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## Associations of "For thief" (30 Words)

<b><a href="#">bandit</a></b>	An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band. <i>The <b>bandit</b> produced a weapon and demanded money.</i>
<b><a href="#">brigand</a></b>	An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band.
<b><a href="#">burglar</a></b>	A person who commits burglary.
<b><a href="#">burglary</a></b>	Illegal entry of a building with intent to commit a crime, especially theft. <i>A two year sentence for <b>burglary</b>.</i>
<b>burgle</b>	Commit a burglary; enter and rob a dwelling. <i>Our house in London has been <b>burgled</b>.</i>
<b>criminal</b>	Someone who has committed a crime or has been legally convicted of a crime. <i>A <b>criminal</b> court.</i>
<b>despoil</b>	Destroy and strip of its possession. <i>The church was <b>despoiled</b> of its marble wall covering.</i>
<b>filch</b>	Pilfer or steal (something, especially an item of small value) in a casual way. <i>They <b>filched</b> milk off morning doorsteps.</i>
<b>guilty</b>	Culpable of or responsible for a specified wrongdoing. <i>She was <b>guilty</b> of a serious error of judgement.</i>
<b>kleptomania</b>	A recurrent urge to steal, typically without regard for need or profit.
<b>larceny</b>	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
<b><a href="#">outlaw</a></b>	Declare illegal outlaw. <i>Bands of <b>outlaws</b> held up trains.</i>
<b>pickpocket</b>	Steal from the pockets of (someone). <i>I think someone <b>pickpocketed</b> me in Brighton on my way to the station.</i>
<b>pillage</b>	The act of stealing valuable things from a place. <i>Artworks <b>pillaged</b> from churches and museums.</i>

<b>piracy</b>	A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Air <b>piracy</b>.</i>
<b>rapine</b>	The violent seizure of someone's property. <i>Industrial <b>rapine</b>.</i>
<b>recidivist</b>	Relating to recidivists. <i>The third lowest <b>recidivist</b> rate in the country.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Rip off; ask an unreasonable price. <i>He tried with three others to <b>rob</b> a bank.</i>
<b><u>robber</u></b>	A person who commits robbery.
<b>robbery</b>	The action of taking property unlawfully from a person or place by force or threat of force. <i>He was involved in drugs extortion and <b>robbery</b>.</i>
<b>rustler</b>	A person who rounds up and steals cattle, horses, or sheep. <i>Police have so far arrested 649 <b>rustlers</b> countrywide.</i>
<b>shoplift</b>	Steal in a store. <i>She was caught <b>shoplifting</b> a pair of shoes.</i>
<b>shoplifting</b>	The action of stealing goods from a shop while pretending to be a customer. <i>Shrinkage is the retail trade's euphemism for <b>shoplifting</b>.</i>
<b>steal</b>	An act of stealing something. <i>He finished with eight points four <b>steals</b> and seven assists.</i>
<b>theft</b>	The action or crime of stealing. <i>He was convicted of <b>theft</b>.</i>
<b>thieve</b>	Be a thief; steal something. <i>They began <b>thieving</b> again.</i>
<b>thievery</b>	The action of stealing another person's property. <i>Petty <b>thievery</b>.</i>
<b>transgression</b>	An act that goes against a law, rule, or code of conduct; an offence. <i>Her <b>transgression</b> of genteel etiquette.</i>
<b>unlawful</b>	Having no legally established claim. <i><b>Unlawful</b> love.</i>
<b>vagrancy</b>	The state of living as a vagrant; homelessness. <i>A descent into <b>vagrancy</b> and drug abuse.</i>
