| <u>construe</u> | Analyse the syntax of (a text, sentence, or word). <i>His words could hardly be construed as an apology.</i> |
| <u>decipher</u> | Read with difficulty. <i>Can you decipher this letter.</i> |
| define | Determine the nature of. <i>The camera could define the smallest object.</i> |
| <u>depict</u> | Show in, or as in, a picture. <i>These equations may be depicted on a graph.</i> |
| <u>depiction</u> | A drawing of the outlines of forms or objects. <i>The painting s horrific depiction of war.</i> |
| describe | Give a detailed account in words of. <i>Discreet Italian police described it in a manner typically continental.</i> |
| english | The people of England. |
| explain | Serve as a reason or cause or justification of. <i>The committee explained their plan for fund raising to the Dean.</i> |
| explanation | A reason or justification given for an action or belief. <i>I heard his explanation of the accident.</i> |
| expound | Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing. <i>The abbess expounded the scriptures to her nuns.</i> |
| express | Serve as a means for expressing something. <i>She expressed her anger.</i> |
| figuratively | Used to indicate a departure from a literal use of words; metaphorically. <i>Chinese art influenced her to paint figuratively.</i> |

| <u>interpretation</u> | A mental representation of the meaning or significance of something. <i>The report included his interpretation of the forensic evidence.</i> |
| interpreter | A program that translates and executes source language statements one line at a time. <i>She was famous as an interpreter of Shakespearean roles.</i> |
| language | Coarse or offensive language. <i>The systems were developed using languages such as Fortran and Basic.</i> |
| linguist | A person who studies linguistics. |
| multilingual | Using or knowing more than one language. <i>A multilingual dictionary.</i> |
| <u>paraphrase</u> | Rewording for the purpose of clarification. <i>You can either quote or paraphrase literary texts.</i> |
| polyglot | A person who knows and is able to use several languages. <i>Polyglot and bilingual technical dictionaries.</i> |
| portray | Portray in words. <i>The actor portrays an elderly lonely man.</i> |
| read | Something that is read. <i>A little read English columnist whose name escapes me.</i> |
| speaking | Capable of or involving speech or speaking. <i>You have a clear speaking voice.</i> |
| <u>spoken</u> | Speaking in a specified way. <i>A spoken message.</i> |
| subjectively | In a way that is based on personal feelings, tastes, or opinions. <i>Artistic creation is judged subjectively.</i> |
| translate | Determine the amino-acid sequence of a protein during its synthesis by using information on the messenger RNA. <i>Is there a need to translate the psychiatrist's remarks.</i> |
| translation | The process of moving something from one place to another. <i>The translation of research findings into clinical practice.</i> |
| translator | A television relay transmitter. <i>The translator of Hardy's poems into Icelandic.</i> |
| transliterate | Write or print (a letter or word) using the closest corresponding letters of a different alphabet or script. <i>Names from one language are often transliterated into another.</i> |
| understand | Be understanding of. <i>She didn't really understand the situation.</i> |
