## Associations of "For loyal" (30 Words)

<a href="#">allegiance</a>	Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause. <i>A complex pattern of cross party <b>allegiances</b>.</i>
<b>allegiant</b>	Steadfast in devotion (especially to your lawful monarch or government). <i>It is impossible to be <b>allegiant</b> to two opposing forces.</i>
<b>chauvinistic</b>	Displaying excessive or prejudiced support for one’s own cause or group, in particular showing male prejudice against women. <i>A <b>chauvinistic</b> aggressive brand of nationalism.</i>
<a href="#">confidant</a>	A person with whom one shares a secret or private matter, trusting them not to repeat it to others. <i>A close <b>confidante</b> of the princess.</i>
<b>confiding</b>	Willing to entrust personal matters. <i>First she was suspicious then she became <b>confiding</b>.</i>
<a href="#">dedication</a>	An inscription or form of words dedicating a building, book, etc. to a person or deity. <i>The hardback edition contained a fulsome <b>dedication</b> to his wife.</i>
<a href="#">devoted</a>	(followed by `to’) dedicated exclusively to a purpose or use. <i>There is a museum <b>devoted</b> to her work.</i>
<b>dutiful</b>	Willingly obedient out of a sense of duty and respect. <i>A <b>dutiful</b> daughter.</i>
<b>epigone</b>	An inferior imitator of some distinguished writer or artist of musician. <i>The humdrum compositions of some of Beethoven s <b>epigones</b>.</i>
<a href="#">faith</a>	Complete confidence in a person or plan etc. <i>He lost his <b>faith</b> but not his morality.</i>
<a href="#">faithful</a>	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>We do not doubt that England has a <b>faithful</b> patriot in the Lord Chancellor.</i>
<b>faithfully</b>	In a manner that is true to the facts or the original. <i>He swore that he would serve the king <b>faithfully</b>.</i>

<b>follower</b>	A person who supports and admires a particular person or set of ideas. <i>Followers of Nietzsche.</i>
<b>housekeeper</b>	A servant who is employed to perform domestic task in a household.
<b>jingoism</b>	An appeal intended to arouse patriotic emotions. <i>The popular <b>jingoism</b> that swept the lower middle classes.</i>
<b>liege</b>	A person holding a fief; a person who owes allegiance and service to a feudal lord. <i>The Scots obeyed him as their <b>liege</b> lord.</i>
<b>loyalty</b>	A strong feeling of support or allegiance. <i>His extreme <b>loyalty</b> to the Crown.</i>
<b>minion</b>	A servile or fawning dependant. <i>He gets oppressed <b>minions</b> like me to fob them off.</i>
<b>obedient</b>	Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority. <i>The <b>obedient</b> colonies are heavily taxed the refractory remain unburdened.</i>
<b>patriotic</b>	Having or expressing devotion to and vigorous support for one's country. <i>Today's game will be played before a fiercely <b>patriotic</b> crowd.</i>
<b>servant</b>	A person working in the service of another (especially in the household). <i>A government <b>servant</b>.</i>
<b>subservience</b>	Abject or cringing submissiveness. <i>He demonstrated his complete <b>subservience</b> to his masters.</i>
<b>toady</b>	A pufferfish. <i>She imagined him <b>toadying</b> to his rich clients.</i>
<b>trust</b>	A trustful relationship. <i>He can be <b>trusted</b> to carry out an impartial investigation.</i>
<b>trusted</b>	Worthy of trust or confidence. <i>A <b>trusted</b> adviser.</i>
<b>trustful</b>	Having or marked by a total belief in the reliability, truth, or ability of someone. <i>Great brown eye true and <b>trustful</b>.</i>
<b>trusting</b>	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust. <i>It is foolish to be too <b>trusting</b> of other people.</i>
<b>trustworthy</b>	Taking responsibility for one's conduct and obligations. <i><b>Trustworthy</b> public servants.</i>
<b>underling</b>	An assistant subject to the authority or control of another. <i>She was shouting orders at <b>underlings</b> between gulps of coffee.</i>
