<b>chase</b>	United States politician and jurist who served as chief justice of the United States Supreme Court (1808-1873). <i>Police <b>chased</b> the stolen car through the city.</i>
<b><u>detect</u></b>	Discover or identify the presence or existence of. <i>Paul <b>detected</b> a faint note of weariness in his father s voice.</i>
<b><u>discovery</u></b>	The act of discovering something. <i>The drug is not a new <b>discovery</b>.</i>
<b>explore</b>	Travel through (an unfamiliar area) in order to learn about it. <i>He decided to <b>explore</b> the lesion to establish the diagnosis.</i>
<b>find</b>	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>Phobia sufferers often <b>find</b> themselves virtual prisoners in their own home.</i>
<b>finding</b>	The action of finding someone or something. <i>The <b>findings</b> in the gastrointestinal tract indicate that he died several hours after dinner.</i>
<b>forage</b>	Wander and feed. <i>The birds <b>forage</b> for aquatic invertebrates insects and seeds.</i>
<b><u>gawk</u></b>	Stare openly and stupidly. <i>Let those country <b>gawks</b> dance to their hearts content.</i>
<b>goggle</b>	The staggers (a disease of sheep). <i>Their <b>goggle</b> mesmerizes even fishmongers.</i>
<b>hide-and-seek</b>	Inquire for.
<b>hound</b>	Used in names of dogfishes e g nurse hound smooth hound. <i>His opponents used the allegations to <b>hound</b> him out of office.</i>
<b>hunt</b>	Use a hound or a horse for hunting. <i>Lionesses <b>hunt</b> in groups.</i>
<b><u>hunting</u></b>	The activity of hunting wild animals or game. <i>Whale <b>hunting</b> is unnecessary.</i>

<b>investigate</b>	Investigate scientifically. <i>Everyone with a possible interest in your brother's death must be thoroughly <b>investigated</b>.</i>
<b>microscope</b>	Magnifier of the image of small objects. <i>The invention of the <b>microscope</b> led to the discovery of the cell.</i>
<b>microscopy</b>	The use of the microscope.
<b>observation</b>	The act of taking the altitude of the sun or another celestial body to find a latitude or longitude. <i>He made a telling <b>observation</b> about Hughie.</i>
<b>pursue</b>	Carry out or participate in an activity; be involved in. <i>Andrew was determined to <b>pursue</b> a computer career.</i>
<b>pursuit</b>	The action of pursuing someone or something. <i>Those whose business is the <b>pursuit</b> of knowledge.</i>
<b>quest</b>	Express the need or desire for; ask for. <i>A <b>quest</b> for wealth.</i>
<b>research</b>	Engaged in or intended for research. <i>She has spent the last five years <b>researching</b> her people's history.</i>
<b>rummage</b>	(of a customs officer) make a thorough search of (a vessel). <i>He gave the attic a good <b>rummage</b> but couldn't find his skis.</i>
<b>scan</b>	An image obtained by scanning or with a scanner. <i>The beams <b>scanned</b> the night sky.</i>
<b>scavenger</b>	A substance that reacts with and removes particular molecules, groups, etc. <i>4 aminosalicylic acid is not an effective free radical <b>scavenger</b>.</i>
<b>scour</b>	A place that is scoured especially by running water. <i>The <b>scour</b> of the tide may cause lateral erosion.</i>
<b>scrutinize</b>	To look at critically or searchingly, or in minute detail. <i>Customers were warned to <b>scrutinize</b> the small print.</i>
<b>search</b>	An act of searching for someone or something. <i>You can <b>search</b> for recipes by topic or by entering a keyword.</i>
<b>shooting</b>	The sport or pastime of shooting with a gun. <i>The events that led up to the <b>shooting</b> of the man.</i>
<b>try</b>	An act of trying something new or different to see if it is suitable, effective or pleasant. <i>She agreed that they should give the idea a <b>try</b>.</i>
