| allegiance | Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause. <i>A complex pattern of cross party allegiances.</i> |
| allegiant | Steadfast in devotion (especially to your lawful monarch or government). <i>It is impossible to be allegiant to two opposing forces.</i> |
| chauvinistic | Displaying excessive or prejudiced support for one’s own cause or group, in particular showing male prejudice against women. <i>A chauvinistic aggressive brand of nationalism.</i> |
| confidant | A person with whom one shares a secret or private matter, trusting them not to repeat it to others. <i>A close confidante of the princess.</i> |
| confiding | Willing to entrust personal matters. <i>First she was suspicious then she became confiding.</i> |
| dedication | An inscription or form of words dedicating a building, book, etc. to a person or deity. <i>The hardback edition contained a fulsome dedication to his wife.</i> |
| devoted | (followed by `to’) dedicated exclusively to a purpose or use. <i>There is a museum devoted to her work.</i> |
| dutiful | Willingly obedient out of a sense of duty and respect. <i>A dutiful daughter.</i> |
| epigone | An inferior imitator of some distinguished writer or artist of musician. <i>The humdrum compositions of some of Beethoven s epigones.</i> |
| faith | Complete confidence in a person or plan etc. <i>He lost his faith but not his morality.</i> |
| faithful | Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>We do not doubt that England has a faithful patriot in the Lord Chancellor.</i> |
| faithfully | In a manner that is true to the facts or the original. <i>He swore that he would serve the king faithfully.</i> |

| follower | A person who supports and admires a particular person or set of ideas. <i>Followers of Nietzsche.</i> |
| housekeeper | A servant who is employed to perform domestic task in a household. |
| jingoism | An appeal intended to arouse patriotic emotions. <i>The popular jingoism that swept the lower middle classes.</i> |
| liege | A person holding a fief; a person who owes allegiance and service to a feudal lord. <i>The Scots obeyed him as their liege lord.</i> |
| loyalty | A strong feeling of support or allegiance. <i>His extreme loyalty to the Crown.</i> |
| minion | A servile or fawning dependant. <i>He gets oppressed minions like me to fob them off.</i> |
| obedient | Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority. <i>The obedient colonies are heavily taxed the refractory remain unburdened.</i> |
| patriotic | Having or expressing devotion to and vigorous support for one's country. <i>Today's game will be played before a fiercely patriotic crowd.</i> |
| servant | A person working in the service of another (especially in the household). <i>A government servant.</i> |
| subservience | Abject or cringing submissiveness. <i>He demonstrated his complete subservience to his masters.</i> |
| toady | A pufferfish. <i>She imagined him toadying to his rich clients.</i> |
| trust | A trustful relationship. <i>He can be trusted to carry out an impartial investigation.</i> |
| trusted | Worthy of trust or confidence. <i>A trusted adviser.</i> |
| trustful | Having or marked by a total belief in the reliability, truth, or ability of someone. <i>Great brown eye true and trustful.</i> |
| trusting | Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust. <i>It is foolish to be too trusting of other people.</i> |
| trustworthy | Taking responsibility for one's conduct and obligations. <i>Trustworthy public servants.</i> |
| underling | An assistant subject to the authority or control of another. <i>She was shouting orders at underlings between gulps of coffee.</i> |
