Associations of "For regulate" (30 Words)

abolitionism	The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
abstemious	Indulging only very moderately in something, especially food and drink. <i>The pleasures of the table never of much consequence to one naturally abstemious.</i>
abstinent	Refraining from an activity or from the consumption of something, especially alcohol. <i>Not totally abstinent but abstemious.</i>
adapt	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The policies can be adapted to suit individual needs.</i>
adjust	Permit small alterations or movements so as to achieve a desired fit, appearance, or result. <i>The insurance agent may have the responsibility of adjusting small losses.</i>
ascetic	A person who follows an ascetic life. <i>Be systematically ascetic do something for no other reason than that you would rather not do it.</i>
austere	Having a plain and unadorned appearance. <i>The cathedral is impressive in its austere simplicity.</i>
ban	Ban from a place of residence as for punishment. <i>Her son was banned for life from the Centre.</i>
censorship	The suppression or prohibition of any parts of books, films, news, etc. that are considered obscene, politically unacceptable, or a threat to security. <i>We have strict censorship laws.</i>
conquer	Take possession of by force, as after an invasion. <i>Conquer a country.</i>
control	The economic policy of controlling or limiting or curbing prices or wages etc. <i>Platelet activity was higher in patients with the disease than in the controls.</i>

deter	Prevent the occurrence of. <i>Only a health problem would deter him from seeking re election.</i>
enforceable	Capable of being enforced. <i>A binding and enforceable contract.</i>
federal	Any federal law enforcement officer. <i>Federal governments often evolved out of confederations.</i>
forbid	Order (someone) not to do something. <i>I can see why phones were forbidden.</i>
forbidden	Excluded from use or mention. <i>Forbidden fruit.</i>
forestall	Prevent or obstruct (an anticipated event or action) by taking advance action. <i>They will present their resignations to forestall a vote of no confidence.</i>
govern	Conduct oneself, especially with regard to controlling one's emotions. <i>He was incapable of governing the country.</i>
hinder	Hinder or prevent the progress or accomplishment of. <i>The hinder part of a carcass.</i>
inhibit	(of a substance) slow down or prevent (a process, reaction, or function) or reduce the activity of (an enzyme or other agent). <i>Inhibit the action of the enzyme.</i>
interdict	An authoritative prohibition. <i>Army efforts to interdict enemy supply shipments.</i>
modulate	Change from one key to another. <i>The state attempts to modulate private business s cash flow.</i>
preclude	Prevent from happening; make impossible. <i>His difficulties preclude him from leading a normal life.</i>
predominance	The quality of being more noticeable than anything else. <i>The predominance of women in such professions as social work and nursing.</i>
prohibitory	Tending to discourage (especially of prices).
repression	The action of subduing someone or something by force. <i>Children and adults pay a heavy price for their deep repression of thoughts about death.</i>
subjugate	Make someone or something subordinate to. <i>The new ruler firmly subjugated the Church to the state.</i>

suppress Consciously restrain from showing; of emotions, desires, impulses, or behavior.

*The rising was savagely **suppressed**.*

taboo Place under a taboo.

*The burial ground was seen as a **taboo** place.*

veto Exercise a veto against a decision or proposal.

*His **veto** on our drinking after the meal was annoying.*
