't <b>belong</b>.</i>
<b>checkbook</b>	A book issued to holders of checking accounts.
<b>earn</b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. <i>She <b>earns</b> a lot in her new job.</i>
<b>fetch</b>	The action of fetching. <i>Kind offers <b>fetched</b> tears from me.</i>
<b>grab</b>	An act of obtaining something opportunistically or unscrupulously. <i>She <b>grabbed</b> the child's hand and ran out of the room.</i>
<b>hold</b>	Support or hold in a certain manner. <i><b>Hold</b> in place.</i>
<b>holder</b>	A smallholder. <i>I replaced the phone in its <b>holder</b>.</i>
<b>host</b>	Be the host of or for. <i>Your <b>host</b> is Stuart Macmillan.</i>
<b>incur</b>	Make oneself subject to; bring upon oneself; become liable to. <i>I will pay any expenses <b>incurred</b>.</i>
<b>landlady</b>	A woman who keeps lodgings, a boarding house, or a pub.
<b>landlord</b>	A man who keeps lodgings, a boarding house, or a pub.

<b>let</b>	Award (a contract for a project) to an applicant. <i>An unfurnished <b>let</b>.</i>
<b>obtain</b>	Come into possession of. <i>The price of silver fell to that <b>obtaining</b> elsewhere in the ancient world.</i>
<b>own</b>	Have ownership or possession of. <i>His father <b>owns</b> a restaurant.</i>
<b>owner</b>	A person who owns something. <i>Who is the <b>owner</b> of that friendly smile.</i>
<b>permission</b>	The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization. <i>They had entered the country without <b>permission</b>.</i>
<b>possess</b>	Have ownership or possession of. <i>A terrible rage <b>possessed</b> her.</i>
<b>possession</b>	Something that is owned or possessed. <i>They re charged with <b>possession</b>.</i>
<b>possessor</b>	A person who owns something or has a particular quality. <i>His father was the <b>possessor</b> of a considerable fortune.</i>
<b>procure</b>	Cause (something) to happen. <i>He <b>procured</b> extra cigarettes even though they were rationed.</i>
<b>property</b>	Shares or investments in property. <i>The president was concerned about the <b>property</b> across from the White House.</i>
<b>proprietor</b>	Someone who owns (is legal possessor of) a business. <i>By 1640 he was himself the <b>proprietor</b> of a three hundred acre tract.</i>
<b>regain</b>	Obtain possession or use of (something, typically a quality or ability) again after losing it. <i>She <b>regained</b> control of herself.</i>
<b>rent</b>	Hold under a lease or rental agreement of goods and services. <i>Skis or snowboards <b>rent</b> for 60 80 for six days.</i>
<b>retention</b>	The continued possession, use, or control of something. <i>Eating too much salt can lead to fluid <b>retention</b>.</i>
<b>take</b>	Take by force. <i>Let s <b>take</b> Napoleon for instance.</i>
