debris	Loose natural material consisting especially of broken pieces of rock. <i>Workmen were clearing the roads of the debris from shattered buildings.</i>
dregs	Sediment that has settled at the bottom of a liquid. <i>Coffee dregs.</i>
extant	Still in existence; not extinct or destroyed or lost. <i>Extant manuscripts.</i>
left	Of or belonging to the political or intellectual left. <i>She had a little money left over so she went to a movie.</i>
leftover	A small part or portion that remains after the main part no longer exists. <i>He s just a leftover from another age.</i>
lifeboat	A strong sea boat designed to rescue people from a sinking ship.
lifeguard	An attendant employed at a beach or pool to protect swimmers from accidents.
raft	Transport on or as if on a raft. <i>I have rafted along the Rio Grande.</i>
redemption	(theology) the act of delivering from sin or saving from evil. <i>Soldiers who were captured had to seek redemption.</i>
remainder	Sell cheaply as remainders. <i>23 divided by 3 is 7 remainder 2.</i>
remaining	Not yet used, dealt with, or resolved; outstanding. <i>Lilly was my last remaining close relative.</i>
remains	A person's body after death. <i>The remains of a sandwich lunch were on the table.</i>
remnant	A piece of cloth that is left over after the rest has been used or sold. <i>Remnant strands of hair.</i>

rescue	Save (someone) from a dangerous or difficult situation. <i>They have not always been keen to organize rescue excavations to investigate these sites.</i>
residual	(often plural) a payment that is made to a performer or writer or director of a television show or commercial that is paid for every repeat showing. <i>Residual quantity.</i>
residue	Matter that remains after something has been removed. <i>The residue of the country's colonial past.</i>
rest	The sign denoting a musical rest. <i>A body will continue in a state of rest until acted upon.</i>
salvage	Collect discarded or refused material. <i>It was the only crumb of comfort he could salvage from the ordeal.</i>
scavenge	Clean refuse from. <i>Bears and wolves scavenged for carcasses.</i>
thrifty	(of livestock or plants) strong and healthy. <i>He had been brought up to be thrifty and careful.</i>
trace	Discover traces of. <i>Trace the student's progress.</i>
undetected	Not perceived or discerned. <i>She looked around to be sure her faux pas was undetected.</i>
undiagnosed	Not diagnosed or having been subject to diagnosis. <i>Some patients have diseases that go undiagnosed and therefore untreated.</i>
undiscovered	Not discovered. <i>Undiscovered islands.</i>
unobserved	Not seen or observed. <i>Their courtship has not gone unobserved by Giles.</i>
unseen	An unseen passage for translation. <i>Latin unseens.</i>
vestige	The smallest amount. <i>He waited patiently but without a vestige of sympathy.</i>
vestigial	(of an organ or part of the body) degenerate, rudimentary, or atrophied, having become functionless in the course of evolution. <i>The vestigial wings of kiwis are entirely hidden.</i>
waste	Run off as waste. <i>They had learned to avoid waste.</i>
wreckage	The remains of something that has been badly damaged or destroyed. <i>They searched the wreckage for signs of survivors.</i>
