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| abduction | The action of forcibly taking someone away against their will. <i>They organized the abduction of Mr Cordes on his way to the airport.</i> |
| absent | Go away or remain away. <i>An absent stare.</i> |
| <u>cramped</u> | Inhibiting the development of someone or something. <i>Trying to bring children up in cramped high rise apartments.</i> |
| deficiency | Lack of an adequate quantity or number. <i>Water is the critical deficiency in desert regions.</i> |
| <u>deficient</u> | Falling short of some prescribed norm. <i>Deficient in common sense.</i> |
| furlough | Leave of absence from a job, position, or period of military service. <i>They let him out of prison on a weekend furlough.</i> |
| <u>gone</u> | In a trance or stupor, especially through exhaustion, drink, or drugs. <i>A bunch of real gone cats.</i> |
| <u>inadequate</u> | Not sufficient to meet a need. <i>These labels prove to be wholly inadequate.</i> |
| <u>indigent</u> | A needy person. <i>A charity for the relief of indigent artists.</i> |
| <u>insufficient</u> | Not enough; inadequate. <i>There was insufficient evidence to convict him.</i> |
| lacking | (of a quality) absent. <i>Her appetite was lacking.</i> |
| layoff | The act of laying off an employee or a work force. |
| leave | Go and leave behind either intentionally or by neglect or forgetfulness. <i>The parts he disliked he would alter and the parts he didn't dislike he'd leave.</i> |

| lose | Miss from one's possessions lose sight of. <i>She couldn't eat and began to lose weight.</i> |
| loss | Euphemistic expressions for death. <i>Insurance can protect you against financial loss.</i> |
| <u>meager</u> | Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>Meager fare.</i> |
| minus | On the negative side or lower end of a scale. <i>C minus.</i> |
| mislay | Unintentionally put (an object) where it cannot readily be found and so lose it temporarily. <i>I seem to have mislaid my car keys.</i> |
| <u>miss</u> | Pass by without touching; chance not to hit. <i>He's rich he won't miss the money.</i> |
| <u>presence</u> | The act of being present. <i>The presence of chlorine in the atmosphere.</i> |
| scant | Less than the correct or legal or full amount often deliberately so. <i>She weighed a scant two pounds.</i> |
| scanty | Small or insufficient in quantity or amount. <i>A scanty harvest.</i> |
| short | Of a vowel categorized as short with regard to quality and length e.g. in standard British English the vowel in good is short as distinct from the long vowel u in food. <i>They have been backed at short odds to win thousands of pounds.</i> |
| substandard | Falling short of some prescribed norm. <i>Substandard spellings.</i> |
| truant | Of a pupil being a truant. <i>If my daughter had been truanting from school I would have been informed.</i> |
| undermanned | Inadequate in number of workers or assistants etc. |
| undersized | Smaller than normal for its kind. <i>The undersized cubs may not survive the winter.</i> |
| unequal | A person or thing regarded as unequal to another in status or level. <i>I have lived for fifty years as an unequal in this country.</i> |
| <u>unsatisfactory</u> | Not giving satisfaction. <i>Shops should take back unsatisfactory goods.</i> |
| wanting | Inadequate in amount or degree. <i>Tested and found wanting.</i> |
