build	Build or establish something abstract. <i>Build a reputation.</i>
compel	Force or oblige (someone) to do something. <i>The water shortage compels conservation.</i>
compulsion	The action or state of forcing or being forced to do something; constraint. <i>The payment was made under compulsion.</i>
concoct	Make a concoction of by mixing. <i>His cronies concocted a simple plan.</i>
constrain	To close within bounds, or otherwise limit or deprive of free movement. <i>Calyпсо in her caves constrained his stay.</i>
construct	A physical thing which is deliberately built or formed. <i>Poetics should construct a theory of literary discourse.</i>
create	Create by artistic means. <i>He created a thirty acre lake.</i>
creativity	The use of imagination or original ideas to create something; inventiveness. <i>Firms are keen to encourage creativity.</i>
devise	Arrange by systematic planning and united effort. <i>Devise a plan to take over the director s office.</i>
fabricate	Make up something artificial or untrue. <i>You will have to fabricate an exhaust system.</i>
factory	An establishment for traders carrying on business in a foreign country. <i>The group have become a rock and roll hit factory.</i>
figment	A thing that someone believes to be real but that exists only in their imagination. <i>It really was Ross and not a figment of her overheated imagination.</i>

<u>forge</u>	Make something, usually for a specific function. <i>He forged a great suit of black armour.</i>
idea	An opinion or belief. <i>The idea of the game is to capture all the pieces.</i>
<u>imagination</u>	The ability to deal resourcefully with unusual problems. <i>She was set in her ways and lacked imagination.</i>
<u>impromptu</u>	With little or no preparation or forethought. <i>An impromptu speech.</i>
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available; makeshift. <i>We slept on improvised beds.</i>
instinctive	(of a person) doing or being a specified thing apparently naturally or automatically. <i>An instinctive distaste for conflict.</i>
<u>invent</u>	Make up something artificial or untrue. <i>He invented an improved form of the steam engine.</i>
<u>invention</u>	Something fabricated or made up. <i>The invention of printing in the 15th century.</i>
<u>inventive</u>	(used of persons or artifacts) marked by independence and creativity in thought or action. <i>Inventive ceramics.</i>
<u>inventor</u>	Someone who is the first to think of or make something.
<u>makeshift</u>	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>The rock served as a makeshift hammer.</i>
manufacture	Manufactured articles. <i>Claims that the entire row had been manufactured by the press.</i>
<u>originality</u>	The quality of being novel or unusual. <i>She is a writer of great originality.</i>
produce	Bring out for display. <i>The garden where the artist produced many of his flower paintings.</i>
productive	Achieving a significant amount or result. <i>The hotel was not productive of amusing company.</i>
<u>ruse</u>	An action intended to deceive someone; a trick. <i>Emma tried to think of a ruse to get Paul out of the house.</i>
<u>spontaneous</u>	(of a plant) growing naturally and without being tended or cultivated. <i>Spontaneous laughter.</i>
