Associations of "For servant" (30 Words)

allegiant	That owes or gives allegiance (to someone or something); loyal, faithful. <i>It is impossible to be allegiant to two opposing forces.</i>
butler	The chief manservant of a house.
cleaner	A device for cleaning such as a vacuum cleaner. <i>My suit s at the cleaners.</i>
dutiful	Willingly obedient out of a sense of duty and respect. <i>A dutiful child.</i>
enslave	Make a slave of; bring into servitude. <i>They were enslaved by their need to take drugs.</i>
epigone	An inferior imitator of some distinguished writer, artist, or musician. <i>The humdrum compositions of some of Beethoven s epigones.</i>
factotum	A servant employed to do a variety of jobs. <i>He was employed as the general factotum.</i>
fawning	Attempting to win favor by flattery. <i>Fawning adoration.</i>
flatter	Lavish praise and compliments on (someone), often insincerely and with the aim of furthering one’s own interests. <i>She was flattering him in order to avoid doing what he wanted.</i>
flattery	Excessive and insincere praise, given especially to further one’s own interests. <i>She allowed no hint of flattery to enter her voice.</i>
follower	A person who moves or travels behind someone or something. <i>She remains an immensely divisive figure but she has a million followers on Facebook.</i>
footman	A soldier in the infantry.
groveling	Totally submissive.

henchman	A faithful follower or political supporter, especially one prepared to engage in crime or violence by way of service. <i>The dictator s henchman.</i>
hireling	A person who works purely for material reward. <i>The government s paid hirelings assure us that we re on our way out of recession.</i>
<u>housekeeper</u>	A person employed to perform cleaning and other domestic tasks in a hotel or institution.
ingratiate	Bring oneself into favour with someone by flattering or trying to please them. <i>A sycophantic attempt to ingratiate herself with the local aristocracy.</i>
ingratiating	Intended to gain approval or favour; sycophantic. <i>With open arms and an ingratiating smile.</i>
lackey	A male servant (especially a footman). <i>Lackeys were waiting to help them from the carriage.</i>
<u>maid</u>	A female domestic. <i>Mary eventually managed to find a job as a maid.</i>
<u>minion</u>	A servile or fawning dependant. <i>He gets oppressed minions like me to fob them off.</i>
<u>obedient</u>	Complying or willing to comply with an order or request; submissive to another's authority. <i>A docile and obedient dog.</i>
<u>obsequious</u>	Obedient or attentive to an excessive or servile degree. <i>They were served by obsequious waiters.</i>
<u>parasite</u>	A person who habitually relies on or exploits others and gives nothing in return. <i>The parasite attaches itself to the mouths of fishes.</i>
servile	Submissive or fawning in attitude or behavior. <i>The incurably servile housekeeper.</i>
submissive	Abjectly submissive characteristic of a slave or servant. <i>Submissive servants.</i>
sycophant	A person who tries to please someone in order to gain a personal advantage.
sycophantic	Attempting to win favor from influential people by flattery. <i>A sycophantic interview.</i>
toady	Act in an obsequious way. <i>She imagined him toadying to his rich clients.</i>

unctuous (chiefly of minerals) having a greasy or soapy feel.
*He seemed anxious to please but not in an **unctuous** way.*
