<u>debris</u>	Loose natural material consisting especially of broken pieces of rock. Workmen were clearing the roads of the <b>debris</b> from shattered buildings.
dregs	Sediment that has settled at the bottom of a liquid. <i>Coffee <b>dregs</b></i> .
<u>extant</u>	Still in existence; not extinct or destroyed or lost. <i>Extant</i> manuscripts.
left	Of or belonging to the political or intellectual left. She had a little money <b>left</b> over so she went to a movie.
leftover	A small part or portion that remains after the main part no longer exists. <i>He s just a leftover from another age.</i>
lifeboat	A strong sea boat designed to rescue people from a sinking ship.
lifeguard	An attendant employed at a beach or pool to protect swimmers from accidents.
raft	Transport on or as if on a raft. I have <b>raft</b> ed along the Rio Grande.
redemption	(theology) the act of delivering from sin or saving from evil. Soldiers who were captured had to seek <b>redemption</b> .
remainder	Sell cheaply as remainders. 23 divided by 3 is 7 <b>remainder</b> 2.
<u>remaining</u>	Not yet used, dealt with, or resolved; outstanding. Lilly was my last <b>remaining</b> close relative.
remains	A person's body after death. The <b>remains</b> of a sandwich lunch were on the table.
<u>remnant</u>	A piece of cloth that is left over after the rest has been used or sold. <i>Remnant</i> strands of hair.



rescue	Save (someone) from a dangerous or difficult situation. They have not always been keen to organize <b>rescue</b> excavations to investigate these sites.
<u>residual</u>	(often plural) a payment that is made to a performer or writer or director of a television show or commercial that is paid for every repeat showing. <i>Residual quantity.</i>
<u>residue</u>	Matter that remains after something has been removed. The <b>residue</b> of the country s colonial past.
<u>rest</u>	The sign denoting a musical rest. A body will continue in a state of <b>rest</b> until acted upon.
<u>salvage</u>	Collect discarded or refused material. It was the only crumb of comfort he could <b>salvage</b> from the ordeal.
<u>scavenge</u>	Clean refuse from. Bears and wolves <b>scavenge</b> d for carcasses.
<u>thrifty</u>	(of livestock or plants) strong and healthy. <i>He had been brought up to be <b>thrifty</b> and careful.</i>
<u>trace</u>	Discover traces of. <b>Trace</b> the student s progress.
<u>undetected</u>	Not perceived or discerned. She looked around to be sure her faux pas was <b>undetected</b> .
undiagnosed	Not diagnosed or having been subject to diagnosis. Some patients have diseases that go <b>undiagnosed</b> and therefore untreated.
undiscovered	Not discovered. <b>Undiscovered</b> islands.
unobserved	Not seen or observed. Their courtship has not gone <b>unobserved</b> by Giles.
<u>unseen</u>	An unseen passage for translation. <i>Latin <b>unseen</b>s.</i>
vestige	The smallest amount. <i>He waited patiently but without a <b>vestige</b> of sympathy.</i>
vestigial	(of an organ or part of the body) degenerate, rudimentary, or atrophied, having become functionless in the course of evolution. <i>The vestigial wings of kiwis are entirely hidden.</i>
waste	Run off as waste. They had learned to avoid <b>waste</b> .
wreckage	The remains of something that has been badly damaged or destroyed. They searched the <b>wreckage</b> for signs of survivors.
