## Associations of "For missing" (30 Words)

<b>abduction</b>	The action of forcibly taking someone away against their will. <i>They organized the <b>abduction</b> of Mr Cordes on his way to the airport.</i>
<b>absent</b>	Go away or remain away. <i>An <b>absent</b> stare.</i>
<b><u>cramped</u></b>	Inhibiting the development of someone or something. <i>Trying to bring children up in <b>cramped</b> high rise apartments.</i>
<b>deficiency</b>	Lack of an adequate quantity or number. <i>Water is the critical <b>deficiency</b> in desert regions.</i>
<b><u>deficient</u></b>	Falling short of some prescribed norm. <i><b>Deficient</b> in common sense.</i>
<b>furlough</b>	Leave of absence from a job, position, or period of military service. <i>They let him out of prison on a weekend <b>furlough</b>.</i>
<b><u>gone</u></b>	In a trance or stupor, especially through exhaustion, drink, or drugs. <i>A bunch of real <b>gone</b> cats.</i>
<b><u>inadequate</u></b>	Not sufficient to meet a need. <i>These labels prove to be wholly <b>inadequate</b>.</i>
<b><u>indigent</u></b>	A needy person. <i>A charity for the relief of <b>indigent</b> artists.</i>
<b><u>insufficient</u></b>	Not enough; inadequate. <i>There was <b>insufficient</b> evidence to convict him.</i>
<b>lacking</b>	(of a quality) absent. <i>Her appetite was <b>lacking</b>.</i>
<b>layoff</b>	The act of laying off an employee or a work force.
<b>leave</b>	Go and leave behind either intentionally or by neglect or forgetfulness. <i>The parts he disliked he would alter and the parts he didn't dislike he d <b>leave</b>.</i>

<b>lose</b>	Miss from one's possessions lose sight of. <i>She couldn't eat and began to <b>lose</b> weight.</i>
<b>loss</b>	Euphemistic expressions for death. <i>Insurance can protect you against financial <b>loss</b>.</i>
<b><u>meager</u></b>	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i><b>Meager</b> fare.</i>
<b>minus</b>	On the negative side or lower end of a scale. <i>C <b>minus</b>.</i>
<b>mislay</b>	Unintentionally put (an object) where it cannot readily be found and so lose it temporarily. <i>I seem to have <b>mislaid</b> my car keys.</i>
<b><u>miss</u></b>	Pass by without touching; chance not to hit. <i>He's rich he won't <b>miss</b> the money.</i>
<b><u>presence</u></b>	The act of being present. <i>The <b>presence</b> of chlorine in the atmosphere.</i>
<b>scant</b>	Less than the correct or legal or full amount often deliberately so. <i>She weighed a <b>scant</b> two pounds.</i>
<b>scanty</b>	Small or insufficient in quantity or amount. <i>A <b>scanty</b> harvest.</i>
<b>short</b>	Of a vowel categorized as short with regard to quality and length e.g. in standard British English the vowel in good is short as distinct from the long vowel u in food. <i>They have been backed at <b>short</b> odds to win thousands of pounds.</i>
<b>substandard</b>	Falling short of some prescribed norm. <i><b>Substandard</b> spellings.</i>
<b>truant</b>	Of a pupil being a truant. <i>If my daughter had been <b>truanting</b> from school I would have been informed.</i>
<b>undermanned</b>	Inadequate in number of workers or assistants etc.
<b>undersized</b>	Smaller than normal for its kind. <i>The <b>undersized</b> cubs may not survive the winter.</i>
<b>unequal</b>	A person or thing regarded as unequal to another in status or level. <i>I have lived for fifty years as an <b>unequal</b> in this country.</i>
<b><u>unsatisfactory</u></b>	Not giving satisfaction. <i>Shops should take back <b>unsatisfactory</b> goods.</i>
<b>wanting</b>	Inadequate in amount or degree. <i>Tested and found <b>wanting</b>.</i>
